## THREE NEW DIVISIONS APPROVED IN RADIOLOGY DEPARTMENT

The Board of Visitors has approved three new divisions in the department of radiology: division of diagnostic radiology; division of radiation physics; division of radiotherapy. These are in addition to the other division now set up, the division of radiotherapy.

Effective March 1, Dr. M. Pinson Neal was appointed to head the division of diagnostic radiology. On July 1, Dr. Fearghus O'Foghludha will head the division of radiation physics. A chairman has not yet been selected to head the new division of radiobiology.

## DEAN LYONS HONORED

Dean Harry Lyons of the school of dentistry was awarded an honorary degree of doctor of science by New York University on April 2. The College of Dentistry of the New York University is celebrating its Centennial.

This is the third honorary degree for Dean Lyons for his outstanding contributions to dental education. He received a D.Sc. from Temple University in 1957 and an LL.D. from Manitoba University in 1960.

At present, Doctor Lyons is president of the American College of Dentists. He is past-president of the American Dental Association, the American Academy of Periodontology and of the Virginia State Dental Association.

## Stoneburner Lecture Series

### SYMPOSIUM ON REHABILITATION — APRIL 28-30

Dr. Frank H. Krusen, professor of physical medicine and rehabilitation at Temple University school of medicine, will be the eighteenth Stoneburner lecturer.

His first lecture on *Rehabilitation Adds Life to Years* will be given at 8:30 P.M. on April 28; the second on *New Developments in the Field of Biomedical Engineering* will be given at 2 P.M. on April 29.

The symposium this year will be on *Rehabilitation with Special Emphasis on Stroke* and will go through April 29 and 30. Outside speakers on the symposium program will be: Paul M. Elwood, Jr. of the Sister Kenny Foundation; Roy Hoover of the Woodrow Wilson Rehabilitation Center; Justus F. Lehmann of the University of Washington; James R. Oates of Baylor University; Mrs. Martha L. Taylor of the New York University Medical Center.

MCV faculty members on the program will be John M. Herring, Henry D. Lederer, John B. Redford, and Laurie E. Rennie.

All lectures will be held in the Baruch Auditorium in the Egyptian Building. There will be no charge for the Stoneburner Lectures, but there will be a charge of \$10 a day for the symposium lectures, except for members of the faculty, members of the University of Virginia faculty, physicians at McGuire VA Hospital, and our medical students and housestaff.

Complete programs are now available in the office of the director of continuing education in the Medical Education Building on the first floor.

## MORRISON APPOINTED TO NEW POSITION OF ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR

# in memoriam



## LEWIS ELLSWORTH JARRETT

1901 - 1965

Dr. Lewis E. Jarrett, director of the Hospital Division from 1933 to 1944, died at his home in Phoenix, Arizona, March 24.

He was an alumnus of our school of pharmacy ('22) and of our school of medicine ('32). He was pharmacist for the Hospital Division 1922-1924; pharmacist and assistant superintendent 1924-1933; and succeeded Dr. J. L. McElroy as head of the Hospital Division in 1933.

Doctor Jarrett was a native of Lexington and attended Washington and Lee University before entering the study of pharmacy. He was a member of the old Omega Upsilon Phi fraternity, of Rho Chi, and of AOA.

He had been president of the Virginia Hospital Association and of the old Tri-State Hospital Association, and was one of the original board members of Blue Cross. During his years as hospital director here, he was very active in the American College of Hospital Administrators and in the American Hospital Association.

After an operation for cancer of the throat, he moved to Phoenix, Arizona, where his daughter lived. Re-learning to talk, he worked with the group in Arizona helping others with the same problem. At the time of his death, he was with the Arizona Health Department.

He is survived by his wife, the former Margaret Anderson of Marion and an MCV graduate in nursing; his daughter, Mrs. Robin Scott and her five children; and a brother Robert L. Jarrett of Richmond. The home address of Mrs. Jarrett is 2942 North 46th Avenue, Phoenix, Arizona.

Our deep sympathy is extended to Doctor Jarrett's survivors.
