

On motion of Dr. W. C. Henderson, seconded by Dr. Harry Lyons, the treasurer's report was accepted. Mr. W. Roy Smith delivered his report on the activities of the Association since he had taken office:

President's Report

As we meet together today in the seventy-fourth year of our association's history, I am happy to have this opportunity to report to you some of the activities of your alumni association.

This year, the Alumni Association has joined with the administration and faculty of the College in celebrating the one hundred twenty-fifth anniversary of the founding of the Medical College of Virginia. As part of this commemoration the Sixth Annual Scientific Assembly of the school of medicine, jointly sponsored by the school and by the Alumni Association, was held yesterday. We are indebted to Drs. Carolyn McCue and Robert Massie, cochairmen, for carrying on in such a good manner this established program of continuing education in medicine. It is worthy of note that this annual assembly is accepted for credit by the American Academy of General Practice.

Last fall, MCV President R. Blackwell Smith, Jr., suggested to your trustees that it would be fitting in this 125th anniversary year for each of the other major schools of MCV to also conduct scientific assemblies in conjunction with the annual alumni reunion; the cooperation of the administration and the faculty was offered; and joint-sponsorship by the Alumni Association was requested.

As a result of this suggestion, and with the diligent work of many alumni and faculty members—which is gratefully acknowledged—scientific assemblies were held yesterday not only by the school of medicine but also by the schools of dentistry, pharmacy, and nursing.

For several years, the school of dentistry has sponsored a three-day program in the spring of the year devoted to continuing education in the field of dentistry; and I deem it appropriate to recognize the burden which was cheerfully accepted by the faculty of the school of dentistry in undertaking another program following so closely behind their regular annual program. Our appreciation is extended to Dr. Richard L. Simpson, Jr., chairman and on the faculty of the school of dentistry, as well as to Mr. Ralph Ware and the faculty of the

school of pharmacy and to Dr. Jean M. Hayter and the faculty of the school of nursing, for their efforts in presenting the scientific assemblies in their respective schools.

During the part of the year that has passed, several of the alumni chapters have held meetings and both the College and the Association have been represented at each meeting. It has been my pleasure to attend several chapter meetings thus far, and I look forward to the privilege of attending several more between now and the end of the year.

Each year your president is privileged to attend the meetings of the Board of Visitors of the College. I have attended three such meetings thus far this year. It has been a richly rewarding experience. The high caliber of the men and women who serve MCV with dedication under the leadership of their distinguished chairman, Mr. Eppa Hunton, IV, augurs well for the future of our alma mater as she continues to fulfill her mission of service to the citizens of Virginia.

Your alumni association has continued to lend its efforts in support of the College this year. Again this year as in the preceding five years, we are contributing \$10,000 in payment of our annual pledge toward the \$100,000 total pledged to the College for construction of the Alumni Lounge in the student dormitories.

The property at 1107 East Clay Street, adjacent to the Alumni House, which was purchased by the Association several years ago, continues to be rented to the Child Development Study group. The availability of this facility made it possible for this research project to be located at MCV. The study is now in its third year, operating on a grant of \$413,000 from the National Institute of Health.

The floors of the alumni building which are not used for association activities continue to produce revenue for the Association from rentals. The Virginia Pharmaceutical Association continues to occupy the basement level, while the second and third floors are occupied by the Old Dominion Eye Bank, an

intern, and a resident at MCV and his family.

During the past ten years, the growth of your association has been quite impressive and should, I believe, give us reason to believe that we can and should plan now for an era of greatly increased usefulness.

In the short space of a decade our total receipts, our assets, and our cash on hand have all grown in an imposing manner.

In 1962 our total receipts amounted to \$50,863.92, an increase of nearly 65% over the \$30,883.59 which was received in 1952. Our cash on hand, during this period, increased from \$7804.41 to \$30,149.18, an increase of nearly 300%; and our total assets have increased from \$66.910.94 to \$91.271.97.

The statistics on our membership growth are equally imposing and encouraging. At the close of 1962 our membership was 2763 as compared with 1144 only ten years earlier. Our membership now approximates 32% of living alumni, a figure which compares very favorably with other active alumni associations, but one which obviously leaves much room for further growth.

The one disturbing note in these statistics is the decrease in the size of the average contribution per member. The \$31,180 in membership contributions in 1962 represented a decline in the average payment when compared to the figure of \$18,834 contributed 10 years earlier by only about 40% as many alumni.

At the same time, the fact that our average contribution is quite obviously much lower than it could be, and the fact that we have as prospects for membership two living alumni for each alumni member lead me to believe that we have the potential for an era of greatly increased usefulness.

The progress made in the past ten years has been sparked by a relatively small number of dedicated and loyal alumni. With a continuation of their efforts plus the added efforts of others, I believe we can reach out to bring that era to fulfillment. What is needed is the development of well-conceived plans that will give each alumnus, through this Association, an opportunity to lend his own personal moral and financial support to the College in its mission of educating future mem-

bers of the health professions and directly to the young people themselves, who aspire to pursue careers of service in these professions.

Much effort has gone into planning this year's annual alumni reunion, as I am sure you can tell from the program; and I know you will join me in expressing thanks to Dr. Wyndham Blanton, Jr., for his able handling of the onerous chores of the general reunion chairman. Thanks are due also to chairmen for the several schools: Dr. Francis McMullan for medicine; Dr. W. C. Henderson for dentistry; Mr. R. R. Rooke for pharmacy; and Mrs. Carol B. Cantrell for nursing; as well as to Dr. Hume S. Powell, banquet and social hour chairman; Mr. J. Edward Marks, dance chairman; Dr. Richard A. Michaux, luncheon chairman; Dr. Robert Irby, open house chairman; and Dr. Harold Nemuth, hospitality chairman.

Many other alumni have participated in planning for this reunion and I refer you to the printed program for a more complete listing.

In concluding this report I would like to extend my thanks to Dr. James Tucker for his outstanding work as editor of The SCARAB, to the members of the executive committee and of the Board of Trustees for their guidance and support, and to Miss Minnie Franck for her continued loyalty and devotion to the work of the Association.

Before concluding, however, I should like to issue a reminder to each of you that our association, now in its 74th year, has only one reason for its existence; and that is to afford a medium through which the alumni can join together in concerted action to advance the progress and welfare of MCV and thereby increase its usefulness to the Commonwealth and this Nation.

The College has made truly remarkable strides in its 125 years of existence. Let us hope that our association will continue, and increase, its efforts to assist the College as it continues to go forward in its commitment to give the broadest and best training possible to young men and women preparing for careers in medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, nursing, and the related health-care professions.



We Pay Tribute

Alton Dean Brashear

Time is a sort of river of passing events, and strong is its current; no sooner is a thing brought to sight than it is swept by and another takes its place, and this too will be swept away. Thus we mourn the passing of Alton Dean Brashear who died June 30, 1963. To him, time has fallen asleep in the afternoon of sunshine, for those who bring sunshine to the lives of others cannot keep it from themselves. His loss is severe not only to the students, faculty, and administration at the Medical College of Virginia but to the community at large.

It is unnecessary to recount his accomplishments in life, great as they were, for we all know them so well. One simple story recording an event which occurred in the last weeks of his life, as he faced the malady which killed him, needs to be told. It needs to be told because it exemplifies the tremendous courage, spirit, and sense of humor which undoubtedly dominated his life. The story is as follows:

One afternoon, during the series of diagnostic measures which ultimately detected his fatal illness, he was taken to a room where encephalograms were recorded. Later he related the incident to a colleague and said, "When they hooked the electrodes to my head I started to think and I thought big because I wanted it to look good." Alton D. Brashear always thought big; he thought big as a student; he thought big as a teacher: and he thought big as a citizen. From this bigness of thought came a kindness of heart that we all learned to know so well, and what wisdom can you find that is greater than kindness? He must have thought often of the words of Galsworthy who said, "I shall pass through this world but once; any good things therefore that I can do, or any kindness that I can show to any human being or dumb animal, let me do it now. Let me not defer or neglect it for I shall not pass this way again."

Dr. Sidney S. Negus

Dr. Sidney S. Negus died on May 17, 1963. He was chairman emeritus of the department of biochemistry at MCV and public information director for numerous national and international scientific organizations and conferences.

Before his retirement in June, 1962, he had spent 50 years in teaching, 35 of which were at MCV as chairman of the biochemistry department. He taught nearly 10,000 students in his half-century teaching career.

His honors and awards have been many. At the 1963 annual meeting of the Virginia Academy of Science, he was a recipient of the academy's meritorious service award. In 1949, he was awarded the distinguished service award of the Virginia section of the American Chemical Society.

Dr. Jesse H. Weatherby

Dr. Jesse H. Weatherby, professor of pharmacology at MCV, died on July 10. He was an associate professor at MCV from 1936-1962 and taught in the dental, medical, pharmacy, and graduate schools. He was appointed a full professor in 1962.

A commander in the navy in World War II, he was a member of the Society of Zoology, Society of Pharmacology, and Society of General Physiology.

In his article in the May issue of THE SCARAB, he wrote, "Present-day students differ only in that they have somewhat greater potenialities than we had. Given a word of encouragement and an opportunity, they perform nicely."



School of Graduate Studies

The school of graduate studies began 1962-63 with a total enrollment of sixty students. At the commencement exercises held on June 2, 1963, the degree of doctor of philosophy was awarded to Edward Randolph Bowman, in pharmacology; John Paul Manning, in anatomy; Sorell Lee Schwartz, in pharmacology; Michael Ney Sheridan, in anatomy; Daniel Blosser Suter, in anatomy; and Robert Irving Taber, in pharmacology. 

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
