Committee Named to Pick Chairman

Dr. W. Taliaferro Thompson, Jr., professor and chairman of the department of medicine, heads a committee of seven to recommend a chairman of the department of pediatrics.

Other members are Dr. Walter Bundy, Jr., associate professor of pediatrics; Dr. Robert Senescu, professor and chairman of the department of psychiatry; Dr. Boyd W. Haynes, Jr., assistant professor of surgery; Dr. Erling S. Hegre, professor of anatomy; Dr. Robert Q. Marston, assistant dean of the School of Medicine, and Dr. William F. Malony, *ex officio*, dean of the School of Medicine.

This committee will seek a permanent successor to Dr. Lee E. Sutton, Jr., who retired from the chairmanship last year. Dr. Carolyn McCue is serving as interim chairman.

McGuire Lectures — October 22-24

The thirty-first annual McGuire Lecture Series will be held here October 22-24. Outstanding American and European specialists will participate in the series. The annual meeting of the Society of Pelvic Surgeons will be held in conjunction with the lecture series. The program has been arranged by Dr. Randolph H. Hoge, professor of gynecology and chairman of the division of gynecology. Doctor Hoge is one of the founders of the Society and is currently vice-president.

Dr. Joe Vincent Meigs, clinical professor of gynecology, Harvard Medical School, will give the annual McGuire Lecture on October 22 at 8:30 p. m. A symposium on pelvic disease will be held on October 22 and 23. Dr. George N. Papanicolau will be among the opening day speakers. Programs are available through Dr. K. Nelson.

Mrs. McGuire Accepts Board Resolution

Announcement of the establishment of The Stuart McGuire Professorship of Surgery was made on September 28 during the Convocation exercises of the 1959-60 session.

Samuel M. Bemiss, chairman of our Board of Visitors, presented Mrs. Stuart McGuire a framed copy of the Board's resolution designating the professorship held by the chairman of the department of surgery as *The Stuart McGuire Professorship*.

Dr. Hunter McGuire, nephew of Dr. Stuart McGuire, presented to the College on behalf of the staff of McGuire Clinic and St. Luke's Hospital the desk and chair used by his uncle for many years at St. Luke's Hospital.

Doctor McGuire was professor of surgery at MCV from 1913 to 1922. He was president of the University College of Medicine, founded by his father, Dr. Hunter Holmes McGuire, in 1893, which was consolidated with MCV in 1913. Following the consolidation, he was dean of MCV from 1913 to 1919, president from 1919 to 1925, and chairman of the Board of Visitors from 1932 until his death in 1948.

Miss Erline Perkins Has New Book Off The Press

Miss Erline Perkins, associate director of the department of nursing and assistant professor of nursing, has a new manual entitled Aseptic Technique for Operating Room Personnel off the press of W. B. Saunders Company. This manual will serve as a guide for the professional nursing student, giving her a foundation for her role as a leader on the nursing team in the operating room. It can be used equally as well by graduate practical nurses, operating room technicians, surgical aides, and others.

MCV-A Statewide Institution

An impressive story of MCV contributions to Virginia and to its people was related to the Governor and his budget advisors when they visited the College last month.

Here are some of the highlights:

Dentistry—Almost two-thirds of the dentists now practicing in the State are graduates of our School of Dentistry.

Pharmacy—More than three-fourths of the pharmacists now practicing in Virginia are MCV graduates.

Medicine-Of the 2,000 Virginia trained physicians now practicing in the State, almost two-thirds were educated here.

Nursing—Of some 500 students now enrolled in state-supported schools of professional nursing, MCV is educating more than 60 per cent.

Scope of Service—The various schools of the College last year enrolled students from 90 of the 98 counties of the State. The hospitals of the College served 32,000 inpatients, representing 96 of the counties; the clinics recorded 93,000 patient visits, representing service to 88 Virginia counties.

Dr. R. Blackwell Smith, Jr., president, and the deans of the respective schools emphasized the statewide character of our institution, and the great effort on the College's part through the years to provide from its own resources as much as possible of the support needed. As an example, it was pointed out that gifts and grants and income from endowment and trusts amount to more than \$3,000,000 in a two-year period and represent, in part, the College's efforts to obtain from non-state sources funds for the support of its programs.

These institutional funds make possible appropriate programs, which the State does not wish to finance or at present is not able to finance. For example, funds derived from endowments and gifts and grants strengthen and supplement our program, without cost to or commitment on the part of the state, by:

(1) Financing almost entirely the vitally necessary and extensive research programs regarded by all informed medical educators as essential to progress in medical practice and to sound medical education;

(2) Providing funds for supplementing state faculty salary scales when necessary to obtain scarce and expensive faculty personnel;

(3) Providing supplementary and otherwise unavailable teaching services by research personnel paid entirely from such institutional funds;

(4) Providing fellowships in support of predoctoral and postdoctoral students and scholarships;

(5) Providing supplemental funds for maintenance and minor alterations for which state funds are not available;

(6) Providing equipment, often expensive, for which state funds are not available.

In viewing the Hospital Division requests, the Governor and his advisors were reminded that in addition to providing patients for teaching purposes, the appropriation for patient care furnishes needed medical services for indigents, who are unable to pay for their care and for whom no political subdivision will accept responsibility.

Members of the College family, and friends of the institution, await with keenest interest the Governor's recommendations to the General Assembly next January.

••• M C V Needs Defined in Budget Requests •••

Governor Almond and his advisory board on the budget have under consideration MCV appropriation requests for 1960-62, designed to meet our essential needs for the next two years beginning July 1.

First on the list of capital outlays is our request for \$4,400,000 in state funds for the Medical Education Building, which President R. Blackwell Smith, Jr., described as imperative "if Virginia's need for physicians in increasing numbers is to be met."

From the general fund, which is made up of the Commonwealth's general tax revenues, we have asked for \$10,867,155 for the next two years toward the maintenance and operation of both the College and Hospital divisions; this is an increase of \$3,278,497 over the current biennium, or approximately 33 per cent.

From our own resources—student tuition, revenues from hospital patients, et cetera, MCV will provide \$15,956,975 of its total maintenance and operation budget of \$26,824,130 for the biennium.

Capital outlay requests include \$4,825,300 for the College Division and \$1,245,000 for the Hospital Division.

The bulk of the increase in operating funds requested will go for personnel. In the College Division, the increase requested is for the employment of a nucleus of full-time faculty, particularly in the School of Medicine, and in the Hospital Division for filling vacancies and adding other sorely needed personnel for the desired level of patient care.

Medical Education Building—\$4,400,000 (to be supplemented with \$1,378,000 in federal funds). Site: North half of block between Eleventh and Twelfth streets, fronting on Marshall.

Purchase of property—\$300,000 (Richmond School Shop Building on North Twelfth Street, and City Juvenile Court Building).

Greenhouse-\$15,300.

Stone and masonry repairs-\$10,000.

Air conditioning stack room, Tompkins-McCaw Library -\$25,000.

Books for library-\$20,000.

Special technical dental equipment-\$34,000.

Instructional TV equipment for dental school-\$7,000.

HOSPITAL DIVISION

Equipment—\$100,000, including \$75,000 to replace obsolescent x-ray equipment.

Renovation of St. Philip Hospital-\$125,000.

Apartment building for married interns and residents-\$300,000.

Refrigeration alterations for main kitchen-\$32,000.

Renovation of Cabaniss Hall-\$130,000.

Modernization of air conditioning on operating floor MCV Hospital-\$35,000.

Air conditioning first and second floors, A. D. Williams Memorial Clinic-\$95,000.

Increasing capacity and modernizing central heating plant—\$353,000.
