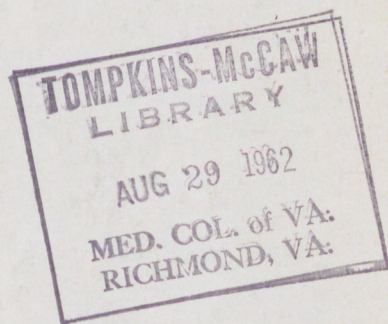

### Address of Welcome

MAYOR CLAUD W. WOODWARD: Mr. President, Ladies and Members of the Virginia State Dental Association: I bring the very cordial greetings and certainly a very, very warm welcome on behalf of the City as you meet here in your Capital of the State for your 93rd Annual Meeting. We have many conventions during the year and we feel that each of them leaves its own peculiar impact for good on our community and its people, and surely none can have a greater impact than your group representing a profession that has done so much for the relief of human suffering and so much in the rehabilitation and sustaining of health through proper dental treatment and care.

This is one of the pleasurable features of the Mayor's office, the very antithesis of some of the other infrequent phases that one in public life has to go through with in trying to serve his people. It has been a very pleasurable part of my experience to meet the many, many fine groups who come to our city for their conventions.

It was interesting for me, very interesting to know that prior to about 1800 dentistry was not a specialized profession. It was customary, I am told, for the doctors at that time to perform operative dentistry, for the barbers to perform oral surgery, and, of all things, for blacksmiths to perform extractions, and silver craftsmen to perform prosthodontia, whatever that is. At any rate, it certainly was interesting to know that blacksmiths performed extractions. False teeth must have been common about the beginning of the Christian Era for they are mentioned in the writings of Horace, Ovid and Cicero, and their use was frequently ridiculed by Marshall who wrote in one of his poems: "False teeth and hair flaunts Lelia shamelessly, but not false eyes, for these she cannot buy."

Your profession has indeed had a wonderful history, and yet as you meet here you know there is so much more yet to be done, and truly that is why you are meeting here, which reminds me of a story.

Winston Churchill, of all people, was invited to address a Temperance Union meeting in London and the toastmaster in presenting him said, "Ladies and Gentlemen, Mr. Winston Churchill, our speaker this evening, has drunk enough alcoholic beverages to fill this room up to his eyes."

When he acknowledged the introduction Mr. Churchill said, "Ladies and Gentlemen, your toastmaster has said I have drunk enough alcoholic beverages to fill this room up to my eyes." Then he hesitated, he looked from one end of the room to the other and up to the high ceiling and said, "You know, there is so much more to be done and so little time in which to do it." (Laughter)

You do have a very full program indicating that certainly in our time there is no waiting time. We have to be alert in these rapidly changing times and scientific improvements. We have to appraise our needs for the present and also for the future, and we have to know our communities and our people in light of all the changing forces of today. And I think too that each group, regardless of what that group might be, has to build on its heritage and never become commonplace or inert. Certainly we must never be deluded into a false sense of peace or neutrality.

I have voted here in the City of Richmond to keep fluoride in our city's drinking water. (Applause) Some time after that I had a letter from one of the members of my church where I was singing in the choir and she wrote me along this line: "Every time I look up at the choir and see you there I think there is one who voted to put that



stuff in my drinking water and I don't like it." Well, I got in touch with the lady and asked her if she wanted me to get out of the choir because I did that and she said, "No, you stay there."

There are many controversial questions that come up and all of us have to take a stand. I took what I thought was the best stand.

I heard of a colored preacher who was asked how many active members he had in his congregation and he said he had 100. The other man said, "That's impossible. I asked how many **active** members do you have?" The colored preacher replied, "I have 100 members, I have 50 for me and 50 against me and they are all active." (Laughter)

We are very advanced in our education. I heard a young teacher say recently that through television a youngster getting into school nowadays has about seven years of adult education.

This little boy ran into school his first day, crossed the room, stumbled over an obstacle on the floor and went sprawling. The teacher thought he had hurt himself and she said, "Don't you cry." He said, "Cry? Somebody is going to be sued for this!" (Laughter)

So these youngsters are not so dumb when they start into school.

Another teacher told her youngsters one morning, "I am going to give you five minutes to write something about yourself and what you want to do. After the five minutes were up she collected the papers and then called on a little girl to read what she had written. The little girl said: "My name is Ann — When I grow up I want to marry a man — I want to raise a family and I think I can."

The teacher said, "That's fine!"

The next one was a little boy and he said: "My name is Dan — When I grow to be a man I want to go to Japan and I hope I can."

The teacher said, "I hope your wish comes true." There was time to read one more paper and she called on Emanuel. He said: "My name is Man and I, too, want to become a man — But I don't want to go to Japan — I want to stay here and help Ann with her plan and I think I can." (Laughter)

Very, very seriously, I do hope that you will enjoy your stay here. Most of you, I am sure, are frequent visitors to our city. We think we have a very good city here in Richmond, well governed. The National League of Municipalities says it is one of the best in credit ratings. We enjoy a triple A credit rating, which saves us many, many thousands of dollars when it becomes necessary to borrow. Last

December we sold \$700,000 worth of bonds at the lowest payable interest rate. We think we have the things here which make it a good place in which to live. We have good educational institutions, there are some fine museums and historical places of interest. We have some fine retail shops and as a past president of the Retail Merchants Association I know these stores are going to be mighty happy if you brought your wives with you. We have fine recreational facilities. We think we have friendly and hospitable people and we hope you are going to find us that way. We think all of these things together make Richmond a good Capital of the State of Virginia.

We are having quite a few changes taking place in the City of Richmond. Last month we dedicated a Federal Building housing some 2,000 federal employees. The City of Richmond is beginning in a nice way to develop a 37-acre Civic Center to the east and north of this new building. Our first building is now under way, the Health, Education and Welfare building. The Medical College, as most of you know, is engaged in an almost incredible expansion coming from the east toward the Civic Center and I know you will want to see how that is progressing. Recently the new Child Treatment Center was opened in the Medical College area. We expect to have a Cultural Activities Center in our Civic Center that will add to the advantages of the City of Richmond. Right here in this hotel within the next year we hope to have a Convention Center that will be able to seat 2,000 people at a banquet. It has been needed in this City of Richmond.

We are undergoing a Rehabilitation and Urban Renewal Program here that is transforming some of the worst slum areas, areas that have been allowed to remain that way, I am ashamed to say, for too long.

I would commend for a visit the seeing of the Civil War Centennial Center at the north end of H Street. There you will see some very fine exhibits related to the Civil War and see films and hear tape recordings of phases of the Civil War. Also at 7:30 each night at the Richmond Civil War Centennial Committee Headquarters off Broad St. on 9th, there is a very, very interesting tour where you will see at each of the stopping places reenactment of certain phases of the Civil War, done in professional style and in costume.

So take time out for some of these things while you are here and see some of the things that will enable you to go back feeling more glad that you came to Richmond.

I do hope that you are going to have a very fruitful session and that each community represented here is going to be greatly benefited

by this session. After all, it is good to meet in convention where you renew old friendships and make new friends. Those are some of the intangibles of life that you can't place a dollar sign on. So have a good time and come back to see us often and real soon. It is good to have you here. (Applause)

### COUNCIL ON DENTAL HEALTH

The report of Dr. Gladstone M. Hill, chairman of the Council on Dental Health, contained the following recommendations which were considered singly and after clarifying discussion were adopted as amended by the Council on Dental Health at its annual meeting held earlier in the day, with further amendment of Recommendation III by inserting the word "help" before the word "implementation":

- I. The Council on Dental Health requests that the State President appoint a special committee (or refer to an appropriate committee) to review the survey of Eastern State and to make recommendations and assist in implementation of same.  
**Note:** Before adoption of this recommendation Dr. Hill explained the pilot survey of the dental status and dental needs of the patients in the Eastern State Hospital in Williamsburg had been completed and is available from the Virginia State Division of Dental Health; that the intent of the recommendation is to study the valuable data presented and to make any recommendation back to the Executive Council that seems indicated in this important field.
- II. The Council on Dental Health requests that the Executive Council approve the request of the Virginia Division of Den-

tal Health to survey the dental needs of the state nursing homes. This will not entail any funds from the Virginia State Dental Association.

- III. The Council on Dental Health requests that the State President appoint a special committee (or refer to an appropriate committee) to help implement the Kerr-Mills Bill. Members of the Council on Dental Health will be glad to cooperate.

**Note:** Prior to the adoption of this recommendation Dr Hill emphasized the need of following through on this legislation in an effort to see that dental care is administered to the aged out of the funds available to the twelve services that are included in the Kerr-Mills legislation.

- IV. The Council on Dental Health requests that a member of the Virginia Society of Dentistry for Children be invited to become a non-voting member of the Council on Dental Health. This is in response to a request by the American Society of Dentistry for Children.

- V. With increased efforts by the Virginia State Dental Association in the field of Dental Service Corporations, it is requested that a special committee be appointed by the State President (or refer to an appropriate committee) to undertake an educational program to inform the members of the state Society of the ramifications and potentials of this principle.

**Dental Surpak Survey** — Dr. Triani distributed copies of a progress report, dated April 20, 1962, on the Dental Surpak Survey which contained the suggestion that it would be of great help to the incoming members of each component dental society if they would be made aware of the Surpak Program presently being conducted and of the registration of radiation equipment in Virginia.

### CLINIC COMMITTEE

The report of the Clinic Committee as submitted by Dr. Carlton E. Gregory, chairman, was received with commendation to the Committee for a fine job.

### RELIEF COMMITTEE

Attached to the report submitted by Dr. J. O. Cain, chairman of the Relief Committee, was the annual audit report for the year beginning January 1, 1961 and ending December 31, 1961. Since the American

Dental Association requires an audit on a January-December basis, this change in dates will make one audit suffice. On motion and vote, the report was accepted.

### MILITARY AFFAIRS

The report of the Military Affairs Committee submitted by Dr. L. H. Blevins, chairman, contained three recommendations. The first two recommendations, dealing with the "Fee Survey" which the Committee was instructed by the Executive Council to make, were discussed fully. On motion by Dr. Barrick, it was voted that the two recommendations be tabled until the Executive Council is presented with the information obtained by the "Fee Survey." The third recommendation, concerning the "appointment of someone or a committee to work with any group in arriving at a fair fee for all types of dental treatment" was deemed not to be necessary since a Legislative subcommittee (composed of Doctors D. Blanton Allen, S. Nelson Gray and M. Bagley Walker) is already set up for this purpose pending the establishment of a dental service corporation whose function it would be to carry on this work. On motion and vote, Recommendation 3 was deleted.

### DENTAL TRADE AND LABORATORY RELATIONS

A full report covering the accomplishments of the Committee on Dental Trade and Laboratory Relations was submitted by Dr. Alexander L. Martone, chairman. This report outlined in detail the activities of the Committee in furthering the long-range 5-point program which it has been vigorously pursuing for the past three years in the interest of development and maintenance of effective relations between the profession and the dental laboratory craft. The recommendations were considered singly.

Recommendation 1 required no action since it pertained to submission of a supplemental report if necessary and the need for same did not arise.

On motion and vote, the following recommendation was accepted:

2. In an effort to implement the theme of this Committee: "Education before Legislation," an Implementation Committee was appointed to assist the State Board of Dental Examiners in any way possible in regard to written work authorization legislation. The Committee, therefore asks the approval of this newly appointed committee.



It was pointed out that the following recommendation required the appropriation of funds:

3. It should be stressed that all efforts which are made initially to provide educational background and an effective implementation of this legislation will result in a decrease, at a later date, of expenditures involved in relation to inspections and enforcement of the written work authorization legislation. Therefore, it is recommended that the initial implementation of the written work authorization program and the expenses incurred by it be borne by the Virginia State Dental Association and not by the dental industry.

On motion and vote, Recommendation 3 was approved along with authorization for an appropriation not to exceed \$900.

In considering the following recommendation, Dr. Martone advised that the appropriation previously authorized would also cover this activity:

4. It is recommended that the Virginia State Dental Association authorize the Implementation Committee to assume the responsibility for publicizing to all dentists and dental laboratory technicians in Virginia the written work authorization and the prescription form approved by the State Board of Dental Examiners.

On motion and vote, Recommendation 4 was approved.

On motion and vote, the following recommendation was approved:

5. It is recommended that the Implementation Committee (whose purpose is to see that the written work authorization program functions effectively) be empowered to assist the State Board of Dental Examiners in any capacity the Board may desire.

There was brief discussion of the following recommendation:

6. It is recommended that the Executive Council and the Secretary of the Virginia State Dental Association review the previous policy relating to the registration and the attendance of exhibitors at dental meetings in Virginia to consider whether this policy concurs with present registration requirements and American Dental Association policy.

Dr. Henderson advised that under present policy only those exhibitors are accepted whose products are sanctioned by the American

Dental Association either through listing in **Accepted Dental Remedies** or through favorable action by the Council on Dental Therapeutics. On motion and vote, Recommendation 6 was approved.

On motion and vote, the following recommendation was approved:

7. It is recommended that regional seminars be conducted at Component levels to explain the new provision of the Dental Practice Act and the use of the written work authorization forms as approved by the State Board of Dental Examiners.

Recommendation 8 dealt with the desirability of having a continuity of membership on this Committee of members who have an interest in and previous experience in the educational and legislative aspects of dental trade and laboratory relations. The supplemental report of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee which contained a recommendation on this matter was considered at this point and accepted as noted in the report of that Committee.

### CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

Earlier in the meeting the Chairman called for the supplemental report of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, which was read by Dr. R. P. Stickley, chairman, and tabled until the report of the Dental Trade and Laboratory Relations Committee had been considered. This report was then removed from the table and the following recommendation for a change in the by-law pertaining to the appointment of a Committee on Dental Trade and Laboratory Relations was adopted:

#### Article X, Section 2C

1. That the president of each Component Society appoint a Committee on Dental Trade and Laboratory Relations consisting of four members whose terms do not rotate. He shall designate the chairman who shall automatically become a member of the State Committee, for his term of appointment. The presidents of Components #1 and 2 shall appoint their committees for a term of one year. The presidents of Components #3 and 4 shall appoint their committees for a term of two years. The presidents of Components #5 and 6 shall appoint their committees for a term of three years. The presidents of Components #7 and 8 shall appoint their committees for a term of four years. Thereafter, as these appointments expire, the committees and chairmen of all components shall be appointed for a term of four years.

2. That the President of the Virginia State Dental Association shall appoint four members-at-large, one member for a term of one year, one member for a term of two years, one member for a term of three years, and one member for a term of four years. Thereafter, each incoming President shall appoint a successor to that member whose term has expired, for a term of four years.
3. This committee of twelve members shall effect its own organization.

The following recommendation which pertains to the Legislative Committee, was adopted:

**Article X, Section 3G** shall be amended by adding the following sentence at the end of the paragraph:

"The committee shall effect its own organization."

On motion and vote, the following recommendation was accepted:

**Article X, Section 2N** shall be amended to read:

1. The Dental Education Committee shall consist of one member from each Component, two members from the faculty of the MCV School of Dentistry, and two members from the Virginia State Board of Dental Examiners. The President shall appoint representatives from Components #1 and 2 for a term of one year; from Components #3 and 4 for a term of two years; from Components #5 and 6 for a term of three years; from Components #7 and 8 for a term of four years, thereafter, as these appointments expire representatives from the Components shall be appointed for a term of four years. The President shall appoint the representatives from the faculty of the MCV School of Dentistry and from the Virginia State Board of Dental Examiners for a period of one year and each may be reappointed yearly for a total of four years.
2. The Committee shall effect its own organization.
3. Its duties shall consist of continual review of matters pertaining to Dental Education. It shall make any recommendations to the Executive Council that it deems pertinent.

Later in the session Dr. Stickley presented the original report of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee which contained two recommendations, the first one pertaining to the membership of the Dental Edu-

cation and Dental Trade and Laboratory Relations Committees having been taken care of. The following recommendation was adopted:

We further recommend that when changes are made in the By-Laws in the future that they appear in an early issue of the Bulletin following the Annual Meeting and that they appear in such a form as to be readily transferable into the loose leaf copy of the By-Laws, and that such new sheets be dated to show when the change was made.

### DENTAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Dr. Clarence K. Garrard, chairman of the Committee on Dental Education, was complimented by other members of the Committee after having been given an opportunity to read the minutes which he had prepared of the Committee meeting held in Richmond on January 28, 1962. Two resolutions were adopted at this meeting. The one pertaining to having a rotating-type of Education Committee had been covered by previous action.

There was discussion mainly concerning the expense involved in implementing the following resolution:

RESOLVED that a workshop program consisting of the Education Committee, with staff members of the Dental School and the State Board of Dental Examiners, be set up to study the nine categories as recommended in the education section of "Survey of Dentistry" and decide which ones will be accepted as of primary importance. Work will be started on the most important ones and worked on down the list.

On motion and vote, the resolution was accepted and the Committee was empowered to spend an amount of money up to a maximum of \$3,000 on this project.

### LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

The report submitted by Dr. David M. Bear, chairman of the Legislative Committee, reviewed briefly the activities engaged in by the Committee which included work with the state legislature this year. As a result of these activities, four recommendations were presented.

The first recommendation requested guidance on the procedure that should be followed in regard to a final decision concerning certain legislative procedures, bills or acts, either to be supported or to be opposed which make their appearance just prior to or during the meet-

ing of the Virginia State Legislature, the problem having arisen when there was lack of time to poll the Executive Council. The question was asked: "Should the Chairman of the Legislative Committee and our legal counsel make these decisions or should some other procedure be followed?" The consensus of the discussion was that the Chairman and legal counsel should continue to exercise their good judgment and that no further action by the Executive Council was necessary. On motion and vote, the recommendation was received as information.

The following recommendation was discussed:

2. It is recommended that the Executive Council instruct all standing committees to evaluate the Dental Practice Act in the light of their activities and to make such recommendations as they see fit to the Legislative Committee, and further recommend that the Council strongly urge the State Board of Dental Examiners do likewise.

Dr. Bear advised that to date the Legislative Committee had received no recommendations and yet there was constant talk that there should be changes made in the Dental Practice Act; that this recommendation was made to emphasize that point in the hope that recommendations will be sent to the Legislative Committee in time so that they may be reviewed, prepared in proper shape and presented for approval. On motion and vote, Recommendation 2 was approved.

There was discussion of the following recommendation:

3. It is recommended that suitable material be distributed to all members of the state association in reference to the establishment of a service corporation so that there can be no doubt as to the understanding of this problem. The failure of the passage of this bill during the past legislature can only be due to ignorance or misunderstanding of the problem even by those who have been closely associated with its discussion.

Dr. Hill referred to Recommendation 5 of the Council on Dental Health, already approved, pertaining to this same matter. It was recognized that the problem was one of designating either a special committee or an existing committee to disseminate the material which is available from the American Dental Association, gratis. On motion and vote, the recommendation was accepted.

Recommendation 4, pertaining to clarifying the position of the chairman of the Legislative Committee, was received as information since the Constitution and By-Laws Committee had taken care of this matter in amendment to Article X, Section 2G.



**Supplemental Report** — Dr. Bear presented a supplemental report as chairman of the Legislative Committee but not necessarily for the committee as a whole. This report suggested that consideration be given to employment of an executive secretary. On motion and vote, the report was received as information. It was subsequently voted that the supplemental report be included in the official minutes of this meeting and published in the Bulletin for the information of the members.

(This report appears on page 75.)

In connection with the report from Mr. Robert T. Barton, Jr., concerning his legislative activities on behalf of the Virginia State Dental Association, there was some discussion of the section on "Medical Assistance to Aged Persons" but no action was deemed necessary. On motion and vote, the report was received.

### HISTORY COMMITTEE

There was no report from the History Committee. Dr. Lyons announced that Dr. Hodgkin had willed to the Medical College of Virginia his library, also the notes he had collected on his History of Dentistry in Virginia, and his portrait. He stated that some of the material has been loaned to Dr. Blanton Allen's son, who is a graduate student in the field of history, and is being used as source material for his thesis. Dr. Lyons said he felt sure the College would be pleased to receive any advice from the Virginia State Dental Association as to the disposition of this material.

### HOSPITAL DENTAL SERVICE

The report of the Hospital Dental Service Committee, submitted by Dr. William J. Longan, chairman, contained no recommendations. On motion and vote, the report was received.

### NECROLOGY COMMITTEE

Dr. Henderson read a letter from Dr. Buford S. Burks, chairman of the Necrology Committee, under date of April 25, advising that on the following day he would go to St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Richmond for treatment and perhaps surgery. The following names were added to the list of deceased members submitted by Dr. Burks: Dr. R. E. Smithey, Richmond, April, 1962; Dr. Henry R. Bielski, Annandale, 1962; Dr. Robert N. Harper, Danville, 1962. The Council members and visitors stood as Chairman Upshur read the list of members who had passed on since the last meeting, observing a moment of silence as the reading of the list was concluded.

Dr. Barrick stated that Mrs. Hodges had asked him to report that all of Dr. Hodges' office equipment, instruments, etc., had been donated to Ferrum Junior College as The Emory F. Hodges Memorial Clinic.

### EDITORIAL STAFF OF THE BULLETIN

There was no report from the Editorial Staff of the Bulletin.

### REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES

#### AMALGAM SCRAP

An appeal to bring or send amalgam scrap to the Richmond Convention appeared in the March issue of the Bulletin and constituted the report of the Amalgam Scrap Committee.

#### CLEFT PALATE

The report submitted by Dr. Charles J. Vincent, chairman of the Cleft Palate Committee, listed the locale of three facilities supplying services for cleft palate and other facial deformities. The Committee recommended that the Special Committee on Cleft Palate be continued for another year and that each of the facilities listed in the report have equal representation on the committee, and/or any future facilities developed within the state have equal representation. On motion and vote, the recommendation was accepted.

#### INSURANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Insurance Committee, Dr. G. W. Bogikes, chairman, contained four recommendations. Following brief discussion, the following recommendation was adopted:

1. Since the Committee feels that there is a great deal of misunderstanding on the part of the membership about the various insurance programs offered through the American Dental Association, the Virginia State Dental Association and various component societies, some members even thinking that the state association sponsors and services all these programs, we recommend that more educational efforts be made to acquaint the members with the various programs by articles in the Bulletin, by circular mailings, and by table clinics at the state meetings, in order that our members better understand the different plans, more especially our state-sponsored plans.

The second recommendation calling for the setting up of "a state insurance council having one representative from each component in addition to the three members of the Insurance Committee" was discussed. On motion, it was voted that the Insurance Committee continue to function as presently organized.

The following resolution was adopted without comment:

3. In order to assure future continuity of membership in the State Insurance Committee, we recommend that the members serve for a three year term, with one new member being appointed each year. Initially, one member to be appointed for three years, one for two years and one for one year.

There was pro and con discussion of the following recommendation:

4. This committee was appointed several years ago as a special committee to study and report on hospital and other insurance programs. Since its inception, its functions have broadened and since the insurance programs are here to stay, we recommend that the Insurance Committee be made a standing committee, as is the case in a number of other state societies.

By a show of hands, it was voted to refer this recommendation to the Constitution and By-Laws Committee for study and recommendation.

The following resolution presented in the supplementary report of the Insurance Committee was adopted:

**RESOLVED**, that the Insurance Committee be authorized and instructed to develop a retirement program for the members of the Virginia State Dental Association which will be adaptable to the requirements of the Keogh-Simpson bill and other bills with the same objective which are now pending in the Congress, and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that if the Insurance Committee decides that it is desirable to offer such a plan to the members before the next meeting of the Council, the chairman shall so report to the President who shall poll the Council by mail to determine whether such a program shall be offered, and if a majority of the Council approves the offering of the program to the members, the Insurance Committee shall take the necessary steps to make such a plan available to the members at the earliest practicable moment.

### **ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO DENTAL HYGIENISTS AND DENTAL ASSISTANTS**

Dr. J. O. Tyree, chairman of the Advisory Committee to the Dental Hygienists and Dental Assistants, recommended that the Executive Council approve the Virginia Dental Assistants' Association decision, to wit: "That we accept the State Advisors appointed by the Virginia State Dental Association, and that they be instructed as to their duties to the Virginia State Dental Assistants' Association." On motion and vote, the recommendation was accepted.

### **MOUTH GUARD COMMITTEE**

The Mouthguard Committee was formed at the request of President Simpson; its membership is composed of a representative of each of the eight Component Societies, Dr. W. B. Costenbader, chairman. As a result of a study of its assignment to determine the desirability and practicability of establishing a Mouthguard Program as a project of the Virginia State Dental Association, the Committee presented the following recommendation:

In view of the fact that approximately one-fourth of all football injuries occur in or about the mouth, the Virginia State Dental Association endorses a program for the construction, and mandatory use, of custom-made, individually fitted, intra-oral mouthguards for football players, and players in other contact sports; and that such a program, to be implemented at the high school level, shall be initiated and carried out by the Association, through its Component Societies, as a public service contribution.

On motion and vote, the recommendation was adopted with the addition of the words "at no expense to the Association."

### **CANCER COORDINATING COMMITTEE**

Dr. W. T. McAfee, chairman of the Cancer Coordinating Committee, presented a progress report of this Committee's first year of activity. The report was accepted.

### **TIME AND PLACE OF MEETING**

As Chairman of the Special Committee on Time and Place of Meeting, Dr. McAfee reported that the dates of April 30, May 1, 2 and 3 had been confirmed for the holding of the 1967 Annual Meeting in Richmond. On motion and vote, the report was accepted.

### REPORTS OF SPECIAL REPRESENTATIVES

**Council on Health and Medical Care** — Dr. W. O. Powell, special representative to the Council on Health and Medical Care, reported orally that the Council was doing a wonderful job and that the \$200 contributed to this Council by the Virginia State Dental Association was well spent.

**Virginia Joint Council to Improve the Care of the Aged** — Dr. Peter A. Triani, chairman of the special committee to the Virginia Joint Council to Improve the Care of the Aged, submitted a report of the Second National Conference of the Joint Council to Improve the Health Care of the Aged, attended by representatives of the American Dental Association, American Hospital Association, American Medical Association and American Nursing Home Association. Dr. Triani represented Virginia at this Conference. The report carried no recommendations and on motion and vote it was received.

**Virginia Division American Cancer Society** — Dr. E. H. Eskey, Jr., representative of the Virginia State Dental Association to the Virginia Cancer Coordinating Committee, presented a progress report of this Committee, which is in its infancy having had only one meeting to date, and expressed the hope that it will receive the full support of the Virginia State Dental Association since he believed it has a great potential. The report carried no recommendations and on motion and vote it was received.

It was suggested that this Committee and the Cancer Committee might be combined to avoid duplication of effort.

**Delegate's Report on 102nd Annual Session of American Dental Association** — Dr. S. Nelson Gray, representing the Virginia delegation to the 102nd Annual Session of the American Dental Association, submitted a report on the important transactions of the House of Delegates. On motion, the report was accepted with commendation to Dr. Gray.

**State Board of Dental Examiners** — On motion and vote, the full report submitted by Dr. John M. Hughes, Secretary-Treasurer of the Virginia State Board of Dental Examiners, was received.

**Nominating Committee** — The Chairman referred to the recommendation made by President McAfee last year that a Nominating Committee be appointed to present names for both the State Board of Dental Examiners and for delegates and alternates to the ADA House of Delegates. He called on Dr. Snapp to present the report of his committee, the other two members being Drs. Blevins and Slavin.



1) **Nominations for State Board of Dental Examiners** — The Nominating Committee submitted the following names from which to select a member to serve on the Virginia State Board of Dental Examiners:

No additional nominations were presented and the names as submitted by the Nominating Committee were approved in the order presented.

2) **Delegates to ADA House of Delegates—1963-1964** — Dr. Snapp reported that the terms of Dr. B. M. Haley and Dr. S. Nelson Gray as delegates to the ADA House of Delegates will expire with the 1962 annual meeting in Miami Beach and the Committee nominated Dr. Haley and Dr. Gray to succeed themselves for another two-year term beginning in 1963. No additional nominations were presented and the names as submitted by the Nominating Committee were approved.

3) **Alternate Delegates to ADA House of Delegates—1962** — For Alternates to the 1962 ADA House of Delegates, Dr. Snapp presented the following nominations of the Committee:

**Nominations for Life Membership** — Nominations for life membership were submitted by the following Components through their representatives on the Council:

Component No. 6: Dr. Ray D. Courtney, Marion.

Component No. 7: Dr. R. C. Engleman, Lexington; Dr. F. L. Leonard, Bridgewater; Dr. Dan O. Via, Charlottesville.

On motion and vote, the foregoing nominations for life membership in the Virginia State Dental Association were approved.

**Election of Parliamentarian** — On nomination of President-elect Wall, Dr. Carter Tinsley was unanimously elected to serve as parliamentarian for the ensuing year.

**Fee of Legal Counsel** — Secretary Henderson presented a bill from Mr. Robert T. Barton, Jr., in the amount of \$1,200 for legal fee covering services rendered during the past two years. On motion, it was voted that the bill be paid.

**Authorization for presentation of 65 year certificate** — The Secretary reported the suggestion received from Dr. DeMuth of Farmville that a 65 year certificate be given to Dr. Paul W. Beckham of Farmville. On motion, it was voted that the Secretary be authorized to have the 65 year certificate presented to Dr. Beckham on Tuesday evening.

### NEW BUSINESS

**Wm. N. Hodgkin Memorial Fund** — Dr. Haggerty reported that at the annual meeting of Component No. 8 a Wm. N. Hodgkin Memorial Fund was established and \$1,000 was contributed to the fund by the Component. Recommendations for use of the fund were: 1) completion and publishing of the book "History of Dentistry in Virginia," dedicated to Dr. Wm. N. Hodgkin; 2) scholarship loan fund for students at the Medical College of Virginia Dental School, all such funds be placed under Dental Memorial Loan Funds in memory of Dr. Thomas Pumphrey, Dr. Wm. N. Hodgkin, and any future names to be added; 3) a suitable plaque be placed in the school with names of dentists commemorated by the fund. He conveyed the request of his Component that members of the other Components be asked to contribute to this fund. On motion, it was voted that this information be published in the Bulletin so that the members may be aware of the fund's existence.

**Increase in charge for exhibit space** — The Secretary asked for authorization to increase the charge for exhibit space from \$100 to \$125. On motion and vote, the authorization was given.

**Adjournment** — All business having been concluded, the meeting of the Executive Council adjourned at 6:30 p.m.

## REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

Dr. Richard L. Simpson

Mr. Chairman, members of the Virginia State Dental Association, distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen:

I am happy to welcome you to the ninety-third annual meeting of the Virginia State Dental Association. It has been my privilege to serve the Virginia State Dental Association in different capacities in past years and finally, this year, as your President. The responsibilities of President have been, at times, rather trying; however, with the willing assistance and dedication of many of our association, my duties and responsibilities have been most interesting, informative, and educational. The events which I have been privileged to enjoy during the past year have been the source of keen satisfaction, and the way I have been treated by the officers and members of the component societies both professionally and socially is an experience that I shall always remember. Time does not permit me to single out the many individual members to whom I owe so much, but a very comforting feeling for me has been the wonderful support that I have received from the members of this association. No president and his wife have been shown greater consideration and courtesy. For this we feel most humble and appreciative.

As your president it has been a pleasure to work with our helpful and efficient Secretary-Treasurer, Dr. M. E. Henderson and his secretary, Mrs. Ida Reid. Counsel and guidance have always been available from Dr. Henderson and Mrs. Reid and I am grateful to them for their cooperation and support during the past year.

It is not possible in this brief report to touch upon all of the committee reports. As you know, committee reports are received by the Executive Council and the action taken is reported to you for your approval by the Executive Council. I hope that you availed yourself of the opportunity to hear these reports when they were presented.

A most important committee of this association is the one which concerns itself with the preparation of the scientific program. One of the main objectives of this association is the dissemination of scientific information and this responsibility rests primarily with the Program Committee. I am most grateful to Dr. O. W. Clough and the other members of his committee for their splendid contribution to the success of this meeting through their efforts in arranging the scientific program. You will notice that the Committee on Dental Trade and Laboratory Relations is climaxing its three-year program which had the approval of the Executive Council.

The Local Arrangements Committee under the Chairmanship of Dr. W. O. Powell has rendered an invaluable service in making all arrangements necessary for the smooth and successful operation of this meeting. As you know, a great deal of organizational work is essential to the smooth functioning of such a meeting and I wish to take this opportunity to thank Dr. Powell and his committee for their splendid efforts. In connection with local arrangements I would be most ungrateful if I did not publicly express my deepest appreciation to Mrs. Robert S. Burford, President of the Ladies Auxiliary to the Richmond Dental Society, and Mrs. C. D. Richardson, President of the Ladies Auxiliary to the Virginia State Dental Association, and to many others in these organizations for their superior and unique contribution to the excellent entertainment of our ladies.

A number of our committees found it necessary to have numerous meetings throughout the year in order to carry on effectively the work of the individual committees. Our Dental Trade & Laboratory Relations Committee under the chairmanship of Dr. A. L. Martone is to be commended for all of its efforts and particularly for its work in the field of dentist-laboratory technician relations. Dr. Martone has been chairman of this committee for several years and should be commended for his work in maintaining good liaison between the dentist and laboratory technician. As you know, such good relations do not prevail in all areas of the country. Laboratory technicians in some areas wish to become "Denturists" and deal directly with patients. Combatting such operations on the part of some laboratory technicians has been a very expensive, time-consuming and trying experience for some dental societies. Apparently the issue is not yet settled. In our association we enjoy the finest relationship with laboratory technicians, and a spirit of cooperation and friendliness prevails. Many of the problems faced in other states will not arise in Virginia. As directed by the Executive Council last year, we have as our guests this year the members of the Virginia State Dental Laboratory Association. The scientific program has been arranged for the mutual benefit of our members and the laboratory technicians. Through the efforts of the Legislative Committee and the Committee on Dental Trade and Laboratory Relations, legislation was passed at the recent session of the General Assembly of Virginia requiring that work authorization forms be completed by the dentist before the laboratory technician is permitted to perform his services. This legislation had the approval of the Virginia State Dental Laboratory Association.

Under the able chairmanship of Dr. Gladstone M. Hill, the Committee on Dental Health held several meetings during the past year. Several members of our association attended out-of-state health meet-

ings of interest to the Council on Dental Health. Some of the proceedings of these meetings will be found in the report of the Council on Dental Health. This council has concerned itself with many problems—one of the foremost being the fluoridation of water.

Fluoridation of water supplies has been a problem with which the dental profession has been unable to deal successfully. Controlled water fluoridation has been the subject of more studies than any other public health measure in our nation's history. Dr. Francis A. Arnold, Jr., Director of the National Institute of Dental Research, has stated that in the fluoridation of water "no public health procedure for the control of a disease has been so thoroughly tested by so many component scientists and research organizations." The legality of water fluoridation has been consistently upheld in the higher courts. Every conceivable legal and constitutional objection to fluoridation has been argued unsuccessfully, yet only about 21 per cent of this country's population drinks fluoridated water. Programs are now being conducted to fluoridate the water supply in certain areas of this state and each dentist is urged to support this program by personal communication with his patients in the dental office. The most effective work can be done in this regard in the dental office.

Your Legislative Committee has remained active during the year. The Virginia General Assembly approved legislation relating to medical assistance to the aged (under Kerr-Mills Bill) after it was amended to include dental care, excluding dentures. House Bill No. 395 in the Virginia General Assembly permitting dentists and other professional men to establish organizations so as to take advantage of Federal legislation permitting the accumulation of retirement funds was also passed by the Assembly. House Bill No. 533 relative to the establishment of a dental service corporation in Virginia did not receive favorable consideration. It died in committee. Our association has been interested for a number of years in legislation which would permit the formation of a dental service corporation. The American Dental Association has repeatedly urged that this action be taken by all states. The Survey of Dentistry recommends that "Dental Service Corporations be organized by all state dental societies to facilitate the development of plans for the group purchase of care." Apparently there is some misunderstanding in our association regarding the need and desirability of this legislation. Possibly there is some confusion about the purpose of such a corporation in our society. The Council on Dental Health of the American Dental Association has presented the following principle for dental service corporations: "A dental service corporation should be a legally constituted not-for-profit organization sponsored by a state dental society to negotiate and administer contracts for dental care." In our



industrialized and highly urbanized society, people work together and they are frequently interested in purchasing services in groups. It is expected that this trend will continue to develop. Our state dental society must be in a position to deal with these groups. The best interests of the public and the profession must remain under the control of the dentist and not delegated to the selfish interests of other groups. I am sure that the Executive Council will take appropriate action to see that the members of the Virginia State Dental Association are completely informed about the need for a dental service corporation in our society. I want to take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation to Dr. David Bear, Chairman of the Legislative Committee, for his untiring efforts in behalf of our association.

The Insurance Committee, under the direction of Dr. George Bogikes, has been particularly active during the past year. I am confident that Dr. Bogikes is better informed about insurance programs than any individual in our association and I am grateful to him for his splendid work.

Dr. Carlton E. Gregory, Chairman of the Clinic Committee, has again in his exemplary manner arranged a splendid group of table clinics. Our table clinic session remains one of the best attended and most informative portions of our program. We do appreciate the efforts of Dr. Gregory and the members of his committee.

Under the excellent direction of Dr. Clarence K. Garrard the Education Committee has been active during the past year. Some of the problems pertaining to the various activities of this committee have long-range, far-reaching implications. Time is required to study and evaluate these problems. I urge each of you to read the report of this committee as you may be called upon in the future to participate in some of the conferences which are in the planning stage.

I wish to express my appreciation to Dr. L. H. Blevins, Chairman of the Military Affairs Committee. This committee has made a restudy recently of the state average fee schedule. We are grateful to Dr. Blevins and his associates for their contribution to the activities of this association.

Dr. R. P. Stickley, Chairman of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, assumed the responsibility for the revision of our constitution and by-laws. You have received a copy of our up-to-date by-laws and we thank Dr. Stickley for his fine work.

Under the chairmanship of Dr. R. S. Burks, the Necrology Committee has functioned in the usual efficient manner. I have been notified promptly of the death of our members and a card of bereavement has

been sent to the family in the name of the Virginia State Dental Association. We have lost thirteen (13) members. The following members departed this life during the past year:

As a tribute to those devoted people who are no longer with us and as a mark of our profound condolence with their families, I ask that we stand for a moment of silence. (The assembly stood for a moment of silence.)

It has been a real pleasure to be able to work with the Dental Division of the State Department of Health. Dr. Peter A. Triani, Director of the Dental Division, has been most cooperative and helpful. The Surpak Survey of our x-ray equipment was conducted by the State Department of Health during the past year. I have been informed that the cooperation from the members of our association was excellent. Certificates suitable for framing have been prepared to indicate that your x-ray machines are safe. Since 47% of the x-ray examinations in the United States are conducted by dentists, it is hoped that this program will continue and that the x-ray machines of new dentists entering practice in the state will be evaluated for safety.

Of interest to the members of our association are the activities of the Virginia Council on Health and Medical Care. This is a voluntary, non-profit organization and it is privately supported. This organization has received national acclaim and has as part of its objectives "the coordination of official and voluntary groups in Virginia, which have

mutual interests in health and medical care." The Careers Program of the Council does a most effective work in recruitment of students for the health professions. This Council deserves our continued and expanded support.

I would like to take this opportunity to express to Dean Harry Lyons my sincere thanks and appreciation for all of his help and co-operation during the past year. I am deeply appreciative to him for permitting me to take the time from my regular responsibilities to serve in the present capacity. I am also grateful to my departmental associates for assuming more than their share of duties in order to allow me to serve.

Again we have with us our ever faithful Miss Janna Q. Olson. On behalf of the Virginia State Dental Association I want to thank you, Miss Olson, for your faithful and loyal service to our society. I assure you that we look forward with keen anticipation to your visit each year.

I would be neglectful of my responsibilities if I did not make some reference to the Survey of Dentistry. As you know, the Survey was made at the suggestion of the dental profession by the American Council on Education. It was not forced on us by any group, nor was it made because of any outside pressures. The dental profession asked that an objective study be made. The prospectus of the Survey stated that the study should be to "assess the achievement, resources, and potentialities of dentistry with a view to determining the desirable areas of future growth and development" for the purpose of "describing and recommending improved approaches, technics, and methods for the better provision of an essential health service to the American people." Arthur S. Adams, President, American Council on Education, has stated: "This willingness of dentistry to expose itself to inspection indicates a maturity and conscientiousness deserving high praise." It took three years to make the survey at the cost of \$420,000 in grants from the Kellogg Foundation and the American Dental Association with supplementary grants from the Rockefeller Brothers Fund and the Lewis W. and Maud Hill Family Foundation. The results of the study are contained in a 550 page book published by the American Council on Education and it may be purchased for ten dollars. A summary report is available for one dollar. Every member of our association should be familiar with the findings of the Survey. Highly respected and thoroughly able individuals conducted this investigation and all of their suggestions and recommendations cannot be dismissed as if no problems exist or no shortcomings prevail. Many recommendations have been made for the consideration of the dental profession and they

will not be solved by merely saying "No" to every suggestion. Every facet of dentistry has been exposed. So far we do not have too much for which we should be ashamed. The future will determine our stature. I am confident that various groups in our society will be called upon in the years ahead to examine some of our policies and principles, and I hope we will be able to face the challenges with an open mind and in a straightforward manner. No country as educated, progressive and wealthy as ours will forever tolerate 700,000 unfilled dental cavities. What we ourselves fail to do may be done for us by others.

From time to time during the past year I have become more aware of the need for more continuity in the affairs of the Virginia State Dental Association. I would not want to say anything that would detract from the efficiency of the officers of this association. They do well all that they can in the time available, but there are many, many responsibilities and duties which demand far greater consideration than our present officers should be expected to give. There is much to be done and we have no one who is in a position to devote all of his time to the duties, responsibilities and obligations of our society. We are a large group with over 1200 members. We are charged with the responsibility of taking care of the dental needs of the citizens of the State of Virginia. Problems of some magnitude and importance arise from time to time. Decisions must be made which should be given much thought and consideration, yet we have no strong, centralized organization in our society. The experiences and knowledge of one administration are lost to the succeeding one. This should not happen in a group as important as ours. The time has arrived when we should give serious thought to the full time position of Executive Secretary of the Virginia State Dental Association. The need for such a position is here. If we need it we should want it, and if we want it we should have it.

We are members of a great profession and a needed one. It can continue to be great if it takes its future into its own hands, learns from the experiences we have had, and develops successful programs that both the public and the profession can accept, work with, and progress with. This is what all of us are seeking.

Being President of the Virginia State Dental Association is a high honor. It is the highest honor I have ever received. Words cannot express my appreciation of your esteem. It is a fact, however, that like my predecessors who have confided in me, I know that I will appreciate most of all the responsibilities of Past President.

DR. STARBUCK: Ladies and Gentlemen, I want to thank you. I want to thank all of my friends who worked so hard. I will do my best. I will also do my best not to let the men down that supported such a fine man as Dr. Bowman. Had I known yesterday that Dr. Bowman would be opposing me I would not have let my name go up. I know I can count on him as he could have counted on me had he won. Again, I want to thank you. (Applause)

PRESIDENT SIMPSON: Is there any old business to be called to our attention at this time?

### UNFINISHED BUSINESS

#### Proposed Amendments to the By-Laws

DR. UPSHUR: Gentlemen, as you know, changes in the Constitution and By-Laws are made by voting twice at the Annual Meeting. The Executive Council on Sunday afternoon voted for some changes which were included in its report to the opening session yesterday morning and it is necessary that we vote again on these tonight.

PRESIDENT SIMPSON: Is there any new business to be presented at this time?

### NEW BUSINESS

#### Resolution Opposing King-Anderson Bill

DR. BOWMAN: Mr. Chairman, Members of the Virginia State Dental Association, Ladies and Gentlemen: I have been asked to present this resolution:

The question of how to provide health care for our aged has captured the interest of all Americans. It is unfortunate it has become a political issue, with the voting potential of our older citizens making it difficult to obtain an objective and reasonable solution to the problem.

The Virginia State Dental Association meeting in Richmond on May 1st, 1962 recognizes the many implications involved in proposed legislation which would promote drastic changes in the traditional and time tested patterns of American life.

Therefore be it resolved:

The Virginia State Dental Association make known to the Congress of the United States its opposition to the King-Anderson bill (H.R. 4222) which would utilize the Social Security Administration mechanism for financing a program of health care for the aged.

Be it further resolved:

The Virginia delegation in the Congress be promptly advised of this action by the Virginia State Dental Association.

I am sure that most of you are familiar with this bill before Congress. The American Dental Association has gone on record as being opposed to it. The various Components in the State of Virginia have gone on record as being opposed to it. We as individuals have registered our opposition to it through our representatives in Congress and

I can see no reason why this delegation should not go on record as being opposed to the health care for the aged being attached to our Social Security program.

Mr. Chairman, I move the adoption of this resolution.

(The motion was jointly seconded by Drs. Gray and Upshur and on vote was declared carried.)

PRESIDENT SIMPSON: Any other new business?

In closing, may I say that I am determined to do the job at hand and to meet this challenge. I am deeply grateful to you for this trust and I pledge my time and efforts toward fulfilling these responsibilities and maintaining the dignity which this office represents. Thank you most kindly.

Is there any further business?

I declare the meeting adjourned.

## MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COUNCIL MEETING

Wednesday Morning, May 2, 1962

**Call to Order** — The second meeting of the Executive Council, held in connection with the 93rd Annual Meeting of the Virginia State Dental Association, convened in the John Marshall Hotel, Richmond, Virginia, Wednesday morning, May 2, 1962 and was called to order at 8:30 a.m. by Dr. T. T. Upshur, chairman of the Council.

The Chairman extended a special welcome to Dr. Starbuck, newly elected President-elect, and noted with pleasure that Dr. Blevins and Dr. Crews were returned to the Council for another term.

**Minutes of previous meeting** — On motion by Dr. Blevins, seconded by Dr. Crews, it was voted to dispense with the reading of the minutes



of the previous meeting held on April 29, 1962, since they had been read at the opening session of the General Assembly and approved.

**Report of Audit Committee** — Dr. Crews presented the report of the Audit Committee, composed of Dr. Holsinger, Dr. Powell and himself as chairman. The Committee stated that the books of the association were examined and found to be in order. The Secretary-Treasurer was commended on the efficient manner in which the records were kept. The Audit Committee recommended that more complete information "be brought to the attention of the Executive Council by including with the Treasurer's Report a copy of the Auditor's Report and to further include a statement of assets and liabilities in the statement."

On motion by Dr. Crews, the report of the Audit Committee was accepted.

### UNFINISHED BUSINESS

**Contribution to Virginia Council on Health and Medical Care** — Dr. Simpson called attention to the action taken at the meeting of the Executive Council on April 30, 1961 to increase the contribution to the Virginia Council on Health and Medical Care from \$200 to \$300 but the budgets for 1962 and 1963 do not include this increase.

On motion by Dr. Bradshaw, seconded by Dr. Snapp, it was voted that the contribution to the Virginia Council on Health and Medical Care for 1963 be raised from \$200 to \$300.

**Portfolio of Pertinent Data for New Members** — The Chairman read from the minutes of last year's breakfast meeting of the Executive Council the suggestion made by Dr. McCloud "that consideration be given to preparing a portfolio of pertinent data that could be given to new members which would outline the function of the Relief Committee, the sponsoring of the insurance program by the State Association, and other items that would result in a better informed membership." He read the action taken which instructed the Secretary to include the supplying of the portfolio with the Revised By-Laws as the Secretary suggested he thought could be done at not a great deal of expense. The Chairman said he did not think this had been done, for undoubtedly a good reason, and he wondered if the same action should be taken this year to have the portfolio sent out.

The Secretary reported that the new members actually received a copy of the Revised Constitution and By-Laws and the ADA Prin-

ciples of Ethics but the ADA was unable to furnish gratis enough copies to give to all of the members; that there was a general mailing to all members of the Revised Constitution and By-Laws and a communication from M. A. Gesner, Inc., pertaining to insurance, but it was learned that a special purchase order would have to be made for other important material supplied in quantity by the ADA, such as brochures and pamphlets pertaining to dental health, legislation, etc., and he did not have the authorization to purchase this material which he originally thought would be furnished without charge.

In the discussion which followed it was pointed out that what was needed by new members was specific data pertaining to the Virginia State Dental Association in addition to what the ADA may send out, and that the expense involved in mailings to the general membership was a factor to be considered.

On motion by Mr. McCloud, it was voted that the Secretary make up a sample portfolio of pertinent material and send to each member of the Executive Council with an estimate as to the cost for mailing to new members and also to every member.

**Communication from ADA concerning membership** — It was voted, on motion by Dr. Tinsley, seconded by Dr. Snapp, that the results of Colonel Barton's review of a component's by-laws in relation to the By-Laws of the State Association, as set forth in his communication addressed to Dr. Simpson on March 22, 1962, be mailed to the American Dental Association and to Dr. Wm. A. Garrett, Fifth District Trustee, to set forth the position of the Virginia State Dental Association on the question of membership.

**Military Affairs Committee: "Fee Survey"** — Dr. Blevins reported that most of the members of the Military Affairs Committee along with Dr. Upshur met on Tuesday and decided to recommend to the Executive Council that the average fee schedule for each component be mailed to the president of each component society and that he with his executive committee consider using it as an educational thing for the membership of the component society; that there was also a discussion of the "Fee Survey" being placed in the hands of the Legislative subcommittee (dealing with the establishment of a dental service corporation) for further study so that when the dental service corporation is established by state legislation this data would be available to this organization. The Chairman reported the advice of the Fifth District Trustee, in which he said he concurred, that the dissemination of the data presented in the "Fee Survey" be confined to the Executive Council and component society officers at this time. There was no further discussion of this recommendation of the committee.

The previous action taken by the Executive Council dealing with the "Fee Survey" was reviewed (see pp. 17-18).

On motion by Dr. Snapp, it was voted that the Military Affairs Committee complete the "Fee Survey" with the aid of the Legislative subcommittee (composed of Drs. D. B. Allen, S. Nelson Gray and M. Bagley Walker) and turn the information over to the Executive Council for its consideration.

**Employment of an Executive Secretary** — The Chairman referred to the recommendation contained in the President's Address that serious consideration be given to the employment of an executive secretary, which the Trustee of the Fifth District also supported. The Chairman expressed his personal desire to have a committee appointed by the President to study this matter further than had been done by previous committees.

It was moved by Dr. Powell, and seconded, that a committee to study the advisability of employing an executive secretary be formed. Dr. McAfee suggested that this committee present a report to the Executive Council giving a complete breakdown as to the cost involved and setting forth the amount of increase in state society dues that would be necessary to employ an executive secretary. The pending motion was put to a vote and declared carried together with Dr. McAfee's suggestion as to the functioning of the committee.

Dr. Tinsley suggested that following the printing of the supplemental report of the Legislative Committee dealing with the question of employment of an executive secretary there appear the report of the committee that investigated this matter about four years ago which was published in the Bulletin at that time.

---

### REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE "STUDY FOR EXECUTIVE SECRETARY"

This Committee was appointed by your President, Doctor Bradshaw, prompted by a motion made and carried in the Executive Council of last year to study the advisability of having a full time Executive Secretary for the Virginia State Dental Association.

Your Committee has studied the plans that have been adopted by a great many other states such as the State of Michigan, Montana, Florida, Vermont, Missouri, Massachusetts and the State of Tennessee. The State of Tennessee furnished the best comparison for our State of Virginia to study. Tennessee has, approximately, the same number

of members that Virginia has. One thousand members will be used for our bases of calculation since Virginia and Tennessee both have approximately one thousand members each. Our present income of \$8.00, eight dollars dues is now eight thousand dollars per year and in our eighty-seven years of existence we have only a meager reserve of no consequence to draw on for any additional expense at this time or any time in the future on our present dues. In order to set up an office with an Executive Secretary we have studied the financial report of Tennessee and find the cost to the State of Tennessee for that office to be \$17,236.00, which includes office rent, supplies, stationery, printing, newsletter, social security taxes, postage, telephone, telegraph, linen service, clipping service, and misc., Executive Secretary's salary, Executive Secretary's assistant salary, hospitalization insurance, travel and insurance and fidelity bonds. Total expenses being \$17,236.00 as stated above.

We find from the study of the financial report of the State Dental Society of Tennessee the members pay \$25.00 dues to the State of Tennessee, Component dues \$5.00, American Dental Association dues \$22.00, making a grand total of \$52.00 per year. In order to duplicate this set-up in the Virginia State Dental Association our dues would have to be raised from the present eight dollars to twenty-five dollars per year per member, add your Component and American Dental Association dues would give us a grand total of fifty-two dollars to sixty dollars per year, dues depending on which Component Society you live in.

Your Committee greatly fears the rank and file of our membership would not approve of this drastic step up in our association dues at this time, but after much study and talking with the members that are much concerned about the future welfare of our association, your Committee does hereby recommend that our dues be increased to ten dollars per year; thereby, giving us an additional two thousand dollars to our present income, which would make it possible to give a full time Assistant Secretary under our present set-up. Thereby, keeping the Secretary's office under the supervision of one of our own members of the Virginia State Dental Association.

**Additional meeting of Executive Council** — The Chairman called for a brief discussion of the advisability of the Executive Council meeting more often than at the time of the state annual meeting. It was agreed that the Sunday afternoon meetings does not give time to adequately discuss a great many important questions, but it was the consensus that it be left to the President and the Chairman of the Executive Council to decide whether or not a special meeting is necessary.

**Election of Chairman and Vice-Chairman** — Dr. Bradshaw commended Dr. Upshur for the time and effort expended and the responsibility he had undertaken as chairman of the Executive Council this past year and nominated him to succeed himself for another year, which was severally seconded. On motion by Dr. Barrick, nominations were closed and the Secretary cast the unanimous ballot for Dr. Upshur. Dr. Snapp nominated Dr. Crews to serve another year as vice-chairman, which was seconded by Dr. Blevins. Dr. Haggerty nominated Dr. Hume Powell. Nominations were declared closed and the Secretary was instructed to distribute the ballots and act as teller. Following the casting of the ballots and tallying of the vote, the Chairman announced that Dr. Crews had been reelected to succeed himself as vice-chairman.

**Letters of appreciation** — On motion by Dr. Blevins, seconded by Dr. Haggerty, it was voted that letters of appreciation be sent to the Local Arrangements Committee, to the Richmond Dental Society, to the Ladies Auxiliary of the Richmond Dental Society and to the John Marshall Hotel.

**Functioning of Committees** — On motion by Dr. Starbuck, seconded by Dr. Blevins, it was voted that all committee members receive copies of the committee reports at the same time they are sent to the members of the Executive Council, and that the members of committees be notified and invited to attend committee meetings when such are held.

**Method of conducting elections** — Dr. Starbuck initiated a discussion of the haphazard and incorrect method of conducting elections at the Business Meetings of the General Assembly on Tuesday nights. Dr. Tinsley stated that plans have been made to take care of this matter in the future by having each member deposit his ballot in a ballot box with the Secretary there to check off his name from a list of actual members when the ballot is cast. President Wall added that a Sergeant-at-Arms will be placed at the door and the door will be closed when the election starts. It was informally agreed that this proposed method of conducting elections be put into effect on a trial basis.



**Portfolio of Committee reports to be sent to President-elect** — The Secretary stated that he thought it would be possible to comply with President-elect Starbuck's request that he be sent copies of all the committee original reports of this past year.

**Procedure on selecting place of annual meetings** — In answer to Dr. Starbuck's request for information as to the procedure followed in selecting place of annual meetings, Dr. McAfee stated that the meeting places have already been selected up to 1967, subject to change on the wish of the President. President Wall advised that the President-elect is a member of the Special Committee on Time and Place of Annual Meeting for this next year and can request that the Executive Council reconsider the meeting place for 1964 if he wishes to do so.

**Nominating Committee to submit names to Executive Council for State Board and ADA Delegates and Alternates** — The Chairman referred to the Nominating Committee which was appointed this year to submit names to the Executive Council for the State Board of Dental Examiners and ADA Delegates and Alternates as recommended in last year's President's Address. He asked that consideration be given to whether or not it should be continued.

On motion by Dr. Tinsley, seconded by Dr. McAfee, it was voted that a Nominating Committee appointed by the Chairman of the Council be continued.

**Letter to Dr. B. S. Burks** — The Secretary was directed to write a letter to Dr. B. S. Burks, who is in St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Richmond, expressing the Executive Council's sincere regrets at his illness and a hope for his speedy recovery.

**Adjournment** — All business having been concluded, the meeting adjourned at 10:30 a.m.

## REPORT OF VIRGINIA STATE BOARD OF DENTAL EXAMINERS

The 87th regular meeting of the Virginia State Board of Dental Examiners was called to order by the President, Dr. Moffett H. Bowman in the assembly room at Hotel Richmond at 9 a.m., June 11, 1961.

Dr. S. Nelson Gray, Alexandria, Virginia, recently appointed by Governor Almond to succeed Dr. Moffett H. Bowman, whose term of ten years expires June 30, 1961 was also present and was given a warm welcome by all of the members.

In accordance with a resolution passed under date of April 24, 1960, the Board met on Saturday, June 10th, in the Richmond Room of Hotel Richmond for the examination of 20 "Merit Graduates" of the School of Dentistry of the Medical College of Virginia. Ten of the applicants were heard from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. and ten from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m.

There were 121 dental applicants and 17 dental hygiene applicants; 10 dentists failed, which was 8¼% of the class. All hygienists passed.

Dr. R. E. L. Miller, Jr., was sent as a delegate to the Southern Conference of Dental Deans in New Orleans, January 6 and 7, 1962. Dr. S. Nelson Gray was a delegate to Detroit, January 15 through 19, 1962, attending a Workshop on Future Dental Manpower Requirements and on the Training and Utilization of Auxiliary Personnel. Drs. Brann, P. D. Miller, R. E. L. Miller, Jr., and Gray attended the 18th annual meeting of the Council on Dental Education and Licensure in Chicago, Saturday, February 17, 1962. We should feel much indebted to these gentlemen for spending so much time in attending these important meetings.

Several borderline ethical cases have been reported to the Board, which have been handled according to the best judgment of the Board.

The advent of many Cuban dentists to the United States has given much concern to this Board, as well as to the Boards of some other

states. We have adhered to the policy of recognizing only graduates of schools recognized by the Council on Dental Education of the American Dental Association.

Since our last annual meeting we sorrowfully report the passing of two of our former board members, namely, Dr. William N. Hodgkin and Dr. Emory F. Hodges.

The Laboratory Prescription law, known as House Bill No. 126 was presented on January 17, 1962 by Messrs. Reynolds, Thompson and Elliott, and duly passed by the House of Delegates and the Senate.

The Directories of Dentists and Dental Hygienists, under date of September 1, 1961, were delivered to the Department of Purchases and Supply for printing on September 3, 1961, but, on account of labor or other troubles, same were not delivered until February 21, 1962, which accounts for the late delivery. Directories were mailed to all dentists and hygienists registered in Virginia as of March 1, 1962.

The financial report covering the period of February 1, 1961 through January 31, 1962, is herewith attached.

**SUPPLEMENTAL REPORT OF DR. DAVID M. BEAR**

I would like to make the following remarks to the Executive Committee as chairman of the Legislative Committee but not necessarily for the committee as a whole.

In the past several years there has been considerable discussion among those officers and other members of the society who have been actively engaged in the affairs of this society, in regard to the need for an executive secretary. It is my belief that the majority of these men have favored the employment of an individual to fill such a position. This in no way reflects adversely upon the splendid work and cooperation of our present and past secretaries. However, it does reflect the need for a full time employee of the society who can see that many activities of this society can be broadened in scope. It is also readily recognized that many activities carried on by the officers and committees of the society are not understood or even known by members of this society. This in part is one reason perhaps that the "Service Corporation Bill" presented at the past legislature was allowed to die in committee.

It is further conceded by many that our public relations leaves a lot to be desired. You perhaps have noted that the A.D.A. has stepped up its programs in this field and it is equally important that we do so in this state. This is another area in which a capable executive secretary could benefit our society and the people of this state.

As all of us know the various programs and activities that we find ourselves involved in now are far more complex than they have been in the past. They also can be counted on to become more so. This will require more time, energy, and application to care for those problems than I believe most of us are willing or able to do. So again without the use of a full time qualified employee to help handle these matters, they will be done inadequately or not at all.

The cost of such an employee or position being created should not be a deterrent to a society which wishes to be progressive. If as some members of this society believe, that they can raise sufficient funds among the dentists of the state to bring about a school for dental auxiliaries, such sums as \$1,000 per man being mentioned, then I can see no reason why a small increase in state society dues would not be enough to take care of this abovementioned needed position.

I am sure that there are others present here who could made additional remarks in support of this report but I believe the above will suffice to, I hope, create a new interest and an effort to bring about the establishment of an executive secretary.
