John A. Board (Gynecological Problems of Adolescents) is professor of obstetrics and gynecology at the Medical College of Virginia. He received his M.D. degree from MCV, did his internship at Louisville General Hospital in Louisville, Kentucky and returned to MCV for his residency in 1956. In 1961 Dr. Board left MCV to become a fellow in infertility and reproductive physiology at Yale University, returning to his faculty post here in 1962.
