WHO IS OUR COMPETITOR?

In a service club magazine there recently appeared an article wherein the writer considered the question which forms the caption of this editorial. With clear and arresting illustrations is pointed out the human tendency to restricted vision, the jealous concentration on those near things which we regard as a menace to our prosperity and which blind us while something of far greater import comes sweeping from without our range of vision to leave utter ruin in its wake. For instance, it is observed that the liveryman or blacksmith of a short while ago regarded as his competitor the fellow liveryman or blacksmith of the next block and jealously guarded his interest against this apparent menace to his prosperity. But all the while there was sweeping toward him his true and most formidable competitor. The motor industry, with new ideas in transportation, all but erased a demand for his handicraft.

While the necessity for alertness to all progressive ideas was particularly directed to the business man, the professional man might well ponder the admonition and its application. Our real competitor is not the fellow practitioner of our city, possibly a man with no greater vision than our own, but those new ideas in dentistry which may swish by us both if we are heedless to the demands of progress.

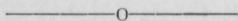
Another annual meeting of our Association is close upon us, and some of us have not attended the meetings for a number of years. If we attend this one we will find that dentistry has some new ideas for our benefit. Even though we have read the dental periodicals and thus attempted to keep abreast of developments, it will be impossible to talk casually with men gathered at the meeting and keep

away from new and better ideas. No matter whether we be mature and feel that our experience is full or newly in practice with the fresh remembrance of our college instruction, we have a need for a comparison of our usual practices with those of others. "*Tempus do fugit*" and "The world do move."

That man who most feels that he cannot afford to attend dental meetings is the man who most of all cannot afford to absent himself. And his urgency is but slightly less than the man who feels that he does not need the aid there offered.

Let us not be blinded by the small problems that loom so large as a balk to attendance. The presentation by our Association of the newest ideas makes dental progress our ally instead of our competitor. Think it over!

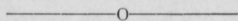

NEW DENTAL LAW

The new law, regulating the practice of dentistry in Virginia, has been signed by the Governor and will become effective sixty days after the adjournment of the General Assembly.

The new law, though more drastic in its measures than the old, is considered a splendid law and very fitting to the present needs of dentistry. Its most important changes pertain to the regulation of advertising, dental laboratories and corporations.

JAMES ORLANDO HODGKIN

1853—1929

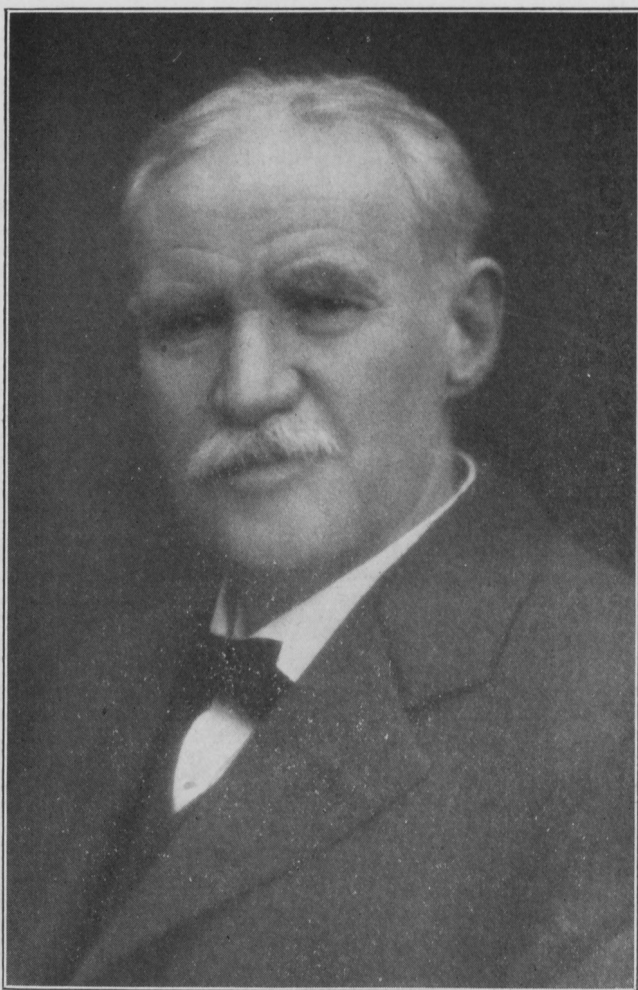
Dr. Hodgkin was born at Brentsville, Prince William County, Va., September 3, 1853, a son of William Fletcher and Caroline Taylor Hodgkin, and moved with his parents to Warrenton, Va., in 1857, where he grew up and spent most of his life. Many incidents occurring during the Civil War were indelibly impressed upon his boyish mind, and he often related some in which he was an actor. Upon one occasion, he, being sent on an errand to a neighbor (Dr. Stevens), was caught between the lines of a skirmish between some of Mosby's men and a Federal party, went scampering home a much frightened lad, while bullets went whistling about him. On another occasion he furnished considerable amusement to some of Pope's forces, one of which loaded a pipe with tobacco and powder and invited him to have a smoke. He accepted with the result which they expected. He never smoked afterwards. He recalled with distinctness the roar of the cannon which he heard during the Second Battle of Manassas.

In 1868, he entered the Marr School in Warrenton, conducted by Mr. James Marr, who was a brother of Captain John Quincy Marr, and remained there until 1872, when he, together with Dr. D. N. Rust, entered the office of his uncle, Dr. Jas. B. Hodgkins, in Alexandria, and took up the study of dentistry. Dr. J. B. Hodgkin was during the war a member of Pickett's Division and afterwards a Professor in the Baltimore College of Dental Surgery. After two years in his uncle's office, he entered the Baltimore College of Dental Surgery, and graduated in 1875. He first began practice in Washington, D. C., but upon a visit to his mother in Warrenton, a year later, he found so much practice and a more congenial surrounding in his home town he decided to locate there, and there he successfully practiced for fifty-three years. While in his uncle's office in Alexandria, he met Miss Roberta Day, daughter of Dr. Wm. B. Day, of Dranesville, Fairfax County, who was at that time attending Miss Tibb's Girls' School in that city. They were married November 20, 1878. To this union were born several daughters and two sons. The two sons are the well known and much beloved dentists of Warrenton, Drs. J. O. and Wm. N. Hodgkin. During 1879 the Northeast Medical Society of Virginia was formed, and in 1880, Dr. Hodgkin was elected to fellowship in that body, which he after served a number of years as secretary and treasurer. A secretarial book of that society, which has recently been found, gives interesting accounts of its meetings where gathered regularly Drs. Jno. A. Chilton, Jno. Ward, R. I. Hicks, Jesse Ewell, Frederick Horner, Henry Frost, Shirley Carter, H. M. Clarkson, J. O. Hodgkin and others whose memories are much revered in this section of Virginia.

In 1880, Dr. Hodgkin joined the Virginia State Dental Association, and some years ago was honored by being elected a life member. Until his last years, he was an interested and interesting attendant upon its meetings. Dr. Hodgkin's extreme modesty probably deprived the profession of much of great value he could have imparted by word and pen.

For more than fifty years he had been a member of Mt. Carmel Lodge, A. F. & A. M., and had held practically every office within its gift. He had been its oldest member for several years.

He was a great lover of nature, and took great delight in working about his flowers and plants, and there he would be found after his hours in his

office. Nothing pleased him more than to bestow upon those who were interested some of his choice dahlia blooms or other flowers of which his garden was well stocked. "And so he went through all this tract of years, wearing the white flowers of a blameless life."

The writer of this sketch can, in truth, say that after a long acquaintance, having practiced the past seventeen years in the same county and two years in the same town with Dr. Hodgkin, that he has never seen a man who excelled in all those attributes which go to make up "The ideal man." His skill as a dentist and other qualities which go to make up the highest type of Christian gentleman tower like a lofty peak above the surrounding hills. He enjoyed a very large clientele, many of whom lived long distances from him, but they came regularly to be ministered to by his master mind and hand. The dental profession cannot too highly honor him, who did so much in the work of elevating it to its present high plane. I was honored in being his friend, and can exclaim, as did Mark Anthony over the body of Brutus:

"His life was gentle, and the elements were so mixed in him that nature could stand up and say to all the world, this was a man."

VIRGINIA TIDEWATER DENTAL ASSOCIATION

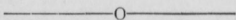

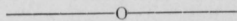
DENTAL MUSEUM *of the* MEDICAL COLLEGE OF VIRGINIA

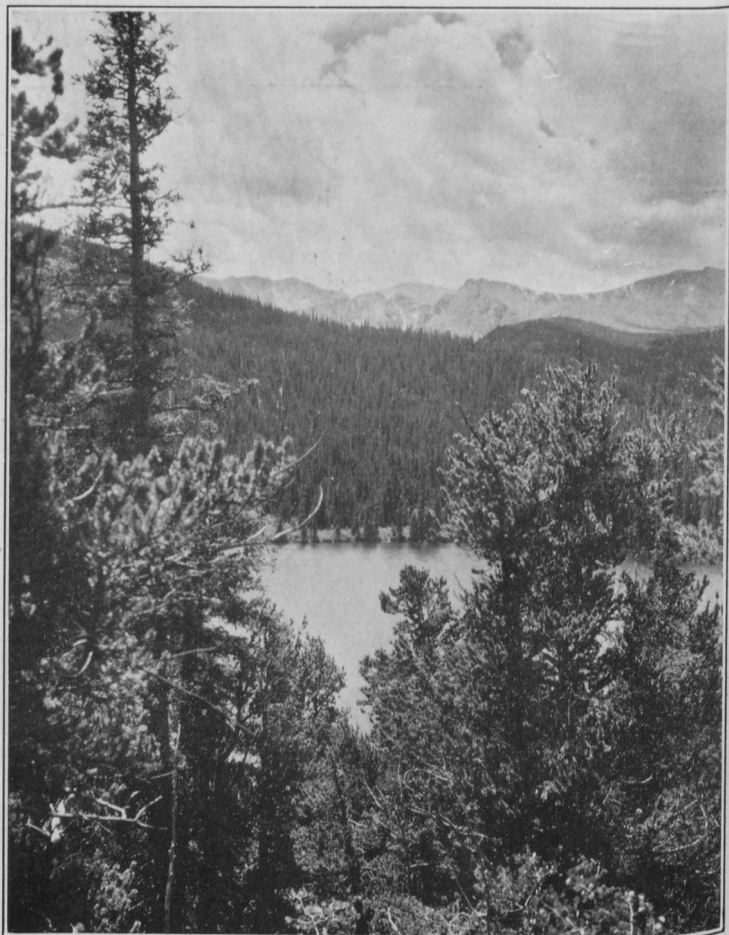
The meeting was then turned over to Dr. Myers, the host, who gave a most interesting talk on "Dental Economics and the Business Sides of Dentistry."

city in the world. Climate and all of the pleasures necessary to complete happiness are here provided.

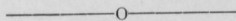
The call of the near-by mountains is answered in one hundred and fifty side trips out of Denver. Denver's system of Mountain Parks, starting fifteen miles west of the city limits, are rugged, timbered tracts, noted for their scenic beauty. This is the most popular four-hour trip out of Denver, and affords an idea of the front range of the Rockies, with views of the higher mountains in the Continental Divide.

Comfortable automobile trips may be made to many of the old mining towns, where prospectors became rich over night, and precious ore made history for Colorado. This can be included in an all-day trip to Echo Lake and Idaho Springs. From Echo Lake the new Mount Evans Highway is completed to Summit Lake, 13,000 feet elevation.

Diversity of sports seemingly is without end from climbing a glacier in the Boulder region, sixty miles from Denver, to bathing in hot mineral waters at Idaho Springs, Glenwood Springs, Pagosa Springs and Manitou.

Denver is the gateway to the scenic west. Your Colorado trip should include the Rocky Mountain National Park, a land of snow-capped peaks and mountain lakes; and Mesa Verde National Park, where are found the ruins of the prehistoric Cliff Dwellers.

RICHMOND DENTAL ASSISTANTS' SOCIETY

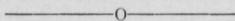
