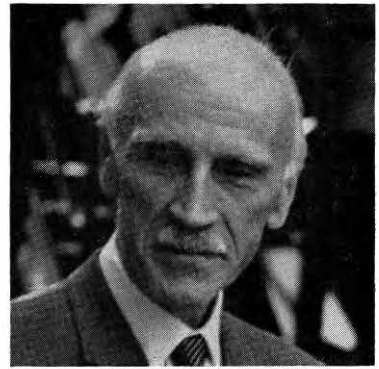

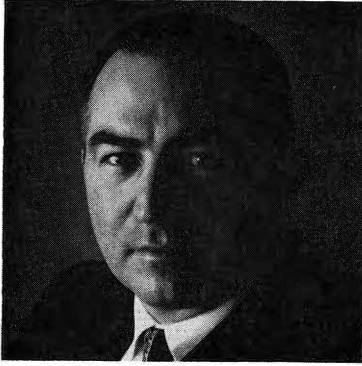
Tassilo Antoine (*Urological Complications in Relation to the Treatment of Cervical Cancer*) graduated from the University of Vienna in 1921. He has held professorships at the Women's Clinic of the University of Vienna, the City Hospital of Vienna-Lainz and the University of Innsbruck. Since 1943 Dr. Antoine has been head of the First Women's Clinic at the University of Vienna. Between 1955 and 1956 he was dean of the medical faculty, and between 1959 and 1960 he was rector of that university. His main research interests are pelvic cancer and sterility.



Clayton T. Beecham (*Total Treatment of Endometriosis*), director of gynecology and obstetrics at The Geisinger Medical Center, Danville, Pennsylvania, graduated from the University of Minnesota and served as professor of obstetrics and gynecology at Temple University before going to Geisinger. Dr. Beecham is president-elect of the American Association of Obstetrics and Gynecology.



Werner Bickenbach (*Surgical Treatment or Irradiation of Cervical Carcinoma*), professor and chief of the department of obstetrics and gynecology at the University of Munich, graduated Dr. med. in 1923 and achieved his professorship in 1935. Before taking up his present position at Munich, he was chief of the department of obstetrics and gynecology at Munster (1944-1950) and at Tübingen (1950-1954). His research interests include pelvic carcinoma, placental function, and endocrine disturbances.



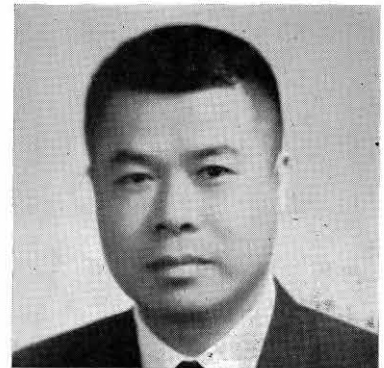
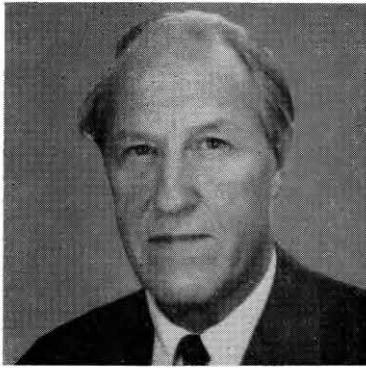
Michael R. Deddish (*Complications of X-Irradiation Therapy of Pelvic Malignancy*) graduated from Ohio State University and took his postgraduate training in surgery at Kings County Hospital in Brooklyn, and Memorial Hospital in New York City. Dr. Deddish is attending surgeon and chief of the Colon and Rectal Service at the Memorial Hospital. He also has staff appointments at the Sloan-Kettering Institute, Cornell University Medical College, and the James Ewing Hospital, N. Y.

Walter J. Geeraets (*Traumatic Hyphema*), director of ophthalmic research and professor of ophthalmology at MCV, was born in M. Gladbach, Germany. He obtained a doctor's degree in medicine, with a thesis on leukemia in children, from the University of Bonn. He later served as a research fellow at the Radiation Institute of that university and as the chief assistant of the surgical clinics at Bochum, Germany. He came to MCV in 1957, with appointments in the departments of ophthalmology and biophysics.



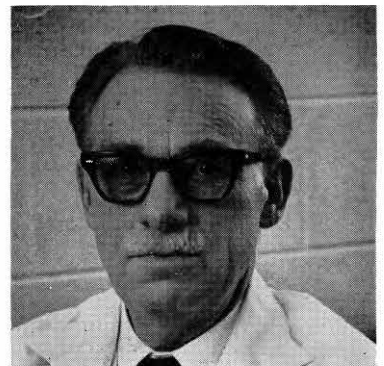
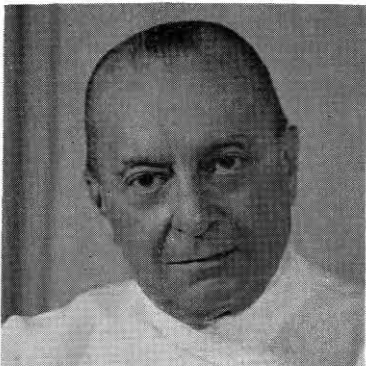
DuPont Guerry, III (*Traumatic Hyphema*) is professor and chairman of the department of ophthalmology at the Medical College of Virginia. After graduating from the University of Virginia School of Medicine, he trained at the Manhattan Eye, Ear and Throat Hospital and at the Institute of Ophthalmology, Presbyterian Hospital, Columbia University, where he received a D. Med. Sc. degree in ophthalmology. He taught at the Presbyterian Hospital and the Institute of Ophthalmology in New York before coming to MCV in 1944.

Otto Käser (*Results of 600 Wertheim Operations for Cancer of the Cervix*), a native of Switzerland, received his medical education in Zürich and took his training in obstetrics and gynecology at the Basle University Maternity Hospital and at the Johns Hopkins Hospital. Dr. Käser is now professor of obstetrics and gynecology at the University of Frankfurt, Germany.



Hans L. Kottmeier (*Ovarian Cancer: Diagnosis and Treatment*), a native of Malmö, Sweden, received his medical degree from the Karolinska University in Stockholm. He has taken special training in general surgery, roentgen diagnosis, radiotherapy, pathology, and obstetrics and gynaecology and, since 1947, has been head of the department of gynaecology at Radiumhemmet, Karolinska Hospital. Dr. Kottmeier is also chairman of the Cancer Society of Stockholm and an honorary member of many Swedish, U. S., and international scientific societies.

Ching-hung Liu (*Traumatic Hyphema*) received his medical degree from the National Defense Medical Center, Taipei, Taiwan, and took an internship and residency (in ophthalmology) at the First General Hospital there. He taught at the National Defense Medical Center and attended at the Veterans General Hospital before taking a fellowship at Washington University, St. Louis, in 1964. In 1965, Dr. Liu came to MCV for a year as research fellow in ophthalmology and has now returned to Taipei to be on the staff of the National Defense Medical School and the Veterans General Hospital.



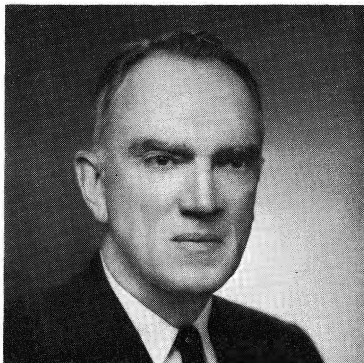
Nicholas C. Louros (*On the Concept of Radicalism in Surgery for Cervical Cancer*) is professor of obstetrics and gynecology at Athens University (Greece) and director of the "Alexandra" State and University Maternity Hospital. He is a member of the Academy of Athens and is president of the Greek Section of the International College of Surgeons. Dr. Louros is author of many scientific publications, including a textbook of obstetrics and gynecology and a dictionary of obstetrical and gynecological terms in eight languages.

Harry I. Lurie (*Sporotrichosis*) earned his medical degree from the University of the Witwatersrand, Johannesburg, South Africa. His training in pathology was at the South African Institute for Medical Research and later at other institutions in the United States, Great Britain, and France. He was on the faculty of the South African Institute for Medical Research for 17 years and was part-time lecturer at the Medical School of the University of the Witwatersrand. Since 1962, Dr. Lurie has been at MCV as professor of pathology. He teaches at the Armed Force Institute of Pathology in the course on geographical pathology of infectious diseases. He is now writing a chapter on Sporotrichosis for a new volume of Henke and Lubarsch.



Victor F. Marshall (*Exstrophy of the Bladder*) was one of the two 1966 McGuire Lecturers at MCV. A native of Virginia, he received his medical degree from the University of Virginia and took his training in surgery at the New York Hospital. Dr. Marshall is attending surgeon-in-charge (urology) at the New York Hospital, associate attending urologist at Memorial Center for Cancer and Allied Diseases, and clinical professor of surgery at Cornell University Medical College.

John A. Stallworthy (*Continuing Experience in the Combination of Radiotherapy and Surgery in the Treatment of Uterine Cancer*) graduated from Otago University, New Zealand, and took his postgraduate training in Australia, New Zealand, London, and Vienna. He is director of the area department of obstetrics and gynaecology, United Oxford Hospitals (England) and is Nuffield professor-elect of obstetrics and gynaecology at the University of Oxford.

Howard C. Taylor, Jr. (*The Role of the Physician in Family Planning*) was one of the two 1966 McGuire Lecturers at MCV. He is emeritus professor of obstetrics and gynecology, College of Physicians and Surgeons, Columbia University and editor-in-chief of the *American Journal of Obstetrics and Gynecology*. In addition, Dr. Taylor is director of the International Institute for the Study of Human Reproduction at Columbia.

Marion Waller (*Autologous Agglutinators to Erythrocytes Sensitized with the Ripley Anti-Rh Antibody Digested with 14 Different Proteolytic Enzymes*) is associate professor of medicine and serologist for the division of connective tissue diseases at MCV. She received her Ph.D. in immunology from the MCV Graduate School.
