Major General William C. Haneke, who retired December 1 as chief of finance and accounting in the U. S. Army, has been appointed administrator of research grants and contracts effective January 3.

As administrator of research grants and contracts, General Haneke is responsible for the establishment of procedures for the organization and administration of grants and contracts and assistance in preparation of applications and the control of reports.

A native of Washington, D. C., General Haneke received his B. S. degree from the U. S. Military Academy and his master of business administration degree from the Harvard graduate school of business administration.

STONEBURNER LECTURES TO BE FEBRUARY 22 AND 23

Series Will Be on Kidney Diseases

Dr. Maurice B. Strauss, professor of medicine and associate dean for student affairs, Tufts University school of medicine, will be the 21st Stoneburner lecturer.

His first lecture on "Sodium Metabolism in Man" will be given at 1:30 p.m. on February 22. His second lecture "Microcystic Disease of the Kidney" will be delivered at 1:30 p.m. on February 23.

The 21st Annual Stoneburner Lecture Series is on "Diseases of the Kidney—Emphasis on Acid-Base Balance, Structural and Functional Disorders, and the Problems of the Management of Acute and Chronic Renal Disease."

In addition to Dr. Strauss, guest faculty will be: Dr. Frederic Bartter of Bethesda, Maryland; Dr. Lee W. Henderson of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; Dr. Robert H. Heptinstall of Baltimore, Maryland; Dr. Calvin M. Kunin of Charlottesville, Virginia; Dr. David Lauler, Dr. Lott Page, and Dr. John H. Peters of Boston, Massachusetts; Dr. Victor E. Pollak of Chicago, Illinois; Dr. George Schreiner of Washington, D. C.; and Dr. Roscoe R. Robinson of Durham, North Carolina.

MCV faculty members on the program will be: Dr. Newton C. Brackett, Dr. William F. Falls, Dr. David M. Hume, Dr. Russell E. Randall, and Dr. John G. Setter.

All lectures will be held in Baruch Auditorium in the Egyptian Building. There will be no charge for the

two Stoneburner lectures only or for members of the MCV faculty, University of Virginia faculty, physicians at McGuire VA Hospital, members of any housestaff, and medical students for the entire series. Attendance at the symposium is applicable for accreditation by the American Academy of General Practice.

Board Endorses Wayne Commission Recommendations

At its December meeting, the Medical College of Virginia Board of Visitors endorsed the recommendations of the Wayne Commission, which essentially has proposed the establishment of a new urban state university based here upon MCV and Richmond Professional Institute.

The motion to endorse the Wayne Commission's recommendations that were announced in November was passed unanimously by the MCV Board. Earlier last year, and prior to the release of the Wayne Commission report, the MCV Board endorsed in principal, the creation of a new university in the Richmond area.

Under the recommendations of the Wayne Commission's report, the Medical College of Virginia would become the health sciences division of the proposed new university and would retain its name.

MCV's Aid in Heart Transplant

From the January 4, 1968 editorial page of the Norfolk Virginian-Pilot.

A young doctor who watched a surgical team in South Africa perform the world's first human heart transplant said later, "We were all aware that this was medical history in the making." What has not won general awareness is that the history had been in the making several years, with major contributions coming from research at the Medical College of Virginia. Indeed, Dr. Christian N. Barnard, chief of the South African surgical team, spent three and a half months last year in Richmond studying transplants in general and those of the heart in particular.

For a year and a half MCV surgeons have been preparing to perform a heart transplant. They will not operate without determining that the patient will die within a few hours unless he receives a new heart.

MCV began investigating organ transplants in 1956 with the appointment of Dr. David Hume, formerly of the Harvard Medical School, as chairman of the Department of Surgery. His aim has been for MCV to develop a teaching program featuring significant research.

In 1957 MCV surgeons transplanted a kidney between twins, the second such successful operation. (The first took place in 1954 at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital while Dr. Hume was director of its surgical research.) In 1961 MCV completed, largely with private gifts, the Lewis L. Strauss Laboratory for Surgical Research. In 1965 Dr. Richard Lower came from Stanford University to head research in heart transplants as Chairman of the Division of Cardiac and Thoracic Surgery.

A remarkable series of successes in heart transplants among dogs proved that the operation was practical for human beings. Then Dr. Lower demonstrated that cadaver hearts could be made to pump again. (Working with Dr. Lower were Dr. Richard Cleveland, now Chief of Thoracic Surgery at Harbor Hospital in Los Angeles, and Dr. David Sewell, a research fellow at MCV.) Finally, Dr. Lower perfected means of detecting efforts by the body to reject the substitute heart. South African surgeons are using MCV techniques in monitoring patients for symptoms of rejection.

But while public attention focuses on the operation in Cape Town, the solid base of research at MCV goes relatively unnoticed and without the major funding merited by so beneficial a program.

The MCV recipients of the one-year clinical fellowships are: Dr. Thomas K. Jones, Jr., radiation therapy; Dr. William D. Payne, surgery; and Dr. Samuel F. Vance III, surgical pathology.

In addition, an advanced clinical fellowship for \$6,000 has been awarded to Dr. Charles W. Moncure, an instructor in pathology.

MCV also received fellowships for training programs in several different medical fields from the American Cancer Society in December.

Mrs. Blackwell Named New Hospital Hostess

The new hospital hostess, Mrs. James D. Blackwell, began her duties on January 15. Mrs. Blackwell succeeds Mrs. Hugh Rudd who retired at the end of December.

Dr. Anne Pascasio, assistant to the vice chancellor, health professions, at the University of Pittsburgh, will serve as consultant at the school of physical therapy's clinical education workshop for clinical instructors from the institutions affiliating with the MCV school of physical therapy, on February 9 and 10.

The subject of Doctor Pascasio's presentations will be "The Planning of Educational Objectives in the Affective Domain."

Gifts and Grants Increase

Gifts to the Medical College of Virginia in November, 1967, totaled \$6,555.74. The total for the five-month period, July through November, was \$96,993.77, compared to 69,504.59 for the same period of 1966.

Grants for the month of November totaled \$121,787.29 with the total for the July-November period being \$3,297,858.02, compared to \$2,801,899.02 for the same period of 1966. Contracts also increased in 1967 with the five-month total being \$440,257.00, compared to \$416,982.00.

The total gifts, grants, and contracts for July through November, 1967, ran over \$500,000 ahead of the same period of 1966 with a total of \$3,835,108.79.
