Ground Broken For Maxitron Housing Addition

A contract for the \$68,000 addition to the Ennion G. Williams Hospital to house the Maxitron unit has been awarded to the Thorington Construction Company of Richmond, with completion set for October 1.

Using the traditional silver spade (used at all ground-breaking ceremonies at MCV) Miss Anne Dobie Peebles of Carson, president of the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs, broke the ground on April 28. The Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs has raised \$45,000 toward purchase of the Maxitron, and the American Cancer Society recently gave \$43,350 for the project.

The Maxitron itself, costing \$95,000, will be the only one in the East between Washington, D. C., and Charleston, South Carolina. It will be used for two basic purposes: (1) conventional treatment of cancer patients by x-ray, and (2) the promotion of cancer research through whole-body radiation. It will also serve other research uses, particularly in the field of transplantation of organs among unrelated individuals.

This 2,000,000-volt x-ray machine and the special housing for it will cost approximately \$165,000.

Doctor Vultee Returning to MCV

DR. FREDERICK E. VULTEE, JR., who left MCV in 1959 to become associate director of the Rehabilitation Institute of Chicago, will return on July 15 as professor of physical medicine and rehabilitation and director of the Baruch Center.

Doctor Vultee will succeed Dr. A. Ray Dawson, who has been acting director since Dr. Herbert C. Park resigned.

Doctor Vultee is a native of Fremont, Ohio, and holds both the B.S. and M.D. degrees from Yale University. He served his internship and residency in physical medicine and rehabilitation at Walter Reed and was staff physiatrist at Walter Reed from 1954 to 1957.

Certified by the American Board of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation in 1956, Doctor Vultee is a member of the American Congress of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, the American Association of Electromyography and Electrodiagnosis, the American Medical Association, and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Two Professors Honored

DR. HARRY WALKER, professor of medicine, will be honored by his alma mater, Randolph-Macon College, Ashland, with the honorary degree of doctor of laws at its Commencement exercises in June.

DR. RICHARD L. SIMPSON, professor of crown and bridge prosthodontics in the school of dentistry, has been named president-elect of the Virginia State Dental Association.

Both of these professors have been members of MCV faculty for many years and it is a real satisfaction to see these well deserved honors come to them.

Graduates Expected to Number 331 at Commencement on June 5 Virginians Total 234

Commencement exercises closing the one hundred twenty-third session will be held at 4 p. m., Sunday, June 5, at The Mosque. A complete schedule of Commencement functions is shown for the convenience of faculty and personnel.

By schools, the candidates for graduation are: medicine, 95; dentistry, 71; pharmacy, 56; nursing, 51; physical therapy, 10; hospital administration, 17; medical technology, 27; graduate studies, 4.

The first class from the two-year associate degree course in nursing will be graduated this year, numbering 19. In the school of graduate studies, there are two candidates for the Ph.D. degree and two for the master of science degree.

"Rusty" and "Dusty" Join Security Force

These dogs don't look vicious now but after 12 weeks of training they are expected to be the equal of two good men on police duty. "Rusty" and "Dusty" will be used a great deal in patrolling our parking lots.

During their training period, they will be taught obedience to their master, how to attack, and when to turn loose. Patrolmen R. L. Frith and K. W. Davis will have charge of training the dogs for police duty.

Not that "Rusty" and "Dusty" will relieve them, but six of the eight members of the security force will attend the Central Police School this summer. Classes will be held in the Virginia Law of Arrests, Virginia Criminal Law, Motor Vehicle Code of Virginia, the use of firearms, defense tactics, theft and accident investigations, and public relations. The school will consist of three 2-week courses and our security officers will attend two at a time. This work is in addition to the regular three-hour weekly training program here for our security officers.

Through the "Looking" Glass

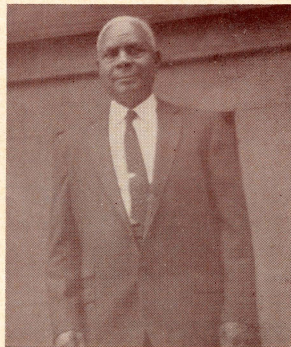
JAMES H. PETERSON came to work as a tissue technician at MCV in October, 1921. During these 39 years, he has remained in the department of gross pathology.
