## VENNART TO HEAD CLINICAL PATHOLOGY

Dr. George P. Vennart of the University of North Carolina medical faculty will join MCV on July 1 as professor of clinical pathology and chairman of the division of clinical pathology, replacing the late Dr. Henry G. Kupfer.

Doctor Vennart is a native of Boston and received his A.B. degree with honors from Wesleyan University, Middletown, Connecticut in 1948. He received his M.D. degree with honors from the University of Rochester in 1953. He served his internship and residency in pathology at the North Carolina Memorial Hospital, Chapel Hill, 1953-1956.

From 1956 to 1960, he was assistant attending pathologist at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons. From there he went to the University of North Carolina as associate professor of pathology. He is certified by the American Board of Pathology in Anatomic and Clinical Pathology.

Doctor Vennart is a member of Sigma Xi, Phi Beta Kappa, and Alpha Omega Alpha. His scientific memberships include the American Society of Experimental Pathology, American Medical Association, American Oil Chemists Society, and he is a fellow of the American Society of Clinical Pathology.

He is married and has two sons and one daughter.

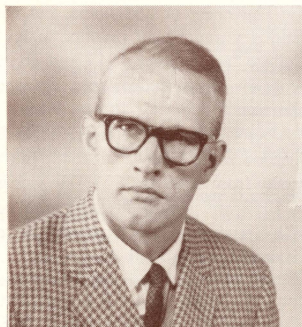

## MCV WOMAN'S CLUB RAISES \$342.50 FOR WALLER FUND

At its annual "pot luck" supper on February 10, the MCV Woman's Club took in \$342.50 for the Robert Waller Memorial Fund for nursing care, the largest amount raised in any year.

The Fund was started in 1951 and since that time \$6,065.33 has been given to the Fund. Since it was started, \$4,751.68 has been paid out for private duty nursing for College personnel.

Including the amount raised by the ladies, the balance in the Fund is now \$1,313.65. It is hoped contributions during 1965 will bring the total to at least \$2,000. Many of our personnel send a contribution to the Fund as a memorial instead of sending funeral flowers.

## LUTHER C. BRAWNER

1915 - 1965

Assistant Clinical Professor of Ophthalmology

## JAMES G. RICE

1932 - 1965

Assistant Resident on Obstetrics and Gynecology

Two plane crashes in February claimed the lives of Dr. Luther C. Brawner, February 3, and of Dr. James G. Rice, his wife, and three sons, February 25.

Doctor Brawner received both his A.B. (1935) and his M.D. (1939) from the University of Oklahoma, but came to MCV to serve his internship and residency and began practice in Richmond. He had been a member of the College faculty since 1943 and at the time of his death was assistant clinical professor of ophthalmology. He was a pioneer in the field of corneal transplants.

Doctor Rice was a native of Indiana. He received his B.S. degree from Arizona State College in 1953, but prior to that had attended Purdue University from 1949 to 1951. He was graduated from MCV school of medicine in 1962 and served his internship at the Johnston-Willis Hospital. He was in his second year of residency on obstetrics and gynecology at the time of his death.

Both of these physicians were experienced pilots, which makes their deaths in plane crashes more of a tragedy.

The College family has been greatly saddened by the untimely deaths of these two physicians and our thoughts have been with their bereaved families.

Doctor Brawner is survived by his wife and three daughters.

Doctor Rice's wife and three sons went down in the crash with him. He is survived by his mother, a brother, a half-brother, and a sister. Mrs. Rice is survived by her parents, Dr. and Mrs. D. C. Boatwright of Marion, and a brother, Dr. Robert Boatwright.

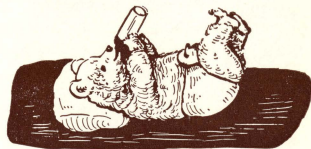
We are glad to welcome back MRS. MILDRED W. TAYLOR (clerk-typist). She was hospitalized at MCV and is now back at her desk and doing fine.
