Doctor McKechnie Named To Head New Division

Dr. Franklin B. McKechnie, associate professor, has been appointed director of the newly established St. Philip division of the department of radiology. The new division will be responsible for anesthesiology work at the St. Philip and Enion G. Williams hospitals.

Doctor McKechnie came to MCV in 1958 from the Miami University Medical School where he served as associate professor for two years. He had served previously at Albany Medical School, the Indiana University Medical School, and Ohio University, after residency at Indiana and internship at Johns Hopkins. A native of Boston, he took his undergraduate work at Harvard and received his M.D. at Johns Hopkins in 1945. He served two years with the Navy prior to entering upon his practice and teaching career.

Seven-Story Parking Garage Will Accommodate 565 Cars

The parking problem in the MCV area will be greatly alleviated this fall with completion of a seven-story parking garage on Thirteenth Street, north of Thirteenth Street.

This \$900,000 project—financed by funds from the unrestricted endowment of the College—is now moving forward rapidly.

Entrance to the 565-car facility will be from the foot of Clay Street and exit will be from Thirteenth Street. There will be one-way traffic through the garage. Floors will slope two and one-half degrees, obviating the construction of a special ramp. Two self-operating elevators will enable those parking on the lower decks to easily and quickly return to Clay Street, within short walking distance of the various hospitals, clinics, and other buildings in the College area.

MCV long has recognized the need for additional parking space for patients and visitors to the College and its hospitals, as well as for faculty, employees, and students.

Selection of the site for the medical education building on Marshall Street between Eleventh and Twelfth streets, emphasized the need for additional parking space, as this site is now the principal parking area available to patients,

Mrs. Evelyn C. Bacon Succeeds Miss Berneice Skeehan

Mrs. Evelyn C. Bacon has been appointed director of the associate degree program in nursing.

A native of Iowa, Mrs. Bacon received her B.A. degree from the University of Iowa in 1938 and finished her graduate nurse training in 1940. She received her M.S. from the University of Chicago in 1946 and since then has finished about a year and a half of post-master's work.

Mrs. Bacon has had wide experience as general staff nurse, head, nurse, and as supervisor in both public and private hospitals. She has been a member of the teaching staff of the schools of nursing at the University of Iowa, University of California, and University of Virginia.

She is a member of the American Nurses Association, National League for Nursing, and Sigma Theta Tau.

Dr. Solomon Papper Joins Faculty

Dr. Solomon Papper, former associate professor of medicine at Tufts, has joined the department of medicine as associate professor.

Doctor Papper is in charge of the renal-metabolic section and in addition to his teaching is continuing investigations, which he already had under way, in the field of renal and metabolic disease.

At Boston, he had been a member of the faculty at Tufts since 1953 and also on the staff of the Boston VA Hospital, where he became assistant chief of the medical service and director of research in 1957.

Doctor Papper, a native of New York, received his A.B. at Columbia and his M.D. at New York University. After internship at Mt. Sinai Hospital, he served residencies at Goldwater Memorial Hospital (N.Y.U.) and Cushing VA Hospital at Framingham, Massachusetts. He was a research fellow at Thorndike Memorial Laboratory, Boston City Hospital, and Harvard Medical School, 1950-52, and served the following year as an associate at the May Institute for Medical Research, Cincinnati, Ohio.

He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Alpha Omega Alpha and holds certification by the American Board of Internal Medicine. From 1946 to 1948, he served in the Army medical corps.

Doctor McKennis To Study In Chile

Dr. Herbert McKennis, professor of pharmacology, has accepted an invitation to serve as visiting professor at the Instituto de Fisiologia of the University of Chile at Santiago for the next six months.

He has been granted educational leave for the period, during which he will study the organization of a new teaching program in the Chile school of medicine. The invitation is regarded as a high tribute to Doctor McKennis and to the College.

An Exceptional Gift

The College is in receipt of one of the most generous and unusual gifts of recent years, which will be used to finance transportation of exchange scholars between MCV and the University of Frankfurt, Germany, and possibly other European universities.

The donor, a member of our faculty, requested anonymity because he seeks no personal recognition but rather seeks only to evidence appreciation for the opportunities afforded him here at MCV and at the same time encourage a mutually beneficial exchange of young scholars between his former and his adopted institution. In deference to his wishes, the College has accepted the gift without disclosing further details, but it is only fair to say that the escape of this esteemed teacher from the Nazi regime has redounded to the good of MCV and its students over a considerable period of years.

The newly established fund will be known as the *Albrecht Bethe Fund*, in honor of the donor's former professor of physiology at the University of Frankfurt. Although preference will be given to young scholars from Frankfurt, exchange arrangements may be worked out with other European institutions. Recipients of the awards will be nominated to the Board of Visitors through appropriate channels. The money will be restricted to transportation; because experience has shown that this is the one phase of exchange programs which oftentimes is neglected. Young scholars have little opportunity to accumulate a financial reserve, and it is believed assurance of help in financing transportation costs will serve as a great encouragement in developing the exchange program.

Aside from the direct benefits to the participating institutions and their scholars, the program also will serve to promote international understanding and goodwill, an important by-product.

This remarkable gift, as valuable as it is in these respects, may bring beneficent results of indefinite duration through the inspiration of others to emulate this unselfish action.

Atwood M. Wash

1891-1960

The Board of Visitors of the College at its meeting on March 11 passed the following resolution on the death of Dr. Atwood M. Wash, beloved professor of oral surgery and anesthesia in the school of dentistry:

"WHEREAS, the death of Dr. Atwood M. Wash on February 27, 1960, was a great loss to the Medical College of Virginia and to the dental profession which he had ably served for so many years; and

"WHEREAS, as chairman of the department of oral surgery and anesthesia and member of the dental faculty of the College for more than thirty years, he rendered outstanding service to his alma mater and to many generations of dental students; and

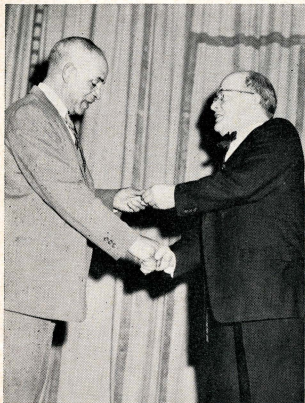
"WHEREAS, as practitioner, citizen, and churchman he epitomized the highest attributes of Christian leadership;

"NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Visitors of the Medical College of Virginia that the high esteem of this institution for Dr. Atwood M. Wash be hereby recorded in the permanent annals of the College, and, further, that its deepest sympathy in the passing of Doctor Wash be expressed to members of the family through an appropriately prepared copy of this resolution."

Through the "Looking" Glass

This month begins a new feature of *The Medicovan*. We shall focus our "looking glass" on those who have given many years of service to MCV.

On February 18, Herman Melton, laboratory technician in the department of anatomy, received his 50-year service pin. He was only 17 years old when in 1909 he started to help Dr. E. Guy Hopkins, pathologist at the University College of Medicine (combined with MCV in 1913), prepare slides. His salary for this work was \$18 a month.

Over the years, Mr. Melton has developed an apprenticeship for technicians in the techniques he has perfected. Over a dozen of his "graduates" are now holding responsible positions.

The Meltons have given their children splendid educations. Their only son, Herman, Jr., is a graduate of Howard University school of architecture; Julia is a graduate of Union University and teaches in the Richmond elementary schools; Camilla is also a graduate of Union University and of our St. Philip school of nursing.

Those who were graduated in medicine and in dentistry when MCV was smaller knew Herman Melton well. No one considered it the least strange when a physi-

cian or a dentist coming back to the College first asked about Herman Melton, going to see him for a chat about the "good old days."

Fifty-two years is a long time to spend in one place. During those years, Herman Melton has given truly dedicated service to the College he loves. Not only the members of the anatomy department but all at the College appreciate his worth as a person and the worth of his services to the institution.

Just a reminder that federal income tax reports are due on April 15!

Since most tasks are made lighter by a bit of laughter, we offer the following by F. R. Lidill, as written in Pilot Life Insurance Company's employee magazine. It will not ease the pain of tax payments for us but it may relieve some of the tension worked up when filling out Form 1040:
