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Time Warner, EMI talking merger

Time Warner, fresh from announcing a blockbuster merger deal with America Online Inc., is in talks with Britain's EMI Records to create the world's second-largest record company, CNN reported.

Officials from both companies confirmed the talks took place. Published reports said Time Warner and EMI agreed to combine their music operations into a \$20 billion joint venture that would bring top Time Warner recording stars such as Cher, Eric Clapton, Phil Collins, Madonna, Metallica and REM and EMI's lineup of, among others, the Beatles, Rolling Stones, Spice Girls, Garth Brooks and Smashing Pumpkins all under one roof.

In a statement, EMI said it would announce details of the proposed deal before the London stock market opened Monday.

"The board of EMI Group confirms it is in the final stages of discussions about the merger of its recorded music and music publishing business with the music operations of Time Warner in a 50-50 joint venture structure," the company said in the statement. "The transaction contemplated represents an opportunity to establish the world's premier music group and to create very considerable value for shareholders of both companies."

The move comes two weeks after Time Warner — in a stock swap worth about \$145 billion — announced its merger with Internet giant AOL. The AOL deal will give Time Warner much-needed access to Internet distribution channels for music, films and other forms of entertainment. Through the joint venture with Time Warner, EMI would also be a key player in the digital music industry.

Time Warner spokesman Edward Adler confirmed the talks happened, but said no deal had been signed yet. The new company would be called Warner EMI Music, and would have Time Warner's Atlantic, Elektra and Warner Brothers record labels and EMI's Virgin, Priority and Capitol.

Drugstore chain begins system to avoid drug, herbal supplement interaction

Woonsocket, R.I. (AP) — One of the nation's top drugstore chains has begun tracking herbal supplements used by customers in an effort to avoid potentially risky combinations with prescription drugs.

CVS Corp. is asking customers to tell their pharmacists what herbal supplements they use. The pharmacies enter the information into a computer program that cross-checks them for adverse combinations with prescription drugs.

"We are deeply concerned that an increased use of vitamin and herbal therapies can lead to an increased chance of potentially dangerous drug interactions," said Chris Bodine, CVS vice president for pharmacies.

For example, the supplement St. John's Wort, taken to relieve depression, reduces the effectiveness of some heart medications, Bodine said Thursday.

Herbal supplements, largely unregulated, have grown into a \$1.5 billion annual industry and health-care providers have been struggling to educate people about using the remedies safely.

Pharmacist Felicia Rauchle of the independently owned Barrington Pharmacy, said she watched the alternative-remedies shelf across from her counter and made sure to ask customers what they were buying.

"We talk to all of our patients," said Rauchle, who said she had seen supplement sales at her store skyrocket in the last year. "If we don't think something is good for them to take, we tell them."

CVS/Pharmacy, the nation's second-largest drugstore chain in terms of sales, will distribute forms to customers and then hold the information in a confidential patient profile.

When the patient has a prescription filled, the computer system automatically will list possible reactions from mixing the drug with a supplement. CVS has started a national advertising campaign encouraging customers to use the service.

Walgreens is developing a database that would offer the same service, company spokesman Michael Polzin said. Walgreens pharmacists currently use online reference material to cross-check drugs against herbal supplements.

State executes 2 murderers

GREENSVILLE — The Commonwealth of Virginia executed Steve Edward Roach and Douglas Christopher Thomas by lethal injection last week at the Greensville Correctional Center. Roach died Thursday and Thomas died Monday.

In 1990, a jury convicted Thomas, then 17, of killing a Middlesex County couple with a shotgun. The couple were the parents of Thomas' 14-year-old girlfriend, the Richmond Times-Dispatch reported. Three years later, Roach, also 17 at the time, shot and killed a 70-year-old widowed neighbor, took her purse and car keys and fled to South Carolina.

When asked if he had a last statement, Roach quietly recited Psalm 23 from the Bible

Anti-death penalty protestors held candlelight vigils for each of the condemned. Several people outside the institution carried signs. One read, "Stop state executions now. Don't kill for me." Another read, "An eye for an eye makes the whole world blind," the paper reported.

Gov. Jim Gilmore released a statement saying he declined to intervene in the executions.

The Union for Student Rights holds overnight vigil at VCU

Last Tuesday, the Union for Student Rights said they would be outside braving the cold and snowy weather as long as it takes to make their point to the university. It took three days for USR to get some of the information they wanted.

The group of students held a sleep-out in front of the McAdams House on West Franklin Street to try to show the university they wanted answers about VCU's contract with McDonald's.

USR representatives said their mission was to persuade the university to terminate its 20-year contract with the fast-food restaurant, senior Tim Wright said.

The university's contract with McDonald's started in 1997 and has three possible renewals, every five years, until 2017. The group has held sit-ins at McDonald's and has had meetings with university officials to get the facts about the contract.

"We felt they were dragging their feet," Wright said.

Group members said they might return to the same spot and have more sleep-outs.

"We hope to push the administration to finally address termination of the contract with McDonald's," sophomore Marc Redmond said. "No response today."

Someone from the university asked the group to move some things off the stairway and keep the sidewalk as clear as possible, Redmond said.


America Online Inc. and Time Warner Entertainment combined forces in a \$145 billion merger bringing interactive entertainment one step closer to reality.

The merger allows AOL/Time Warner to lead the development of new interactive media and new interactive services. The new company will focus on the development of products specifically for the interactive medium.

America Online Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Steve Case will take the position of chairman of the board of AOL/Time Warner.

"We've always said that America Online's mission is to make the Internet as central to people's lives as the telephone and television, and this is a once in a life time opportunity to turn this promise into reality," Case said. "By joining forces with Time Warner, we will fundamentally change the way people get information, communicate with others, buy

products are entertained-providing farreaching benefits to our customers and



shareholders."

Gerald Levin, Time Warner's chairman and chief executive officer, is now chief executive

officer of the new company.

"This strategic combination with AOL accelerates the digital transformation of Time Warner by giving our creative and content businesses the widest possible canvas."

Time Warner will now have AOL's marketing power to promote their music labels and artists.

The combination of Time Warner's cable networks and Warner Bros movies with America Online's AOL TV and MovieFone is also probable.

Warner Bros stores will also be found via AOL. AOL Time Warner will provide online news media with CNN, Time and other news services.

The merger should be complete by the end of the year. There are, however, possibilities of the merger falling through.

AOL and Time Warner still need governmental approval of the merger as well as the approval of AOL and Time Warner stockholders.

"This helps students deal with oppression," Konechne said. "This is a way for them to speak out about that oppression."

This project was not only for the students to examine today's world, but what the world could and should be like tomorrow, Konechne said.

"Students typically have biases toward others (of different disciplines) in the department," said Mary McLaughlin, associate professor in the department. "This helps us reintegrate the department."

The projects in the show displayed the talents of each student. The students came up with two pieces, one to express the voice of their group as a whole, and the other to express the points of view of each student in their group.

Statistics prove????

Female faces may seem to adorn Virginia Commonwealth University's Campus more than men. This could be true.

Of VCU's 23,125 students, 14,087 are female while males make up only 9,038. This unequal proportion can be seen not only at VCU, but other co-ed campuses across the country.

According to the National Center for Education Statistics, there has been an overall rise in enrollment of college students since the 1960's. The rise is most apparent for women, who composed 37% of the population in 1960 and almost doubled that to 62% in 1990.

There are many factors for the change in those numbers.

With the help of the civil rights movement of the 1960's, affirmative action and women organizations, the number of women enrolled in Universities and colleges dramatically increased.

In 1983 there were 6.4 million women in college. The number grew in 1996 to 8 million. The projected enrollment of women in college is expected to rise to 9.2 million people in the year 2008.

While women are growing in size at colleges and universities, men seem to be doing the opposite. In 1980, 51.8% of people in colleges were males. In 1996, the number dropped dramatically to 44.9%. These numbers seem to be lowest for black males with black women making up 2/3 of the graduation rate.

There seems to be no known reason for the dramatic drop of men, but some speculations point at the growing of technology.

By having the option of working in computer fields without having to attend a four year college more males may apt to enter the work force directly out of high school.

Statistics also show that the male high school drop out rate is higher than that of female.

Males are also enrolled in more special education classes. The lack of father role models in single parent homes may also play a part in recent findings.

Women still face the disadvantage of unequal wages to that of men. There is still a large gap between the male/female ratio in engineering, dentistry and other male dominated fields.

The 6.9% drop in only 16 years is a trend that may severely affect males in the future.

Sources say solutions may be found with more attention to the issue.



Y2K efforts yield long-term benefit for Delta Dental and PMI Dental Health Plan

Thirty million dollars may seem like a lot to spend fixing the Y2K bug, but company officials at California's largest dental-health plan and its HMO affiliate company said Y2K contingency planning yielded another benefit: disaster preparedness.

At 12:01 a.m. Jan. 1, a fully staffed command center helped Delta Dental Plan of California usher in the new year with continuity of service to 12 million enrollees, 18,000 dentists and 14,000 corporate and government client groups. PMI Dental Health Plan, Delta's dental HMO affiliate with another 1 million enrollees, maintained a similar vigil at its Cerritos headquarters.

Company officials said Delta and PMI did more than simply reprogram millions of lines of computer code to keep their claimsprocessing, customer-service, eligibility and billing systems working. The companies also installed a crisis management and communications system capable of supporting a full or partial business recovery if the worstcase scenario had unfolded.

"Our Y2K contingency plan worked flawlessly and now leaves us better prepared to face earthquake, flood, fire and many other possible catastrophic events with the potential to disrupt service," said William T. Ward, Delta's president and chief executive officer. "I'm not saying I'm glad we had to spend \$30 million on Y2K, but since the investment was necessary, it's good to know that the same planning necessitated by the millennium bug prepares us to undertake almost any kind of recovery effort."

Long before New Year approached, Delta, PMI and Delta Dental Insurance Company, a for-profit affiliate with major operations in 10 states, including Georgia, Florida and Texas, began its contingency planning effort. The companies updated employee phone trees, established crisis-command centers and issued regular updates to key personnel regarding the Y2K readiness of their facilities, data systems, applications and security.

"We felt the need to be ready in case all of the assurances that our computers could handle this were wrong," said Jerry Holcombe, Delta's chief information officer. "When you process nearly 60,000 claims a day and receive thousands of customer phone calls that rely on easy retrieval of information, there's no room for glitches. People depend on us for access to dental care, and they won't get that if our systems can't verify who they are and what their dentists are supposed to be paid."

Delta Dental Plan is California's largest dental plan with 12 million members, nearly one third of all Californians. The nonprofit dental-service corporation is also the parent company of PMI Dental Health Plan, one of California's largest dental HMOs, with more than 1 million enrollees, and of Delta Dental Insurance Company, with about 660,000 enrollees across the South and Southeastern United States. Consolidated revenues for Delta in 1999 are not yet finalized, but are projected at more than \$2.5 billion.

Back in Stride

Michael Jordan becomes minority owner and president of basketball operations for the NBA's Washington Wizards

Last week, the millennium introduced Michael Jordan, one

Jordan makes history once again, in the becoming the third minority African-American owner of the National Basketball Association, joining Edward and Bettiann Gardner of the Chicago Bulls and Ervin "Magic" Johnson of the Los Angeles Lakers.

According to ESPN, Jordan's deal with the Wizards requires an "out-of-pocket investment", but it is unknown exactly what percentage he will own.

ESPN's David Aldridge clarified Jordan's ownership role with the Wizards, reporting that he has acquired equity in the holding company which has a minority interest in the Wizards. That holding company, Lincoln Holdings, will have the right of first refusal to buy the remaining 56 percent of the team upon the death of Abe Pollin or Pollin's decision to sell what he currently owns. At that time, Jordan can buy additional shares in the company, but at no time will he have controlling interest in the Wizards.

Aldridge also reported that Jordan is simply a minority owner of a minority share

of the company. The holding company is Leonsis company. Leonsis is the owner of 44 percent of the Wizards. Jordan also will have an ownership stake in the NHL's Washington

Holdings.

This is not Jordan's first attempt to partown a NBA team. He tried to get a chunk of the Charlotte Hornets last year, but somehow, situations went sour and Jordan took his interests elsewhere.

The transaction could not come at a better

time for the Wizards, who is (at press time) ranked last in the Atlantic division in winning percentage a n d desperately in need of a turnaround.

In the

last 15 years, the Wizards h a v e

advanced to the playoffs only twice. Ironically, the last time the nation's capital was getting adapted to winning ways, Jordan spoiled the party and swept the {at that time} Washington Bullets out the playoffs in 1996-97.

Poor management decisions, bad draft picks, and lack of loyalty to players are just some of the qualities the organization has been known for. Most fans blame general manager Wes Unseld for Washington's never ending

misery. "Until we get everyone on track, everybody's disposable to some degree," Jordan said, opening many eyes in the press conference. "It's going to take some time for me to come in and evaluate what's here, what's going to stay here and what's going to leave."

Wizards forward Juwan Howard, who has fell under the media's negative criticism, stated, "If I'm not getting the job done, I hope Very bold statement from a guy that is, in reality, untradeable due his large contract and poor performance. His influence on the court should do Wizards rookie Richard Hamilton some good. Hamilton, the Wizards first round draft pick this past year from Connecticut, has struggled due to the team's negative attitude and performance as a whole. "The best way to evaluate a player is to look in his eyes and see how scared he is, and I've seen that," Jordan said

"I have an attitude about the way I play," Jordan said. "I have an attitude about the way I win."

Due to Jordan's attitude, he has six NBA championships to his credit, five more than the Wizards organization has achieved in their history. Without question, Jordan has excepted a challenge that will take time, smarts, patience, and effort — making the Washington Wizards a consistently winning organization.

"I will be here for as much time as it takes to turn this team around," Jordan said.



The liquid voice behind Ol' Dirty's latest single "Baby I got your money" brought a much needed melody to Dirty's insane flow.


The debut album by Kelis, titled *Kaleidoscope* is a refreshing take on R&B, its an interesting blend of pop, hip hop, and neosoul.

For each girl, the same dramatic experience involving her father affects her in two different ways. One refuses to be loved, while the other accepts love from any source -- male or female.


Walker takes a post-modern approach in this novel, as she jumps around from story



At the southern tip of limbo: Around Town 2 local photo exhibits

Two photo exibits in the city represent the precarious position African Americans have occupied in Richmond since the 1880's.

The Valentine Museum hosts "Strength and Pride: Portraits of African-American Men," a series of hardly less than somber photographs highlighting the experiences of African-American men in the city.

Coarse images of cotton picking in the 1890's and an ironically unsmiling 1888 celebration of Emancipation Day, however, give way to images that are less grating to the viewer. Like the infamous "Neverrett's Place" in the historic Jackson Ward and the debonair "Polk Miller's Old South Quartet" of 1910. Luckily, even gentler to the touch are the images on display at the Black History Museum's latest exhibit, "4 Views of Color in Black and White." The balancing exhibit is the collective work of local artist Debra Dilworth, Regina H. Boone, Theodore Holmes, and P.H. Polk whose words explain the significance of the exhibit. "Anybody can take a snapshot, but it takes an artist to make a picture." Plain folks and some not-so-plain folks create the artistry of this exhibit. And they find a compelling place, particularly before Polk's lens. Bill "Bojangles" Robinson hangs out at a baseball game dressed to the nines while "the Boss," a 1933 subject dressed in her apron and head kerchief, stands poised for action with hands on buxom hips. Nowhere is this limbo-likes position of African-Americans more apparent than in Regina

Boone's renderings of youth. The shyness of Boone's subject in "First Day of School" balances her bold goggled swimmer in "Splash Master." Theodore Holmes adds the soundtrack of these images with his music theme photos like the beginning trumpet student in "Learning to Play the Trumpet" and "Kids Band in the Park" which shows a group of young street musicians performing. Debra Dilwoth's more experimental images are clearly more than snapshots from her multiple exposures of herself to "Imani," a grinning youngster whose eyes beckon the viewer to stay a moment, and the collage-like "Love Letters." While this exhibit leaves the Museum on January 23, there is a permanent collection upstairs as well as a new chronicling the Middle Passage opening on February 5 at the Black History Museum.

The museum is located at 1015 E. Clay Street and is open from 11-4 Tuesday through Saturday. The \$3.00 student admission covers the Museum's main exhibit as well as the permanent galleries. For further information, call 780-9093.

The Valentine will host "Strength and Pride..." in the Stern Gallery through April 30. Located at 1015 E. Clay Street, the Valentine is open from 10-5 Monday through Saturday and Sunday from 12-5. Which brings me to you.




1865, they pass the 15th


