## Dean of Admissions and Records Is Named

On July 1, Mr. William Arthur Robertson, Jr., became the Medical College of Virginia's first dean of admissions and records and assistant professor of adult education.

Associated with Randolph-Macon College for 11 years as development officer and director of admissions and registrar, Mr. Robertson is president of the Virginia Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers. He received his B.S. degree with a major in physics from Randolph-Macon College and has had graduate study in business at the University of Richmond. Mr. Robertson is a member of Omicron Delta Kappa, honorary leadership fraternity, and Chi Beta Phi, honorary scientific fraternity.

The new dean of admissions and records will have the responsibility of consolidating the records of all MCV schools in one office and initiating folders of all applications for action by the admissions committees of the various schools. He will be an ex-officio member of all admissions committees and will serve as a resource person for them.

Mr. Robertson will be directly responsible to the provost.

## MCV Now Operating as Health Sciences Division of Virginia Commonwealth University

As most *Medicovan* readers know, MCV is now the Health Sciences Division of Virginia Commonwealth University which came into being on July 1, 1968.

Created by an act of the General Assembly of Virginia during its 1968 regular session, the University consists of the Health Sciences Division and the General Academic Division (formerly Richmond Professional Institute).

During the past several months, the Board of Visitors and officials of both divisions have been busy laying the groundwork for Virginia's newest and largest university.

Mr. Fred O. Wygal, former assistant superintendent of schools for the State and interim president of Longwood College on two occasions, is acting executive administrator while the search is on for a president.

A University Coordinating Committee to coordinate all University-wide activities and programs has been appointed.

Sub-committees, with members from the two divisions, have been established to consider matters within

areas of admissions and records, publications, library, student activities, continuing education, audiovisual services, data processing, and academic programs. Members of these sub-committees are expected to coordinate activities and submit any recommendations for the adoption of University procedures or policies to the Coordinating Committee.

Existing policies and procedures at both divisions remain in effect until superseded by policies that may be adopted for the University as a whole.

## Gifts, Grants, and Contracts To MCV Increase Over \$2 Million for Year

Gifts, grants, and contracts to the Medical College of Virginia during the fiscal year 1967-1968 totaled \$6,867,916.11, an increase of \$2,063,699.02 over the previous year.

Gifts for 1968 amounted to \$208,692.39, compared to \$150,868.51 for 1967.

Grants to this institution in 1968 totaled \$5,653,580.42; grants in 1967 were \$3,952,354.58.

Contracts for last year amounted to \$1,005,643.30; contracts in 1967 totaled \$700,994.00.

During July, the first month of the fiscal year 1968-1969, gifts, grants, and contracts totaled \$2,760,890.15, an increase of \$85,476.35 over July, 1967.

## Important SCATS Notice

The Medical College of Virginia has been notified that recorded data indicates some improper use of the SCATS telephone system.

All personnel are reminded that all business calls to points within the state must be placed over the SCATS system. The unnecessary placement of a call through normal long-distance facilities incurs a toll charge, thereby increasing the cost of the call at least 150 percent.

Attention is called to the fact that recorded data also indicate the use of this system for personal telephone calls. This is strictly forbidden, and the necessary steps are being taken to eliminate this abuse.



## School of Medicine Announces Continuing Education Courses for 1968-1969 Session

The department of continuing education in the school of medicine has announced six programs for the 1968-1969 session. The dates of additional courses, conferences, and lectures will be published later.

On September 26, 27, and 28 the Committee on Injuries of the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons, in cooperation with the school of medicine and the department of continuing education, will hold a course on "Initial Emergency Care and Transportation of the Sick and Injured."

"Basic Mechanisms in Internal Medicine" is the subject of a five-day postgraduate course to be held in Baruch Auditorium, October 7-11. This course is being sponsored by the American College of Physicians in cooperation with MCV.

The McGuire Lecture Series will be on "Transplantation" this year. The dates are October 31 and November 1.

The Alton D. Brashear postgraduate course in "Head and Neck Anatomy" will be January 28-31.

The Stoneburner Lecture Series on "Psychiatry in Medical Practice" will be held on February 20 and 21.

The department of radiology will sponsor a postgraduate course entitled "Practical Radiology of the Skull, Spine, and Central Nervous System" in Williamsburg, Virginia, March 4-8.

Details of the courses, "Initial Emergency Care and Transportation of the Sick and Injured" and "Basic Mechanisms in Internal Medicine," appear elsewhere in this issue of *The Medicovan*.

## American College of Physicians Sponsors Postgraduate Course Here On October 7-11

The American College of Physicians will sponsor a five-day postgraduate course on "Basic Mechanisms in Internal Medicine," October 7-11 in Baruch Auditorium.

Dr. W. T. Thompson, Jr., chairman of the department of medicine, will direct the course which is designed to present new and significant advances in internal medicine with emphasis on basic mechanisms and pathophysiologic concepts as they relate to clinical manifestations and to therapy of disease. Dr. Kinloch Nelson, dean of the school of medicine, and Dr. Charles M. Caravati, assistant dean and director of continuing education of the school of medicine, are co-directors.

Sixty MCV faculty members plus four outstanding guest faculty from other medical centers will present the material and lead the discussions.

## MCV Graduate Heads NIH

Dr. Robert Q. Marston, who took over September 1 as director of the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Maryland, is an MCV graduate and former member of our faculty.

## Board Re-Names MEB Sanger Hall

In its final action, the MCV Board of Visitors on June 14 re-named the Medical Education Building, Sanger Hall, in honor of Dr. William T. Sanger, chancellor emeritus. (As the Health Sciences Division of Virginia Commonwealth University, MCV now operates under a new Board of Visitors.)

Sanger Hall, completed and occupied in the summer of 1963, was constructed at a cost of \$6,500,000. It provides teaching headquarters for the clinical medical faculty and housing for several of the basic science departments and research laboratories. The offices of the provost, vice provost, vice presidents, director of development, dean of medicine and dean of graduate studies are located on the first floor.

Doctor Sanger retired from the presidency of MCV in 1956, after serving 31 years in the position. A native of Bridgewater, he received his B.A. from Bridgewater College, his M.A. from Indiana University, and Ph.D. from Clark University.

## Dr. R. W. Bright Wins Top "Hospital Physician" Award

Dr. Robert W. Bright, a second-year orthopedic resident, has been notified that he is this season's top winner of the "Hospital Physician" Awards.

Doctor Bright received a \$1,000 check for the article he submitted to the magazine about the rehabilitation team he has organized for the burn ward. He hopes to use the award to travel in foreign countries as an orthopedic consultant where such consultants are needed.

While a rotating resident on the burn ward last year, Doctor Bright noticed that many extremity contractures which later required reconstructive surgery were potentially preventable. Having decided that such rehabilitative procedures as patient positioning, exercising, and splinting could be helpful, he enlisted the aid of nurses, physical and occupational therapists, and social workers. The team set up individual programs for each

new burn patient.

Since the program was started, a vocational rehabilitation counselor for patients needing training in new skills and a chaplain for persons desiring spiritual comfort have been added.

Doctor Bright states that "everyone concerned with the program is convinced that it has set a higher standard of patient care. Proportionately, more patients are being discharged in an adequate functional state and fewer are coming back for reconstructive surgery.

Working with Doctor Bright on the program are: Dr. Boyd W. Haynes, Jr., professor of surgery and director of the burn unit; two registered nurses, Miss Wanda Williams and Miss Mary Jane Stevens; two physical therapists, Miss Mary Campbell and Mrs. Ann McNeill; two occupational therapists, Mrs. Peggy Harvey and Mrs. Losie Cary; and two social workers, Mrs. Murial Felder and Mrs. Nancy Edens.

The editor of "Hospital Physician" wrote Doctor Bright that "We received a record number of first-rate manuscripts during this season's Awards campaign, and the judging task was tough. We selected yours as outstanding because we believe many of our readers will be inspired to greater efforts by the example of what your initiative, hard work, and high purpose accomplished. We're looking forward to the publication of the feature in one of our fall issues."

## Dr. E. H. Ingersoll Named Acting Chairman Of Anatomy

Dr. Everett H. Ingersoll, professor of anatomy, was named acting chairman of the department of anatomy, effective July 1.

He succeeds Dr. Robert H. Brownson, who resigned as chairman to accept a faculty appointment at the University of California.

Doctor Ingersoll, who received his B.S. and M.S. degrees from Kansas State University and his Ph.D. from St. Louis University, joined the MCV faculty in 1952 as associate professor of anatomy. He was promoted to professor of anatomy in 1956.

## Gladding Named Director of Larrick Student Center

Walter M. Gladding, Jr., joined the Medical College of Virginia on September 1 as director of the Larrick Student Center. He succeeds Robert E. Purvis who left August 1 to accept a position at Bridgewater College.

A native of Brooklyn, New York, Mr. Gladding retired earlier this year as an English teacher at Douglas Freeman High School. Prior to joining the faculty there in 1963, he had served as an English teacher at Thomas Dale High School for four years. Mr. Gladding received his A.B. in English from Williams College in Williamstown, Massachusetts.

## MCV Surgeons Transplant Thymus

MCV surgeons transplanted a thymus gland into a six-month-old baby last July. The operation was the first of its kind in Virginia.

The thymus gland, a pinkish-gray organ located in the chest just underneath the breastbone, controls infection in infants.

The infant receiving the transplant was born without the usual defenses against infections and had suffered from repeated infections of the lungs, urinary tract, gastrointestinal tract, blood stream, and skin. The operation was an attempt to restore his immune responsiveness first by injecting immature lymphoid cells as a source of antibody-producing cells and then by transplanting a thymus gland from another fetal donor. Both the cells and the gland were obtained from the Lymphoid Tissue Bank of Royal Marsden Hospital in London which has the only such tissue bank in the world.

The transplanted gland was placed in the baby's abdominal muscle.

The physicians involved with the tissue transplants in the infant were: Dr. F. Stanford Massie, assistant professor of pediatrics and director of pediatric allergy and immunology; Dr. Lauraine Cady, instructor in pediatrics; Dr. G. Melville Williams, professor of surgery, and Dr. James Pierce, assistant professor of surgery.



## MCV Personnel Saddened By Death of Governor's Daughter

MCV personnel were saddened to learn of the tragic death on August 29 of 14-year-old Becky Godwin, only child of Governor and Mrs. Mills E. Godwin, Jr.

Miss Godwin was struck by light-

ening while on the beach at Camp Pendleton on August 25. Although she received intensive treatment almost immediately, she never regained consciousness.

Funeral services were held at the Executive Mansion on August 31. Burial was in Holly Lawn Cemetery in Suffolk.

Sincere sympathy is extended to Governor and Mrs. Godwin in behalf of our personnel.

## MCV Receives Grant To Train Heart Specialists

MCV has received a five-year grant totaling \$251,000 for a special program designed to train highly skilled specialists in the heart disease field.

The grant, from the National Heart Institute of the National Institutes of Health, is for two-year training programs for young physicians who have completed their internships and residency training in internal medicine and who have a serious interest in cardiovascular disease.

The number of trainees planned for the first year is two, and the number for subsequent years is four.

Dr. Reno R. Porter, chairman of the division of cardiovascular disease, is director of the program. Dr. David W. Richardson, who occupies the Virginia Heart Association's chair of cardiovascular research, is co-director.
