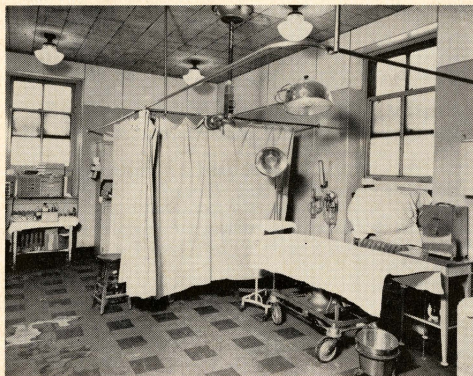

### Sixteenth Annual Stoneburner Lectures and Symposium on Genetics, March 13-15.

The annual Stoneburner lecture series and a symposium on *genetics in medicine* will be held in the Baruch Auditorium, March 13-15.

The Stoneburner lecturer this year is Dr. H. Bentley Glass, professor of biology, Johns Hopkins University. His first lecture at 8:30 p.m., March 13, will be on *Cellular Pathology, Rudolph Virchow, and the Gene*. His second lecture will be at 3 p.m., March 14, on *The Gene for Disease?*

We are making advances daily in improving our patient care whether through education or through changes in our physical plant. One step in advancement is the completion of the new Saint Philip emergency room now located in the basement of the A. D. Williams Memorial Clinic.

The new emergency room provides more space and modern facilities—more and better equipped examining rooms, an improved 24-hour observation area, and a separate suture and triage area. Waiting room facilities have been enlarged and made more comfortable.

Provision has been made to facilitate the handling of medical records and communication is supported by a new paging system. The entire area is served by its own air-conditioning plant. Major lighting improvements over the old facilities have been made.

An entirely new x-ray unit has been constructed in the north corridor between MCV Hospital and the Saint Philip emergency service area. This will provide two x-ray examining rooms as well as the most advanced system of film processing. In addition, there is a secondary system for film processing should the primary system fail. The radiology suite includes dressing room facilities, an office, and a reading room for radiologists.

The new emergency room will be under the nursing supervision of Mrs. A. B. Scott, who is a veteran of 25 years of service in the old emergency room. She will be assisted by Mrs. H. Miles, Miss R. Nowlin, Miss F. Worman, and others.

The old Saint Philip emergency room area will be completely renovated for the reception of OB patients.

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Symposium for General Practitioners Set for February 27-March 1  
by Continuation Education Department

# What's Going On in Our Schools and Courses

## Department of Anatomy

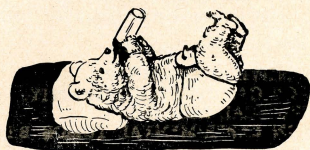

## WHAT HAPPENS WHEN IT SNOWS? ? ?

You finally get in to work after innumerable delays and you think you have exhausted your profane vocabulary, but nine times out of ten you reserve a few choice epithets to hurl at the department of buildings and grounds because every sidewalk is not as smooth as the red velvet welcoming carpet.

But . . . do you ever stop and think what B&G does when it snows? Telephones are ringing at 4 a.m. to call out crews to clear sidewalks. An emergency crew always stands by during bad weather ready to come out in the early morning hours.

Due to our bad weather this winter, a power salt spreader has been purchased, which has a spread of from 4 to 30 feet and holds 150 pounds of salt. This is mounted on a pick-up truck and requires only one operator and a truck driver. This new equipment will speed up the work of B&G tremendously.

Try to bear in mind that the "most used" areas must be cleared first—entrances to the emergency rooms of the hospitals, exit from the parking deck; then the sidewalks around other buildings.

It's easy enough to make a complaint, but it takes a little patience and understanding of the big task facing B&G when it snows.

## TWENTY-SEVEN GRADUATE IN PRACTICAL NURSING

Commencement exercises were held on February 15 for 27 graduates of the practical nursing course. Mr. Lucien D. Adams, assistant superintendent of City schools made the address and Mr. K. A.
