GREETINGS:

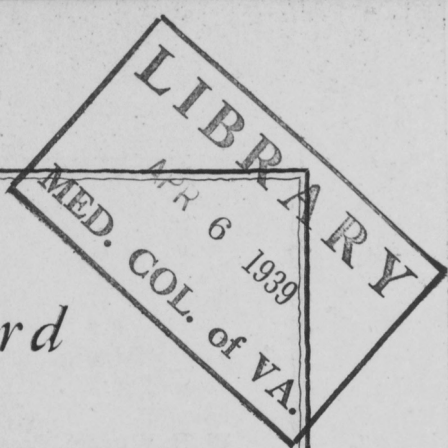

WHILE those of us in organized dentistry have known for a long time that attendance at the programs of organized dentistry was the only means of keeping pace with the developments of the profession, it is only within the last few years that the real function of the dental societies in the maintenance of competency to practice has been understood. The professions of dentistry and medicine have not had, until very recently, anything offered in the dental and medical schools of this country through which a practitioner could hold the education that he had and continue to develop with his profession and with society. Membership in dental societies, therefore, is a symbol of qualifications which the profession might well use to greater advantage than it has to inform the public on a matter on which it has long wanted information. The average person in society is anxious to know how to discriminate between the practitioner who is competent and the one who is not. While it is true that a few in organized dentistry do not utilize the educational aspects of the dental societies, the average member comes nearer to safeguarding the interests of the public than a licensee does who is not a member of organized dentistry.

William Osler discussed the question of the educational value of the medical societies in 1903 and laid the foundation for them in his analysis of the life of the young doctor who, he said, "may find in five or ten years that he knows less than he did when he started and is without any

fixed educational purpose in life." He described as a prolonged struggle the efforts that were necessary to keep the education once obtained in college, to say nothing of growing with the development of the profession.

The dental societies have been our only means of carrying out the ideals that were laid down by Osler in regard to competency of practitioners. Some of the dental schools that are now making efforts to remedy a defect in our educational system will undoubtedly make great contributions in the field of the education of the practitioner. The dental societies, however, will always be necessary to assist in the dissemination of information to the practitioners in the field. Moreover, it is only through the dental societies that an evaluation of the ethics maintained in practice may be obtained. Unless there is maintenance of good ethics among practitioners there can be no cordial association of them, and unless there is cordial association there will not be competency among practitioners that the public has the right to expect. It is my hope, therefore, that your Society, with most of the others in the country today, will avail itself of its opportunity to inform the public of the difference that exists between practitioners who practice frequent assemblage and those who do not.
