Virginia Meeting, American College of Physicians To Be Here on February 21

The 1970 Virginia meeting of the American College of Physicians will be held on Saturday, February 21 in George Ben Johnston Auditorium.

Guest speaker for the all-day session that gets under way at 9:00 a.m. will be Theodore J. Abernethy, F.A.C.P., and a regent of the College. Doctor Abernethy will speak at the dinner, which will be held at the Richmond Academy of Medicine. The subject of his address will be "The American College of Physicians in the Next Decade."

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VCU Names Art Building for Miss Theresa Pollak

VCU will name its new art studio building for Miss Theresa Pollak, professor emeritus and the first faculty member of the school of the arts.

The \$3,000,000 structure, now under construction on Harrison Street between Franklin Street and Park Avenue, is expected to be completed in early 1971. The building will provide 27 studios, offices for faculty, and exhibit space on the first level.

Miss Pollak, who retired from active teaching in 1969 after 40 years of service, was instrumental in founding the school of art which began with Miss Pollak's first studio class of 20 students in 1928. For many years, she acted as the school's director and, upon her retirement, held senior rank among all professors at the Academic Division.

Lacy, assistant director of nursing of the hospitals. Miss Rosemary Fritsch, director of the department of nursing, smiles her approval. The North Hospital and the Clinical Center scored 100 percent attendance on Christmas Day and New Year's Day with an average of 98 percent earned by a total of 323 personnel in both facilities. The 819 staff members of West Hospital earned a 95 percent average for both holidays.

The excellent scores have been the favorable results of an artful arranging of schedules by head nurses and supervisors under the direction of Mrs. Marjorie Fawcett, associate director of nursing. Balancing professional responsibility with personal concerns has resulted in numerous interactions over a two-month period among the 1,306 staff members of the department of nursing.

The members of the department recognize the snow emergency crew's contribution of December 26, which helped make it possible to achieve this record.

1970 presents a new challenge as the head nurse-administrators' section voted unanimously to extend the contest throughout the next 12 months.

A plaque will be awarded to these hospital groupings: (1) East and South, (2) North and Clinical Center, and



(3) West. The individual patient unit within the facility will compete with one another by the month. A day selected at random will compare the attendance and the unit having the top score will proudly display the plaque for the month. At the conclusion of '70, the unit having the highest average will claim the plaque for their very own. The head nurse-administrators' section cautions that woe is "the unit that permits a failure in following the policy of reporting absenteeism, as this unit will disqualify itself the following month."

Good attendance reduces costly overtime, frustration, and turnover. It is a positive component of a healthy team spirit which promotes quality patient care.

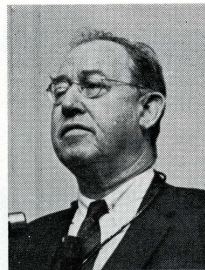

NEW DENTAL BUILDING DEDICATED



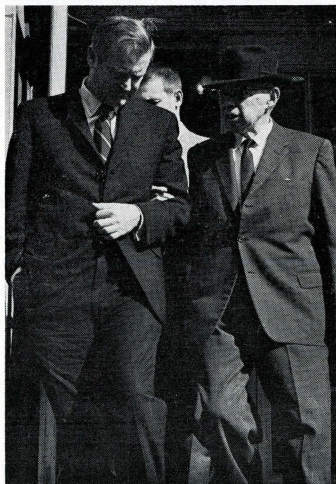
The Governor and Doctor Brandt enjoying themselves.

Dedication of the new dental building was held on January 26 during the 19th annual dental alumni homecoming.

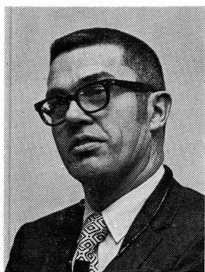
In ceremonies that featured Virginia's new Governor and VCU's president, MCV officially opened its second dental education facility in 16 years.

Designed under the guidance of Dr. Harry Lyons, dean of the school of dentistry since 1951, the new building has enabled the dental school to expand its entering class from 80 to 100 students and has permitted the degree program in dental hygiene. Future plans call for a freshmen class of 120 dental students and for new training programs in the dental health field.

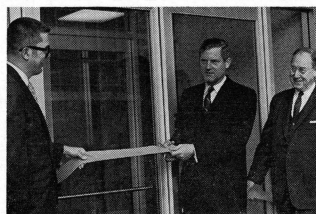

MCV Receives Federal Grants to Extend Sanger Hall and Tompkins-McCaw Library

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare has announced the funding of two major construction grants to MCV for a total of \$7.6 million.

One federal award, for \$6,354,002, is for construction of a 15-floor addition to Sanger Hall, extending this facility to Broad Street. The other, for \$1,294,720, is for an addition to the Tompkins-McCaw Library that would triple the library's present size and provide for modernization of the present facility.

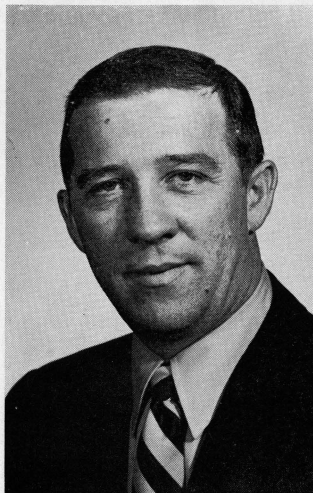
In both instances, the awards represent an approximate two-to-one match of federal funds to state dollars for the construction projects. The state had appropriated about \$3.3 million from general obligation bonds for the Sanger Hall addition, and approximately \$705,000 had been appropriated by the state for the library project.

Under current plans, the working drawings and specifications for the Sanger Hall addition are to be completed by the end of this year; construction is to begin early in 1971 and will be completed by January 1973.

The addition, with 12 floors above ground and three below, will primarily contain the basic science departments—atomy, physiology, microbiology, biochemistry, and biometry—plus the department of radiology and certain subsections of the department of medicine.

The completion of this addition will help make possible an increase in the entering medical school class from 136 to 168 students.

The library project has been in the planning stages for several years. The present facility contains 14,500 square feet of space; that will be increased to 52,000 square feet following the addition.



H. S. Moore, Jr., Named Director of Personnel
