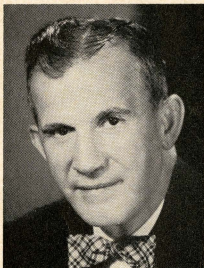
## Four New Members Named to Board of Visitors Bemiss Succeeds Scott as Chairman



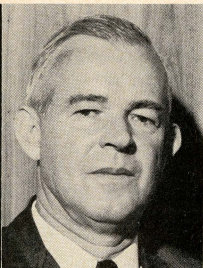

Four prominent Virginia business and professional men are new members of our Board of Visitors by appointment of Governor J. Lindsay Almond, Jr.

Eppa Hunton, IV, Richmond lawyer and former member of the Board, has been elected to serve again as chairman of the Executive Committee, which he headed from 1954 to 1958.

Other new members are C. Francis Cocke of Roanoke, chairman of the board of the First National Exchange Bank and past president of the American Bankers Association; Dr. Edward Myers of Norfolk, a dentist and MCV alumnus; and William T. Reed, Jr. of Goochland County, who is president of Larus and Brother Company, Incorporated, and active in many other Richmond and Virginia business enterprises.

These men replace Harry H. Augustine of Richmond, who retired from the Board because of ill health, and three members who on June 30 completed the two consecutive terms on the Board that are permitted by statute—Buford Scott, who was chairman of the Board, and W. Welby Beverley, both of Richmond, and Dr. William N. Hodgkin, dentist, of Warrenton.

Mr. Hunton's interest and that of his family in the College date back for many years. He previously served on the Board from 1932 to 1951 and from 1954 to 1958. He received his undergraduate education and his law degree from the University of Virginia. He was admitted to the Virginia bar in 1926 and is a partner in the Richmond law firm of Hunton, Williams, Gay, Moore and Powell. He is also active in several business concerns, is a director of the First and Merchants National Bank, and actively identified with many civic, cultural, and philanthropic enterprises. During World War II, he served with the Army in the European Theatre

of Operations, going overseas with our 45th General Hospital. He won the Bronze Star and was released from active duty with the rank of major.

Mr. Cocke, also a University of Virginia alumnus, is a lawyer as well as a banker. He was admitted to the Virginia Bar in 1910 and through 1946 was senior member of the firm of Cocke, Hazelgrove and Shackelford in Roanoke. In addition to being former president of the American Bankers Association, he is past president of the Virginia State Library Board and of the Virginia Bankers Association. He was first department commander for Virginia of the American Legion after

## Top Priority Given New Medical Building

The proposed Medical Education Building is Priority No. 1 in our capital outlay budget requests to the Governor and the General Assembly of 1960.

The new building, to be erected on the north half of the block between Eleventh and Twelfth streets and facing on Marshall Street, will provide the College for the first time with a consolidated teaching center for the school of medicine.

The administration, acting with the approval of the Board of Visitors, re-

## Gifts, Grants, and Contracts Top All Previous Years

Funds received by the College during the past fiscal year through gifts, grants, and contracts totaled \$1,680,807—a new peak which surpassed 1957-58 by approximately \$230,000.

Gifts amounted to \$212,013, grants, \$1,205,677, and contracts, \$263,117. The principal increase was in grants, which have shown a steady growth for the past several years.

In reporting these figures to the Board of Visitors, President Smith said, "These figures express in dra-

matic fashion the high respect in which our faculty members are held by the many donors and grantors concerned."

The College now participates in a wide gamut of research projects, sponsored by both public and private agencies. An important new project is now under way, under the sponsorship of the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs, to raise funds for the acquisition of a 2,000,000-volt x-ray machine for further research in whole body radiation and for the conventional methods of cancer treatment. The machine, installed and housed, is estimated to cost approximately \$160,000.

Much research in this field has been done already at MCV in the surgical research laboratory with the use of a 1,000,000-volt machine, but this equipment is not designed for or adaptable to the hospital uses envisioned for the 2,000,000-volt facility.

quested Governor Almond and his Advisory Board on the Budget to allocate \$4,400,000 in State funds for the construction of the building; this would be supplemented by \$1,378,000 in federal funds.

Plans for this important structure were prepared with funds amounting to \$225,000 made available for the purpose by the 1958 General Assembly. Meanwhile, remaining parcels of land needed for the building site have been acquired. Construction can start shortly after July 1, 1960 if the requested money is made available.

**IN MEMORIAM****PORTER PAISLEY VINSON****1890-1959***"A Christian is the highest style of a man."*—EDWARD YOUNG

The death of Dr. Porter Paisley Vinson on August 28 has saddened all at the College. Few of us are as ready to "pass on to the other side" as was Doctor Vinson. He needs not adjectives to describe him; we need only say, "A Christian gentleman has gone." In those three words—a Christian gentleman—is a deserved tribute that few of us merit in our hectic world of today. No more shall we hear his booming voice on the eighth floor—no more will his hearty laugh ring out—but the example of Christian life he set will be long remembered.

Born in Davidson, North Carolina, he was graduated from Davidson College in 1909 and his alma mater honored him with the doctor of science degree in 1925. He was a member of the board of Davidson College for many years.

Doctor Vinson took his medical training at the University of Maryland Medical School and was graduated in 1914. After his medical service in World War I, he took fellowships at the Mayo Clinic and was chief of bronchoscopy there until 1936 when he joined the MCV faculty as professor of bronchoscopy.

He was among the leaders in the field of bronchoscopy in the United States and had written several books and articles in his field. Both the College and the nation have suffered the loss of a great man in his specialty.

**TOMPKINS-McCAW LIBRARY NEWS**

A recent acquisition of interest to pathologists is *Handbuch der Speziellen Pathologischen Anatomie und Histologie* by F. Henke and R. Rossle, published by Springer Verlag in Berlin. The thirteen volumes are indeed a welcome addition to our collection.

Forty periodicals have been added to our collection in the last twelve months—some by subscription—some as gifts, notably seven English translations of Russian journals, which are distributed to designated medical libraries through the National Institutes of Health.

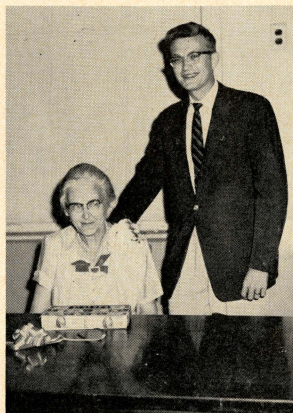
Her sick leave record was noteworthy—she was absent on only one occasion during her employment due to illness. She felt that sick leave was insurance and that it should be used only when necessary.
