In 1945, I was chief of Navy Service at St. Elizabeth's Hospital in D. C. where thirty young Navy residents in psychiatry were assigned to my unit for training. It was then rather unexpectedly that I confronted the crisis of my career.

One morning we were alerted to expect a trainload of psychotic Navy and Marine Corps veterans from the Pacific. The usual admission rate was 100 per month, I anxiously contemplated the impact this contingent would have upon our 400-bed hospital. Rushing to transfer others out of the receiving unit in order to accomodate 145 severely disturbed and suicidal combat veterans in a single day proved a monumental task! Starting at 7 a.m., under great pressure for the following twelve hours, we managed to examine all new patients, both mentally and physically, and assign them to appropriate nursing units. Such a challenge (the greatest of 30 years in government service) would have been impossible without those 30 inexperienced Navy physicians, most of whom eventually completed their training and pursued careers in psychi-

Most of these patients improved or fully recovered within a few months. Our toughest problem was to control wild homocidal and suicidal behavior. best done through the use of electroshock therapy. We had no tranquilizers in those days!

I'm sure these events played some part in the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare subsequently honAward.

There were quite a number of interesting happenings during my school years, but one that stands out happened during our state board examination. The board was given in two parts: theory and practical.

When we went to the laboratory for the practical we found eight or ten exercises or questions to complete. We were given a sealed envelope containing a weighed portion of sodium salicylate with instructions to make twelve 5 grain capsules of sodium salicylate. Upon opening the envelope there was a purple tablet of potassium permanganate in the powder.

What to do? I reread the question. It stated to make twelve 5 grain capsules of sodium salicylate, so I laid the tablet aside; not using it.

One of the Board members came by, stopped and watched me for a while, then asked me where the purple tablet was?

When I showed it to him he wanted to know why I had not used it. I asked him to read the question. If I had used the tablet it would contain something other than sodium salicylate. He immediately contacted other members of the board and after a conference they threw the question out. They could not agree whether it was used as a test for neatness or for accuracy in interpreting the instruction.






