FATHER AND SON TO RECEIVE DEGREES AT SAME TIME

It is probably unique for a father and son to receive degrees at the same time.

Our president, Dr. R. Blackwell Smith, Jr., will be honored by Hampden-Sydney College on Sunday, June 5, when he will be awarded the honorary degree of doctor of laws.

His son, Peter Blackwell Smith, will receive his bachelor of arts degree at the same time.

President Smith will give the Commencement address at Hampden-Sydney.

It is gratifying that Hampden-Sydney College will award our president his first honorary degree; since MCV was established in 1837 as the Medical Department of Hampden-Sydney College and was a part of that college until 1854 when it was chartered as an independent institution with the name of Medical College of Virginia.

Doctor Smith has been president of MCV since 1956. He received his B.S. in pharmacy from MCV in 1937; his M.S. from the University of Florida in 1938; and his Ph.D. from the University of Chicago in 1941. He was dean of our school of pharmacy from 1947 to 1954 and assistant president from 1954 to 1956.

TWO NEW BOARD MEMBERS APPOINTED

Governor Godwin has appointed two new members to the Board of Visitors of the College.

William R. Cogar, a Richmond attorney, succeeds William T. Reed of Richmond, who died March 2.

S. S. Flythe, president of the First National Bank of Martinsville, succeeds C. Francis Cocke of Roanoke, who has resigned.

J. Curtis Nottingham, an alumnus of our school of pharmacy '35, will be awarded the honorary degree of doctor of pharmaceutical science at Commencement exercises, Saturday, June 4.

He was the first full-time secretary of the Virginia Pharmaceutical Association in 1948. During his seven years with that organization, its membership increased from 801 to 1,260 and its assets from \$15,000 to \$50,000.

The first Virginian since 1871 to achieve the highest position in the American Pharmaceutical Association, Mr. Nottingham served as president 1964-1965 and has just completed a year as chairman of the A.Ph.A. council.

In 1964, he was named *Pharmacist of the Year* by the Virginia Pharmaceutical Association.

He is past-president of the Chesapeake Pharmaceutical Association (a district of the V.Ph.A.), of the National Conference of State Pharmaceutical Association Secretaries of the State Pharmaceutical Editorial Association, of the Virginia Pharmaceutical Association, and of MCV Alumni Association.

Mr. Nottingham was born on the Eastern Shore of Virginia, attended public school in that area, was graduated from Fork Union Military Academy, and from the Medical College of Virginia school of pharmacy.
