





Hurricane Katrina dealt a devastating blow to the citizens in Louisiana and Mississippi. This storm, plus Rita and Wilma, affected the entire gulf coast area from Florida to Texas. Especially in Mississippi and Louisiana, many dentists lost their homes, offices and personal possessions. In addition, dentists' practices suffered as people were dispersed to other towns and states. Recovery will take years.

Dentistry is working hard to help dentists and patients in the affected areas. The American Dental Association Foundation has set up a Disaster Response Fund to assist dentists affected by these hurricanes. Over 1.6 million dollars have been raised to provide grants to dentists who have sustained major damage to their practice and/or home.

State dental associations, including Virginia, have contributed aid to the affected state dental associations, dentists, and the Louisiana State University Dental School, which had to move into temporary quarters. On November 14, students at the VCU School of Dentistry held a fund raiser for dental students affected by Katrina. The Virginia Dental Association, with the help of the Texas and Louisiana Dental Associations, the ADA Foundation, and others will conduct a Mission of Mercy (MOM) project in New Orleans from February 6-11.

Much more effort and money will be needed to aid affected dentists, dental schools, dental associations and people who have dental need. To help, you can contribute to the ADA Foundation Disaster Fund or the Virginia Dental Health Foundation. You can also volunteer your dental talent in the New Orleans MOM Project..

Message From the President

By the time you read this note, we will have celebrated the New Year and hurdled into the 2006 General Assembly Session. Advocacy is always a high priority for your VDA officers and staff and many of our efforts are devoted to protecting your interests in Richmond. While there are no huge pressing issues bubbling to the forefront today, each Session has a tendency to generate its own unique brand of excitement. So I hope that every member considers participating in this important part of our Association.

We are extremely lucky to have Chuck Duvall as our lobbyist, who will be looking out for our interests in the Legislature. Along with Terry Dickinson, you can be sure that we are monitoring the issues important to you, our members. We will be following several issues very closely through this session of the General Assembly. These include a licensure issue, funding for a building addition to VCU's School of Dentistry, preserving Medicaid reimbursements rates and monitoring a bill authorizing enabling legislation for dental hygienists to administer local anesthesia and nitrous oxide.

At a recent Virginia Board of Dentistry meeting a question was raised concerning the proper posting of licenses at our MOM Projects. The VDA is taking the lead on this issue and has introduced a bill to bring the Code of Virginia up to current practice in this important area. We hope that each of you will consider participating in a MOM project this year and our bill will clarify that charitable projects such as these have a manageable posting requirement that is not an inconvenience or burden to those who are generously giving of their time and talents.

Dean Hunt from VCU's School of Dentistry is leading the charge to get an addition to the current dental school fully funded at the MCV Campus. Our Lobbyist, Staff, and other VDA members have worked with Dr. Revere and Dean Hunt as we have attempted to raise the level of interest in the project with the powers that be in Richmond, and we will do all we can to help this addition get state funding.

Last year, the VDA was very successful in our efforts to obtain an unequaled 30% increase in Medicaid reimbursements for our Commonwealth's needy children. During this session, every effort will be made to preserve that increase. To those of you who have signed up with the new Doral program, we say thank you! All early indicators are indicative of a tremendous success in the total improvement of this revamped program. Other states are looking to Virginia's achievement as a model to increase access for this needy population. We must continue to sign up more providers or risk losing the progress we have worked so hard to achieve. If you have not signed up to be a Medicaid provider, please take this opportunity to do your part to help those less fortunate children among us.

The 2005 VDA House of Delegates adopted a new policy changing our position on the administration of local anesthesia and nitrous oxide by dental hygienists. The Board of Directors has reviewed some language for code revisions that will be included in a bill. Our hope is that the VDA can work together with all communities of interest on a bill that clearly reflects the interests of our members.

The VDA and the ADA will continue to be the voice of Dentistry on the congressional, state legislative and state board of dentistry levels. Each level has its unique challenges and each requires that you our members participate in the process. We work hard to ensure that policymakers hear dentistry's voice when they address issues that affect the profession. But our lobbyist and staff can not do it all. We need you to do your part to ensure our success. Please join our team and help influence legislative decisions that affect you. You can help by volunteering to attend our VDA Day on the Hill (January 20th), by getting involved on behalf of a candidate for the Legislature or Congress and by increasing your level of giving to VADPAC/ADPAC. By working together and building on our successes we can improve the oral health of all Virginians while advancing our profession.

New Orleans—Calling all volunteers!

Dentists, dental hygienists, dental assistants, dental laboratory technicians and dental office staff can be a part of what could be the largest-ever medical and dental health fair in history—helping up to 6,000 patients receive free dental care in hurricane-devastated New Orleans Feb. 6-11, 2006.

The Virginia, Kansas and Texas dental associations and the Alamance Dental Foundation of North Carolina, who already conduct Mission of Mercy dental clinics in their home states, have joined together to manage the dental care portion of the health fair and the ADA Foundation has provided a \$50,000 grant for the project. Organizers hope to fill 125 dental chairs each day, providing muchneeded dental care to up to 6,000 patients during the six-day event

Patients will include Medicaid enrollees, uninsured, underinsured and temporary citizens who have come to New Orleans to help rebuild and may be in need of care. "A few months ago, there was an outpouring of volunteers who wanted to help but could find nowhere to go after the hurricane," says Dr. Terry Dickinson, executive director of the Virginia Dental Association. "Through the Mission of Mercy, this is the chance to help. Come for one day, come for all the days, get in the heart of where it all happened and help some folks—give them a little extra boost."

Working with a huge logistical challenge, to say the least, the clinic, billed as possibly the largest ever free medical and dental clinic, expects to treat more than 10,000 with a variety of health care services. Still in the planning stages, coordinators hope to secure a clinic site in the next few days.

Volunteers, says Dr. Dickinson, may or may not have the benefit of amenities like hotel lodgings but they will have a place to bed down in sleeping bags or cots (a worstcase scenario) and they will have all meals provided.

"All volunteers have to do is get here," he says. The dental

clinic will require the services of at least 100 dentists each day, as well as support staff. Senior dental students from Virginia Commonwealth University School of Dentistry will also be attending, Dr. Dickinson adds, helping students see how important it is to give back to the profession and helping volunteers to serve as mentors "and to see what a great future the profession has." "We always get more out of the MOM projects than the patients do," he says. "It's a great way for us to show the public what a great profession we have."

A \$50,000 grant from the ADA Foundation, as well as donations of equipment and supplies from a variety of donors will support the MOM clinic. Dr. Ron Lamb of World Dental Relief in Oklahoma has offered the planners all the anesthetic needed for the clinic but program organizers are still seeking donations of other needed dental supplies.

"The ADA Foundation is pleased to support this upcoming major health fair in New Orleans," says Arthur A. Dugoni, ADAF president. "We salute Terry Dickinson and the Virginia Dental Health Foundation's MOM Project for taking the lead on this project and for their outreach to the victims of the devastating hurricanes."

Registrations can be completed electronically or forms can be printed out, filled in and faxed to the VDA. Volunteers must also send a copy of their valid board of dentistry license to the VDA to participate.





Employment Practice Liability Insurance and ERISA Fiduciary Regulations

What every dental office should know about these important employment issues.

At every dental office, one of the most valuable resources is your employees. They help to shape the patient's experience at your office and finding and retaining a good employee is an essential part of your business.

As all employers know, part of having employees is providing them with a comfortable work environment and offering benefits that they will find valuable. But what many employers may not realize is that having employees also exposes them to certain types of risks including lawsuits over employment practices and fiduciary responsibility for employee benefits plans. This is why it is important for each employer to consider Employment Practice Liability Insurance and Fiduciary Liability Insurance.

Employment Practice Liability Insurance

With more and more lawsuits being filed each year, employers need protection from suits arising from employment issues such as discrimination, harassment and employee dismissal.

The first step in limiting your practice's liability is to define specific employment practices for applications, hiring, firing, outlining job descriptions, discrimination and harassment. Clearly document your policies and have employees and potential employees sign a form to acknowledge their receipt and understanding of these practices. Providing education to your employees about issues like sexual harassment and discrimination in the workplace is another prevention tool. ¹

Even with all of these safety measures in place, it is still wise to consider an Employment Practice Liability Insurance policy for your office. This type of coverage may be included in your malpractice or other office coverage, but often times it is sold as a stand-alone product. If you have determined that you do not have coverage, you can evaluate a separate policy that can provide coverage for litigation costs and also claims settlements. ²

ERISA

Another important aspect of being an employer is ensuring compliance under ERISA regulations. If your office offers an employee benefits plan, there are certain regulations you must comply with under the ERISA Act of 1974. This includes having an ERISA Bond that is equal to at least 10% of your plan's assets in order to provide protection for the plan's participants. ³

In addition to these mandated bonds, you may also wish to consider additional protection if you are the fiduciary for your benefit plan. By being the fiduciary of your benefits plan, your personal assets may be at risk should there be an issue such as neglecting to notify employees about benefits, etc. While the bonds are mandated to protect your plan from fraud, they may not limit your personal liability under ERISA. With Fiduciary Liability Insurance, you are able to protect your personal assets from a lawsuit arising from an issue with employee benefits. ⁴

Elections 2005: New Year, New Faces

The 2006 General Assembly and State Offices welcome back many existing members, and look forward to starting fresh with new faces. In the General Assembly's House of Delegates, many of the previous year's legislators return, and fourteen individuals begin to serve their first term. Of these fifteen new delegates, three individuals were able to defeat incumbents (a task that very few are able to accomplish), ten defeated their opposition for open seats, and one, Jennifer McClellan, celebrated a less stressful unopposed win.

The Republican Party continues its reign as the House majority party – a reign that was previously held by Democrats for over a century. However, for the first time since 1943, Virginia Democrats have picked up House seats in two consecutive election cycles. The Democratic Party also held the majority in the Freshman Class.

The Virginia Dental Association is pleased to know that the majority of candidates whose campaigns VADPAC contributed to were elected to the Virginia House of Delegates. The Virginia Dental Association's political action committee contributed to the campaigns of eight of the fifteen candidates running for election this past November. As for the State Offices, VADPAC contributed equally to both sides of the aisle, and is pleased with the outcome.

Below please find a short introduction to the newly elected legislators and state officials. If you are a constituent of one of the newly elected, take the opportunity to introduce yourself and the Virginia Dental Association to the individual. Members of the General Assembly, especially freshman, look to others to educate them about legislation and who they can turn to should they need advice about the subject in the future. Become the person the legislator looks to when he or she has a question about dental and healthcare issues!

Introducing the 2006 New Leaders of the Commonwealth:

House of Delegates:

Anne Crockett-Stark – Republican – District 6

Counties of Bland, Giles (part), Pulaski (part), Tazewell (part), and Wythe (part)

Presently serving on the State Board of Virginia Association of Counties, Ms. Crockett-Stark is only one of three freshmen to defeat an incumbent candidate in the elections. Ms. Crockett-Stark is a committed advocate for children and community service. She was the first woman to be elected to Wytheville Town Council and in 1980 she won the National Jaycee-ette Women in Government Award for Local Government. Ms. Crockett-Stark has just completed thirteen years on the Mt. Rogers Mental Health and

Substance Abuse Board. Ms. Crockett-Stark defeated incumbent Democrat Benny Keister for District 6.

Todd Gilbert - Republican - District 15

Counties of Page, Rappahannock, Rockingham (part), and Shenandoah

Currently serving as the Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney for the County of Shenandoah (1999-Present), Mr. Gilbert has just been elected to represent District 15 in the House of Delegates. Mr. Gilbert was previously Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney for the City of Lynchburg (1997-1999). The delegate hopes to fix the transportation crisis and give Virginia better funding for its educational system. Mr. Gilbert is replacing outgoing Del. Allen Louderback.

Matt Lohr - Republican - District 26

County of Rockingham (part); City of Harrisonburg
A self-employed farmer, Mr. Lohr epitomizes the conventional character of the Old Dominion. David Poisson - Democrat - District 32

County of Loudoun (part)

President and attorney for Jenkins Hill Partners LC, Mr. Poisson enjoys the privilege of being one of three new freshmen to defeat an incumbent candidate in the House races. Mr. Poisson's key issues to work on are reforming the way education is organized, delivered and financed; improving the state's transportation infrastructure, and attracting new businesses to Virginia. Mr. Poisson has never run for any elected or appointed office before, but was still able to defeat incumbent candidate Del. Richard Black.

David Bulova - Democrat - District 37

County of Fairfax (part); City of Fairfax
As a Senior Planner for the AMEC, Earth and
Environment, Mr. Bulova will represent District 37 in
2006. Mr. Bulova's major issues for Virginia include
improving transportation, education, crime prevention and
public safety. Mr. Bulova has been a member of the
Northern Virginia Soil and Water Conservation Board of
Directors (2003-Present), Fairfax County Consumer
Protection Commission (1996-Present), Virginia
Chesapeake Bay Local Assistance Board (2004-Present),
and the Virginia Citizens Wetland Advisory Committee
(1997). Mr. Bulova will be filling an open seat previously
held by Chap Peterson.

David Marsden – Democrat – District 41 County of Fairfax (part) A juvenile justice consultant for the Development Services Group, Inc., Mr. Marsden looks forward to representing his constituents. Mr. Marsden's top Virginia priorities are: keeping the pace with the transportation crisis, maintaining the quality of Virginia schools, and maintaining public safety by confronting the rising threat of youth gangs. Mr. Marsden was previously the Chief Deputy of the Virginia Department of Juvenile Justice (2000-2001, Acting Director 2001-2002), member of the State Juvenile Justice Advisory Group (2001-2002), and a member of Comprehensive Services Act State Planning and Management Team (2001-2002). Mr. Marsden will be replacing James H. Dillard II's open seat.

David Englin - Democrat - District 45

Counties of Arlington (part) and Fairfax (part); City of Alexandria (part)

A self-proclaimed writer, activist, and consultant, Mr. Englin will represent the 45th District. Mr. Englin's top three issues he believes Virginia needs to work on are: providing affordable housing to lower income families, providing quality and affordable health care, and fixing and funding education for children. Mr. Englin has previously served as a member of the Alexandria Affordable Housing Committee (2003-Present) and as a Commissioned Officer for the United States Air Force (1996-2004). County of Henrico (part); City of Richmond (part)
Regulatory Counsel for Verizon, Ms. McClellan was able to
ease into her unopposed open seat. Ms. McClellan's top
Virginia priorities include living up to the promise in the
state constitution of free high quality education for all
school children, ensuring the safety of Virginia public safety officials (police, firefighters, EMTs, etc.), and improving
the transportation system in the Commonwealth. Ms.
McClellan will be replacing retiring Viola Baskerville.

A. Donald McEachin - Democrat - District 74

Counties of Charles City, Henrico (part), and Prince George (part); Cities of Hopewell (part) and Richmond (part)
Attorney for the McEachin Law Firm, Donald McEachin will be representing Virginia's District 74. Mr. McEachin looks forward to helping fix the problems with gang violence in the inner-cities, and hopes to increase funding of the educational system and transportation. Mr. McEachin's previous political campaigns include a run for Virginia Attorney General in 2001, 1991 House of Delegates, and 1995-1999 House of Delegates for the 74th District. Mr. McEachin will be filling the open seat held by Floyd H. Miles.

Roslyn Tyler - Democrat - District 75

Counties of Brunswick (part), Greensville, Isle of Wight (part), Lunenburg (part), Southampton (part), and Sussex; Cities of Emporia and Franklin (part)

A physical therapist for the Southern Virginia Regional Medical Center, Roslyn Tyler defies the conventional backgrounds of delegates. Ms. Tyler's top Virginia priorities are: improving the educational system, more affordable health care, and economic development. Previously a member of the Sussex County Board of Supervisors (1985-1996), John Tyler Community College Board (1995-2003), District 19's Community Health Board (1996-2003), and currently a member of Sussex County Board of Social Services (2004-Present), Ms Tyler continues on her path to helping Virginians at a greater level. Ms. Tyler will be replacing J. Paul Councill, Jr.'s open seat in District 75.

City of Virginia Beach (part)

His top three Virginia priorities are: improving transportation maintenance with necessary funding, improving the water quality in the Chesapeake Bay, and funding the Virginia Standards of Quality for our school systems. Mr. Wittman was a member of Montross's Town Council from 1986-1992, and was Montross's mayor from 1992-1995. Mr. Wittman will be filling the open seat held by Albert Pollard.

State Offices:

Governor - Tim Kaine - Democrat

Elected to the position of Lieutenant Governor in 2001, Tim Kaine is an experienced leader whose career focuses on strong values and expanding opportunity for families. Tim Kaine defeated Republican candidate Jerry Kilgore in a surprising landslide victory. As Governor, Tim Kaine hopes to follow in the steps of his predecessor Mark Warner. Kaine's main issues for his term as Governor include a commitment to furthering the Commonwealth's economic progress keeping a stable financial environment, helping small businesses succeed, saving family farms, fostering competitive regional economies, tapping the strength of Virginia's tourism attractions and preserving its natural resources. Tim Kaine is also committed to fixing and funding the educational system and the transportation crisis. Governor Kaine is dedicated to providing more affordable health care, promoting fiscal responsibility, improving public safety and solving the problem of youth gangs. Lieutenant Governor - Bill Bolling - Republican

In an election year that favored Democrats, Bill Bolling received more votes than any other statewide Republican candidate. Bill Bolling's goals for the future of Virginia include working to keep taxes low and make certain that state government remains focused on its core responsibilities – providing the best possible educational opportunities for our children; keeping our neighborhoods, communities and schools safe from the threat of crime; building a transportation system for the 21st century; quality health care for every Virginian; and responsible efforts to preserve and protect Virginia's important environmental and natural resources.

Attorney General - Bob McDonnell - Republican

To be known as the closest statewide race in Virginia history, Bob McDonnell narrowly succeeded over Creigh Deeds. The margin of votes between the candidates prior to the recount was 323 votes out of nearly two million votes case – a .01% margin. The recount results showed a margin of 360. Bob McDonnell had represented the 84th District of Virginia in the House of Delegates since 1992. Prior to being elected to the House of Delegates, Bob served as a criminal prosecutor in the Virginia Beach Commonwealth's Attorneys office. Mr. McDonnell based his platform on protecting Virginia's youth from sexually violent predators, fighting the war on drugs, curbing frivolous lawsuits, protecting Virginia from terrorist threats, and protecting private property rights.

Candidates to Watch:

Presidential Race 2008 – George Allen (R) & Mark Warner (D)

In the upcoming election years, keep an eye on Republican U.S. Sen. George Allen and outgoing Democratic Gov. Mark Warner – both of which are exceptionally formidable candidates running for President in 2008. Both Warner and Allen have the qualities and reputations needed to make it through their own party's primaries and off to the White House. Sen. George Allen has been a member of the U.S. Senate representing Virginia for four years now, and prior to that he was Governor of the Commonwealth, as well as a US Representative. Gov. Mark Warner has been Governor of the Commonwealth for the last four years, during which time Virginia was named the "Best Governed State in the United States" by the Government Performance Project. Governor Warner was also recently named one of "America's Best Five Governors" by TIME Magazine. Clayton Roberts, President and Executive Director of Virginia FREE (a non-partisan political research organization), said about Allen and Warner, "You know, they say Virginia's the 'Mother of Presidents,' and I think she's pregnant again."

Why Does "Every Vote Count"?

Virginia's 2005 Elections proved, once again, the utmost importance of voting. This election year, like few others, made history. The striving candidates for Attorney General and House District 68 were drawn into tedious recounts and political criticism.

Attorney General:

Already known as the closest statewide race in Virginia history, candidates Creigh Deeds (D) and Bob McDonnell (R) are both eager to earn the title of the Commonwealth's Attorney General. At the end of Election Day on November 8th, the General Election tally showed the Republican McDonnell up by a little over 300 votes to Creigh Deeds. Though 300 votes may not sound like a truly close race, the 300 are out of nearly two million votes cast – that's a .01% vote margin between the candidates. On November 28th, the State Board of Elections certified the General Election Tally's results – putting McDonnell as the winner by 323 votes. The following day Deeds called for a recount. Thomas Markow, chief judge for the Richmond Circuit Court, set a date for the recount to take place by a three-judge panel on December 20th. The results of the recount awarded Bob McDonnell the seat of Attorney General. The margin of votes was 360.

House District 68:

In another Virginia race this past election year, Independent candidate Katherine Waddell and Republican incumbent Brad Marrs squared off for House District 68. At the end of Election Day, Waddell was up by a little over 100 votes – a lead that slowly dwindled away as votes were reexamined. The final tally showed Waddell up by only 38 votes out of 26,886 votes cast. Brad Marrs called for a recount to take place after November 28th's certifications. Like the recount for the Attorney General, Judge Markow set the date of District 68's recount to take place on the 20th of December. The Recount results showed no change whatsoever, and Katherine Waddell captured the 68 district from incumbent Brad Marrs.

Landmark Votes in American History:

1800: Thomas Jefferson was elected as the third president of the United States by one vote in the Electoral College (at that time the Electoral College decided who became the next President).

- **1824:** John Quincy Adams likewise won the Presidency by one electoral vote (Andrew Jackson; however, did carry the popular vote).
- **1845:** Texas was admitted to the Union as a state by one vote.
- **1850:** California was admitted to the Union by a one vote margin.
- 1859: Oregon became a state by a margin of one vote.
- **1876:** Rutherford B. Hayes was tied in electoral votes for President. After a recount of the popular vote, Hayes won the Presidency by one vote.
- 1889: Washington became a state by a one vote victory.
- 1890: Idaho gained statehood by one vote.

Landmark Votes in Virginia History:

- 1847: Whig Party's Thomas Flournoy defeated
 Democratic candidate Treadway 650 to 649 in the race for US House of Representatives in the 3rd
 District of Virginia.
- 1882: In another election for US House of Representatives for the 1st District of Virginia, Robert Mayo (R) slid by George Garrison (D) 10,505 to 10,504.
- 1991: In the 53rd House of Delegates District of Virginia, Jim Scott (D) narrowly prevailed over David Saunders (R) 6,493 to 6,492 after a recount of the vote.
- 1991: Also in 1991, in the 58th District of the House of Delegates candidates Tim Lindstrom (D) and Peter Way (R) were in a dead even tie in the general election tally (an exceptionally rare occurrence). Only after a recount was performed, did Republican Peter Way overcome Democrat Tim Lindstrom by a margin of only seven votes.

Need more proof that every single vote counts? Take a look around your offices, neighborhoods, grocery stores. Look at each individual you may pass; look in the mirror. The person you see in front of you may have cast that deciding vote – the vote that celebrated victories, the vote that signaled defeats, the vote... that made history.



and makes clear to other patients who may overhear the conversation that such comments will be taken seriously. Second, it has the additional benefit of decreasing the likelihood that other patients who overhear the comments will be inclined to mimic the same behaviors. Third, if the doctor or office manager are brought into the discussion, they have the opportunity to resolve the misunderstanding or address the patient's concerns at the earliest possible moment, not when the patient doesn't show up for a subsequent appointment or suddenly stops making payments.

There's a fourth advantage to staff intervention when patients make sarcastic comments. Experts warn that some individuals are incapable of addressing and dealing with their own anger. This type of patient may make unkind or hostile comments and, when called on their comments, assert that they were only joking. It is to the dentist's advantage to be told about this kind of behavior as soon as possible—since staff members are more often the target of these comments. They may seem to accept advice or to commit to an action plan only to disappear part way through treatment. Or they may become angry or uncooperative without apparent justification. For this reason, multi-phase treatment plans should always include detailed written informed consent confirmation of the patient's participation in, and agreement to, the treatment.

Another sign of potentially uncooperative or hostile behavior becomes apparent when patients miss appointments, frequently cancel at the last minute, or consistently arrive late. These patients cause scheduling conflicts. Their tardiness forces doctors to fall behind, negatively affecting staff as well as other patients. Every dental practice should have a written policy that defines the no-show, frequent cancellations, and late arrival behaviors that might trigger patient dismissal. One final benefit to staff identification of inappropriate patient comments is also related to the issue of patient dismissal. When the doctor and other members of the clinical team have been warned about a patient's negative comments, they can be more proactive in the way they interact with the patient, including the documentation of: a) patient education; b) informed consent; c) referrals; d) offers of second opinions; e) non-compliance; and f) other components of the dental treatment plan.

Forewarned is forearmed.

With adequate staff preparation, the dental team will be forewarned about patients who may be unwilling or unable to act as cooperative members of their dental healthcare team.






Oral Cancer Malpractice Claims Increasing

Of all malpractice claims filed against dentists, the most expensive are claims alleging "failure to diagnose oral cancer," according to Cliff Rapp, writing in the June 2005 issue of Today's FDA, the journal of the Florida Dental Association. In addition, such claims are among the most difficult to defend, he writes.

Analyzing the closed claim data of the Physician Insurer's Association of America, Rapp found that oral cancer claims are on the rise nationwide. Those cases deemed indefensible tend to fall into three categories: failure to biopsy; failure to re-examine a lesion and the patient's medical history; and office-system failure, allowing diagnostic reports to fall through the cracks.

"Dentists should view all lesions, lumps and bumps as possible cancer," Rapp advises, adding that early detection and ample documentation are crucial. He also notes that dentists should "closely monitor patients who have suspicious lesions until a definitive diagnosis is made."







In case you heard what sounded like "party noise" in the background yesterday, I wanted to clue you in that it was just all of us in the coastal states celebrating the "official" end of the hurricane season.

Over these past three months I have personally heard from many of you and I just wanted to share a brief update as well as once again thank you for the incredible support. These have been very trying days for our team. The clean up and rebuilding is in full force, but the emotional toll and drain on resources has been to say the least, challenging. Without cluttering your mind with a bunch of numbers, let me just say that we have been trying to assist roughly 20% of our members who have potentially been affected by the impact of the storm. We know that 54 of our dentists lost their homes, offices or both. The total devastation remains mind boggling.

The emotional roller coaster has been just that for most of us — up and down. At times you are heart broken and crying for a member who is describing their loss to you and then other moments are the comedic ones that help you stay focused......like the morning I woke up looking like the "Michelin Man" due to a deflated air mattress I was sleeping on at the office. I was so engulfed by the mattress; I could not even turn over! But that is how life is - tragedy and comedy.... and this experience has been no exception to that.

Updates from the Board of Dentistry:

The following actions were taken by the Board at its recent meeting on December 9th, 2005.

- 1) License Renewal Fees: Based upon current deficiencies that require the Board to increase license fees (the 10% rule which states that if expenses exceed revenue for any licensing agency, that agency shall increase its fee structure to alleviate that deficit. On the other hand, if a point is reached where revenues exceed expenses, that agency shall reduce its licensing fees to erase that surplus.), it approved raising the licensing fees to \$420 and the renewal fee to \$315 for dentists. This is mainly due to a large increase in discipline cases requiring extensive use of DHP investigator personnel. It is projected that it will take 2 years under the new fee structure to erase the existing and projected deficits.
- 2) Drug Act: The Virginia Dental Association will support legislation to be introduced by the Virginia Dental Hygienists Association concerning the administration of local anesthetic to those over 18 years old and of the administration of nitrous oxide to patients, both under the direction (direct supervision) of a licensed dentist. The Board of Dentistry is supportive of the proposal with the exception of the age limit on local anesthesia.
- 3) Patient Record Keeping: In regards to updating patient records, the Board produced an advisory opinion stating that records were to be updated at least once annually if the patient was seen at least once a year. For patients who are seen less often than one year, their records are to be updated every visit. Obviously, there are medical situations where the frequency would be increased based upon the decision of the treating dentist.
- 4) Dental Assistants: The Board of Dentistry will seek legislation similar in nature to that passed recently by the VDA House of Delegates allowing for expanded duties for dental assistants. Under their proposal, dental assistants would be classified into two levels I- chair side and II- expanded duty assistant. The chair side assistant is your typical, uncertified dental assistant. The assistant with expanded duties (to be determined) would be a C.D.A. (Certified Dental Assistant) and would have to undergo further training and certification to earn the extra level of qualification.

VCU School of Dentistry Students Poised to Act on Legislative Day

In an effort to strengthen ties between the School of Dentistry and VDA, while speaking to issues that will be part of the legislative agenda, students from the School of Dentistry will partner with VDA dentists to educate Virginia Delegates and Senators about an important piece of legislation on Legislative Day. The School is linking students, their elected representatives and, VDA dentists to provide the elected officials with comprehensive information about the funding for a new addition to the School of Dentistry.

Because the Commonwealth has a 1-time surplus that the Governor is committing to capital projects, the School has the opportunity to secure funding (\$11.75 million) for a new addition to the Wood and Lyons buildings. This new addition provides 1 floor of clinics and class space to increase dental class enrollments from 90 to 100 and dental hygiene class enrollments from 20 to 40 students. The additional space will also provide one floor dedicated to research.

Dr. Terry Dickinson spoke to students in late November to encourage their participation in the Legislative Day. To date 35 have agreed to be at the Capitol on January 20, but the School is hoping many more will seize the opportunity. By learning about the political process and participating, students will gain first hand knowledge and experience about democracy in action, help improve oral health for Virginians and get to network with other dentists.

Board of Directors Actions in Brief

The following actions were taken at the November 11, 2005 meeting of the Board and are reported as information only:

- 1. The 2005-2006 Board of Directors Awards Subcommittee was appointed:

- 2. House of Delegates Resolution 5 regarding supragingival scaling as a delegable duty to dental assistants was referred to the Workforce Taskforce.
- 3. A motion was made, seconded and approved to support legislation amending § 54.1-3408 with the Board's recommended changes.

The following language was proposed by the VDHA.

- § 54.1-3408. Professional use by practitioners.
- J. A dentist may cause Schedule VI topical drugs to be administered under his direction and supervision by either a dental hygienist or by an authorized agent of the dentist.

A dentist may authorize a dental hygienist under direction direct supervision to administer Schedule VI local anesthesia to patients over the age of 18, and nitrous oxide and oxygen inhalation analgesia. The Board of Dentistry shall establish by regulations the education and training requirements under which a dental hygienist may administer such drugs.

Further, pursuant to a written order and in accordance with a standing protocol issued by the dentist in the course of his professional practice, a dentist may authorize a dental hygienist under his general supervision, as defined in § 54.1-2722, to possess and administer topical oral fluorides, topical oral anesthetics, topical and directly applied antimicrobial agents for treatment of periodontal pocket lesions, as well as any other Schedule VI topical drug approved by the Board of Dentistry.

The above language with changes will be sent back to the Virginia Dental Hygiene Association for their consideration.

Dr. Eugene Kanter was honored at our annual meeting. He received the prestigious Simmons Award. This award is presented to a colleague for years of distinguished service to our component.






Report from the Virginia Department of Health, Division of Dental Health, Karen C. Day, D.D.S., M.P.H., Director

Effective July 1, 2005 the 2005 General Assembly approved increased funding from \$25,000 to \$325,000 per fiscal year for the Dental Scholarship and Dentist Loan Repayment Programs. Division of Dental Health (DDH) at the Virginia Department of Health administers these programs. This school year DDH has already allocated funding for 14 dental students at Virginia Commonwealth University School of Dentistry. The program pays the dental student one year of in-state tuition and fees for each year of obligation in an area of need to be completed upon graduation. With the increased funding, the Dentist Loan Repayment Program will be implemented for the first time this year. The program is limited to individuals with dental school debt who are within five years of graduation from an accredited dental school. Funds are provided to dentists who meet this and other criteria for one year of service in a dental area of need. Dr. Elizabeth Barrett, who is currently supervising the health promotion unit for the Division of Dental Health will also be managing these programs.
