OUR 121ST COMMENCEMENT — JUNE 3

The Commencement sermon will be given by the Reverend Joseph Thomas Heistand, rector of Saint Paul's Protestant Episcopal Church, on Sunday, June 1, at 8 p.m.

The Commencement exercises will be held at The Mosque on Tuesday evening, June 3, at eight o'clock. Governor Almond will give the address. All faculty members will receive a complete schedule of functions but they are urged to attend the sermon and the exercises in academic costume (if possible).

It is expected that the graduating classes will total 334: medicine 97; dentistry, 53; pharmacy, 62; nursing, 51; physical therapy, 31; hospital administration, 13; medical technology, 24; and graduate studies, 3. Virginians in the graduating classes number 241.

The honorary degree of doctor of pharmaceutical science will be conferred upon Edwin Claiborne Robins, president of A. H. Robins Company, and the honorary degree of doctor of laws will be conferred upon Paul D. Sanders, vice president of the Southern Planter Publishing Company.
