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Dr. Hill Is Named Child Psychiatry Teacher

Dr. Lucy Scott Hill has been named to the teaching staff of the college in the Department of Psychiatry. Doctor Hill was graduated from the Medical College of Virginia in 1924. Her work will be limited primarily to child psychiatry.

Doctor Hill, who has already reported for work, came to her new position from the Fairfax County Child Guidance Clinic where she was child psychiatrist.

She previously was director of Sara T. Mayo Psychiatric Clinic in New Orleans, and also was on the staffs of Charity Hospital, Hotel Dieu, Lakeshore Hospital and DePaul Sanitarium, all in New Orleans.

With the addition of Doctor Hill to the Department of Psychiatry MCV expects to broaden its service in its program of psychiatry for children.
